\$92 million project in Hamilton, Madison counties...

Construction on I-69 begins

Governor Mike Pence today joined Senator Jim Merritt and local leaders from Fishers, Noblesville and Pendleton to officially kick off construction on a \$92 million project to modernize Interstate 69 in Hamilton and Madison counties.

“Here in the Crossroads of America, we know that roads mean jobs,” said Governor Pence. “Along this section of I-69, we’ve seen tremendous economic development and it is vital that we modernize this portion of the highway to ensure continued economic growth. My administration has invested nearly \$3 billion in roads and bridges across Indiana since I became governor, and I firmly believe that by continuing to invest in infrastructure, we can make Indiana the best place in America to start a business, grow a business and create jobs.”

The project, as part of the Governor’s Major Moves 2020 program, will widen 15 miles of Interstate 69 from State Road 37 in Fishers to State Road 38 in Pendleton. Also, the project will reconfigure I-69 Exit 210 at Campus/Southeastern Parkway into a double-crossover diamond.

Most highway maintenance activities and construction projects will halt work and pull back barriers and barricades to the safest extent possible for holiday weekend travel. Following Independence Day, Milestone Contractors will shift traffic to begin widening I-69 and build new ramps at Exit 210.

Governor’s Pence’s Major Moves 2020 program is widening and rehabilitating more than 40 miles of I-65 and I-69 in Indiana. This includes:

- I-65 between from State Road 44 near Franklin to the Johnson/Marion county line,
 - I-65 from State Road 38 to State Road 26 near Lafayette in Tippecanoe County, and
 - I-65 between Sellersburg and Memphis in Clark County.
- In December, I-65 south of U.S. 30 in Merrillville was added to the Major Moves 2020 program.
- Four design-build teams are currently developing proposals to widen and modernize as much of I-65 as the \$70 million project budget allows.

Earlier this week the Fishers City Council approved a huge addition to the downtown Fishers area, a \$47 million redevelopment project in the city’s Nickel Plate District.

The Council approved an agreement with consulting engineer and architect firm RQAW Corp. for a three-story office building.

Also approved was a four-story mixed use building at the corner of Lantern Road and North Street, along with a 500 spots parking garage. The mixed use building will include 240 residential spaces.

Is Fishers becoming another Carmel? For someone like myself who for more than 60 years has driven to Carmel and Fishers, the now-city of Fishers may already have surpassed Carmel in changes in the downtown area.

For me, who married someone from Fishers, the old town of Fishers is gone more than the old town of Carmel.

The recent move by the City Council is just another step in that direction.

RQAW, in some ways, is like BlueSky, a company which has announced plans to move it’s cooperate location to the west side of Noblesville, minus residential spaces and a parking garage.

Fishers’ agreement with RQAW stipulates the company must relocate its headquarters to Fishers by Dec. 31, 2018

and must have 100 full-time employees by the end of 2021. The average salary for those positions can be no less than \$80,000, according to the agreement.

What is happening in Fishers continues the long and sometimes hotly debated (as it was in Carmel) that “enough is enough.” Some folks in Fishers are moaning that the development will bring more and more traffic to what was a peaceful area which for years and years was nothing more than three or four downtown businesses with zero downtown housing.

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness, in a press release, addressed the subject by writing, “This redevelopment project really raises the bar for our entrepreneurial city. A creative development like this one, that meets the needs of small business owners and establishes much needed office space in the Nickel Plate District, brings significant value to our downtown and furthers the ecosystem in which entrepreneurs can thrive.”

The parking garage and mixed use building will be owned, developed and operated by an Indianapolis based management and investment firm.

The parking garage is expected to be used by RQAW employees and residents in the apartment complex. Meyer Najem, which in 2014 built its \$5.5 million headquarters just north of the proposed development, also would use the garage for its employees. The garage likely will be open to the public on evenings and weekends.

If you haven’t driven through Fishers lately, do so. It’s exciting what is going on to the little area we once called “Mudsock.”





Noblesville reminds citizens of fireworks ordinance

With the summer months upon us now, the City of Noblesville would like to remind its citizens of the city’s fireworks ordinance.

1. You may use consumer fireworks between the hours of 5 p.m. till TWO HOURS after sunset on June 29, June 30, July 1, July 3, July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8, and July 9.

2. You may use consumer fireworks between 10 a.m. and MIDNIGHT on July 4.

3. You may use consumer fireworks between the hours of 10 a.m. on December 31 and 1 a.m. on January 1.

Also, you must shoot off consumer fireworks in your own yard and all the debris must land in your own yard. You cannot shoot off fireworks in the street and if the debris lands outside of your property this would be a violation of the ordinance even if you are in compliance with the date and times.

This time of year the city get numerous complaints on fireworks usage, so please be courteous of your neighbors. Also, please be safe when shooting off fireworks. The city hopes that everyone enjoys the summer.

Deep Carmel team having summer success

Anyone who watched the Carmel girls basketball team last season knows how good the Greyhounds were.

Carmel finished last season with a 24-5 record, a sectional championship and an appearance in the regional title game. While the 'Hounds graduated some good athletes, they also have plenty of good athletes competing in summer ball - and by "competing," that means not just against other teams, but also each other.

"It's so competitive, with 15 to 18 kids vying for eight or nine varsity spots," said Carmel coach Tod Windlan, who said this is the "deepest team I've ever had."

Leading the way for the Greyhounds are returning juniors-to-be Amy Dilk and Blake Smith. Dilk led Carmel's scoring last season with an 11.9 points-per-game average, while Smith was the third-leading scorer, contributing 9.5 points per contest. Dilk also led the assists (4.3) and steals (3.3) categories, with Smith the top rebounder at 6.2 boards per game.

"Amy's had a tremendous spring and summer, and Blake as well," said Windlan. The coach said that the college offers have been coming in for both over the past few months: Both girls have gotten offers from Ball State, Kentucky and Belmont, with Dilk also getting an offer from Michigan.

"They're still going through the process," said Windlan.

There will be just one senior on this year's Greyhound team. Olivia Christy was a solid player last season, averaging 5.1 points per game.

"She played AAU in the spring and then missed the first 12 days of summer ball," said Windlan. "She's been out of the country on a school trip, which was great for her. She just got back in the swing of things last week. She's a vital part of what we do, that's for sure."

Other juniors returning are Molly Gillig, Anna Kmec and Lauren Johnson. Also on the junior roster is Vanessa Mullins, a transfer from Texas, but she is recovering from ACL surgery.

Sophomores coming back for Carmel include returners Sophie Bair, Macy Berglund, Reagan Hune (fresh from the state track and field meet) and Mackenzie Wood. Windlan said that Hune has "had a nice summer in basketball" and that Wood has "played very well in the spring and summer as well."

Two incoming freshmen are also making an impact: Jasmine McWilliams and Maddi Sears.

"Jasmine is an extremely talented and physically gifted young lady for sure," said Windlan. "Sears is a very, very good shooter."

Carmel has been busy over the summer. First, the 'Hounds played the Homestead
