Carmel's Arts and Design District got a chance to host leaders from all across the United States Friday evening when the Conference of Mayors came into town. Ivy Tech, HSE Schools partner in IT training

Ivy Tech Community College Hamilton County is partnering with Hamilton Southeastern Schools to train student technology support teams. Twenty students from Hamilton Southeastern High School and Fishers High School are participating in the training at Ivy Tech's Hamilton County Campus in Noblesville. These students, who are referred to as CybeRoyals for Hamilton Southeastern High School and Code Red for Fishers High School, will help teachers and students utilize laptop computers, iPads, mobile devices, and technology networks. The students will take two Microsoft Comptia A+ certifications, qualifying them to work as IT support professionals. "With 3,000 students and several hundred adults in each building, the need for tech support is enormous," said Phil Lederach, director of secondary education for Hamilton Southeastern Schools. "Many of the CyberRoyals and Code Red students are skilled in the use of technology, but few have any type of formal training. They have learned by trial-and-error, but could be much more helpful with training." The Hamilton Southeastern Schools Foundation has provided financial support for this program, helping make the program free to its students. The program is based in Ivy Tech Hamilton County's new data center,

Noblesville has announced its street rehabilitation project to address the most necessary infrastructure needs within the city. This year's list, which totals approximately \$2 million, has expanded to include more work than in years past – an increase of \$500,000 over the total spending in 2015. "Noblesville's 'Making Moves' road repaving and sidewalk repair project for this summer is an intensified street rehabilitation effort funded by the revenues the city is able to capture from the recent change in the trash ordinance," Mayor John Ditslear said. City Engineer John Beery said that the trash ordinance change equates to approximately 25 percent more work being done to streets, sidewalks and alleys than previously planned. "Over the past year, we have completely inventoried and reviewed the conditions of all our streets and alleys," said Beery. "Once each road is evaluated and graded, a street rehabilitation list is made based on priority and grouping the work to be the most efficient with our budget. We make every effort to address the areas that are most in need." The Noblesville Engineering Department has awarded three contracts for infrastructure work throughout the city. Resurfacing projects include South Ninth Street, Pebble Brook Village, South Harbour, East Harbour, Lakecrest, Morse Lake Estates, 196th Street, Hague Road and Carrigan Road. Other projects include the replacement of sidewalks in the Southwest Quadrant. Concrete sidewalk installation on Little Chicago Road north of Carrigan Road; Allisonville Road north of Field Drive to Fairfield Farms; and on Maple Street in front of the Public Safety Building, along with alley approaches in Old Town. The fourth project will involve alley paving in Old Town. This project will be finalized and out to bid in

the next 30 days. Beery said that although final locations are still pending, it is expected that alley paving locations will be in the same general areas in which alley approaches are being replaced.

Construction is expected to begin after the Fourth of July holiday. Signs are placed onsite a week before construction begins and mailings will be sent to affected homeowners. This construction will cause minor inconveniences including traffic delays, temporary loss of street parking, construction noise and access restrictions. All measures will be taken to facilitate construction in a quick and timely fashion.

The trash ordinance change allows the actual per home cost of the city’s contract with Republic Services to be paid by residents instead of coming from the city’s general fund. Funds that are now available to the city have been dedicated to improving the downtown infrastructure and tree replacement program, increasing support of law enforcement and their crime prevention efforts, intensifying funding of road repaving and sidewalk repair throughout the city and replenishing the County Option Income Tax fund.



Girls summer basketball Tigers will feature some new faces, big returners

Expect to see a few different faces on the roster for the Fishers girls basketball team this upcoming season.
Actually, you could travel over to Fishers High School today and see them. The Tigers are hosting a shootout this morning and afternoon, another chance to get those new kids some experience. At the same time, there will be some significant returners from last season.
"We have a few different kids, it's really kind of hard to say at this point as to who will be ready to make an impact next year," said Tigers coach Michael Gaines.
One of them is leading scorer Ali Gerka, who will be entering her junior year. Gerka had to take on new leadership roles when her older sister Kara was sidelined due to an

injury last season. Ali stepped up big time, averaging 9.7 points per game. She was solid on defense too, with 3.3 rebounds and 1.6 steals, ranking second in the latter category.
The leading stealer for the Tigers last year was Toni Grace, also a junior-to-be and a state track and field medalist. Grace had 1.8 steals last season, and also helped scoring-wise with 6.3 points per game. Also back are juniors-to-be Kennedy London, Sydney Rector and Casey Walker and returning senior Jaela Baskin.
"She played some varsity minutes for us last year for us, but she played the majority for us on JV," said Gaines of Baskin. "Casey Walker, she's really developing her game. Sydney Rector, both of those kids are doing a great job."
New names include sophomores Skylar Fulton, McKenzie Miller and Erica McKey. Gaines said at this point, the Tigers are "just kind of seeing how they fit in and seeing how they develop and contribute." Two freshmen that Gaines said have the potential to make an impact for Fishers are Lydia Stullken and Camia Perryman.
Before hosting today's tournament, Fishers traveled to Goshen College for a shootout there, and also played one at Indiana State. Gaines said the team won four and lost two at both of them, but also said he doesn't "put a lot of stock in" summer ball records. At this point, the coach just wants the players to "get to know each other," get some court time, and do all the necessary tweaking of the Tigers system.
As for July, Gaines said the team will "be hitting the weight room and doing player development."

2016 US Youth Soccer Region II Championships kick off

The 2016 US Youth Soccer Region II (Midwest) Championships kicked off Friday at Grand Park in Westfield. Teams comprised of state champions as well as US Youth Soccer Midwest Regional League champions and wildcards, commenced day one with hopes of advancing to knockout rounds, and ultimately earning a berth to the 2016 US Youth Soccer National Championships in Frisco, Texas.

The 216 participating US Youth Soccer Boys and Girls teams in the Under-13 through Under-19 age groups represent 14 State Associations - host Indiana Soccer Association, and Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio North, Ohio South, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

Seven teams this year are back to defend their 2015 US Youth Soccer Region II Championship titles. Five girls teams include: Under-14 Girls PSG Gators 02 Orange (MI), Under-15 CUP Gold 00/01 (OH-S), Under-16 Girls Pink Panthers Elite (MO), Under-18 Girls KHA Red (OH-S)

and Under-19 Girls KC Metro Dynamos (KS). The boys' side includes: Under-15 Boys LFSC Geerling (MO) and Under-19 Boys Kansas Rush Academy Blue 96/97 (KS).

The Under-14 Girls team, PSG Gators 02 Orange (MI), is also back to defend their 2015 US Youth Soccer National Championship. They started off the tournament on a positive note with a 1-0 win against Michigan Jaguars 02 Green (MI).

Some highlights from Friday's games:

Under-13 Boys

St. Louis Scott Gallagher SC (MO) came out firing against VSA (IA) as Ben Wunsch took a shot from the side of the 18-yard box and hit the side net in the 11th minute of the match. St. Louis continued to pound more shots on goal and two minutes later, George Dietrich received a pass with his back facing the goal. Dietrich spun the VSA defender and placed the ball in the right corner of the goal. St. Louis's Braeden Musielak topped off the score with a final goal in the 60th minute for ultimately a 3-0

win.

Under-15 Boys

In the first half between Springfield SC Netherlands (MO) and local area team Indiana Elite FC 00 Premier (IN), Springfield SC began the action with several opportunities at goal. LSC EGA Maroon 99/00 (NE) put on the pressure early in the game against Midwest United 00 Royal (MI) as they had multiple shots on goal along with two corners and a free kick. The momentum switched as Midwest United earned a penalty kick and Madeline Becker stepped up to take it and gave her team a 1-0 lead. Midwest United gained more of a rhythm and in the 32nd minute, the ball was crossed in and Lauryn Deshane slotted the ball into the goal. LSC EGA attempted to get back into the game and take their opportunities, but Midwest United earned the 2-0 victory.

Under-17 Boys
