County Sheriff's deputy injured in Tuesday crash

A Hamilton County Sheriff's deputy was injured in a multiple vehicle crash in Noblesville on Tuesday.

Deputies responded to the area of State Road 37 and Pleasant Street shortly before 6:30 p.m. on the report of a crash involving four vehicles.

According to the crash report, Sgt. Ryan Horine of the Sheriff's Office was on duty driving a marked patrol car northbound on SR 37 approaching Pleasant Street. Also northbound on SR 37 was a gray Honda ULX driven by Li Xiaohong, age 46 of Carmel. Investigators believe the Honda's driver made a late decision to change lanes as she approached Pleasant Street. As the Honda slowed or stopped in the travel lane to change lanes, the Sheriff's Office car collided with the rear of the Honda pushing it into two other vehicles, a silver Saturn driven by Violeta Watt of Pendleton and a gray Chevrolet driven by Lulu Laubecher of McCordsville.

Horine was taken by ambulance to Riverview Hospital with leg and ankle injuries. None of the drivers or passengers in the other vehicles was reported injured.

In accordance with Hamilton County policy requiring an employee involved in a vehicle crash that causes injury or requires a vehicle to be towed, toxicology tests were performed and results are pending. Investigators do not believe there were any signs of impairment.

Everyone is welcome to participate, a motorcycle is not necessary to participate in the poker run or the auctions.







Sauerteig averaged 5.6 points a game and Wahl 5.4 last season.


"We've had lots of open gyms and workouts this summer," said Ballenger.

A handful of Hamilton County basketball players and coaches will be participating in the 14th annual IBCA/IHSAA Underclass Showcase.

The showcase events have been set for July 12 and July 13 at Ben Davis High School

Staged by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association with support from the Indiana High School Athletic Association, the Underclass Showcase events are designed to give exposure to approximately 200 of the top basketball prospects (about 100 boys and about 100 girls) from across the state to colleges across the state and nation.

The 2016 Girls' Showcase will be on Tuesday, July 12. Activity will begin at 2 p.m. and will last until about 8 p.m. Five county girls basketball players are scheduled to be there: Amy Dilk, Carmel; Kayla Kirtley, Hamilton Heights; Emily Kiser, Noblesville; Audrey Reed, Sheridan and Blake Smith, Carmel.

The 2016 Boys' Showcase will be on Wednesday, July 13. Action will begin at 3 p.m. and last until about 9 p.m. Four county players are set to attend: Sterling Brown, Carmel; Max Flinchum, Noblesville; Matthew Godfrey, Guerin Catholic and Brennan Schofield of Hamilton Southeastern. In addition, four county coaches will be on the coaching staff: Pete Smith, Guerin Catholic; Brian Satterfield, HSE; Chad Ballenger, Heights and Tommy Mascari, a Guerin assistant.

The showcase events are NCAA certified for 2016. That means college coaches from all levels (NCAA Division I, NCAA Division II, NCAA Division III, NAIA and NJCAA) may attend to evaluate the participants.

Bilquist comes close at Olympic Trials

Only 0.08 seconds separated Carmel the national champion 200 freestyle relay, graduate Amy Bilquist from Rio on Tues-

Bilquist, an eight-time state champion for the Greyhounds, was one of several swimmers with Carmel ties that has been competing in the U.S. Olympic Trials, which are taking place this week in Omaha, Neb. Bilquist swam in the 100 backstroke, and came oh-so-close to securing a spot for the 2016 Summer Games, which start in August in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Bilquist finished the preliminary round in the 100 back in second place with a time of 59.67, moving her on to the Tuesday semi-finals. The top eight advance from the semis to the finals, and Bilguist easily made it through, winning her semi-final heat and placing third overall with a 59.85.

That sent Bilquist to the Tuesday final, and she swam a personal best 59.37, an outstanding time - but not enough. The top two finishers in each event make it on to the Olympic team, and Bilquist was third, placing behind Olivia Smoliga's 59.02 and Kathleen Baker's 59.29.

Bilquist just completed her freshman year at the University of California, where 151st, 1:05.32 she helped Cal to a third-place finish at the NCAA Championships at Georgia Tech University in March. Bilquist was part of

which won that race in a new Georgia Tech pool record of 1:26.80. She also swam on Cal's third-place 800 freestyle relay team (6:55.18) and its 10th place 400 medley relay (3:30.36).

Individually, Bilquist placed fourth in the 100 backstroke (51.01) and fifth in the 200 back (1:50.88). She also finished tied for 26th in the 50 free preliminaries (22.39).


