Democrats fill general election ticket

For the first time in nearly a half-century Democrats have filled their county ticket for a general election.

Beating the deadline last Friday, the names of eight candidates were filed by County Chairman Keith Clock. The party had the right to fill the ticket since no Democratic candidates filed in the May primary.

Running for County Auditor is Pam Otten who will oppose Republican Robin Mills in the November 5 general election. Seeking the County Treasurer's office is Mark Bailey who opposes incumbent Jennifer Templeton. And Joe Weingarten has filed for County Surveyor against longtime incumbent Kenton Ward.



Seeking seats on the Board of County Commissioners are Mimi DeMore in District 2 against incumbent Steve Dillinger, and Debra Jarvis in District 3 against incumbent Mark Heirbrandt.

Three Democrats are filed for at-large seats on the County Council. They are Rosemary Dunkle, Bob Williams and Edward Chu. Their GOP opponents are incumbents Brad Beaver, Rick McKinney and newcomer Jeff Hern.

Technically the office of judge of Superior Court 2 which is up for election this year, is not a county position. It is a state judgeship, and no Democrat has filed against Republican Jon Brown. There is, however, an independent Steve Kincaid running for the court's bench. Incumbent Judge Dan Pfleging is retiring.

Several of the Democrat hopefuls have run unsuccessfully for office in the past, but never as part of a full slate.

Various factors apparently give Democrats the hope of an upset win in the county where they have not elected a

candidate to countywide office in 58 years. In 1958 Charles Ardery was elected Circuit Court judge. He served one term and voluntarily retired.

Some political observers have predicted that a national GOP ticket headed by Donald Trump and a state ticket headed by Gov. Mike Pence will not play well with some voters thus leading to a Democratic victory at the state and/or national level.

Closer to home, a factional fight for control of the county Republican organization earlier this year may lead Democrats to believe their chances are better than usual. In addition there has been open political warfare between factions for control of the County Council.

An accusation of destruction of a council candidate's roadside signs has gone to the prosecutor's office. And finally there has been some lingering discontent over the outcome of the primary election for judge where a popular David Najjar was defeated by first time candidate Jon Brown.

Construction begins tonight at I-69 Exit 210

Construction of the new interchange configuration is scheduled to begin tonight as Milestone Contractors will narrow traffic lanes to 11 feet wide, set temporary concrete barrier along the bridge over Interstate 69, and begin earthwork for the new interchange ramps.

Drivers may experience temporary traffic restrictions and short-term delays as crews paint new markings for the narrowed lanes and set concrete barriers between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. on Tuesday and Wednesday nights.

Motorists will notice an increase in construction activity at the interchange and should be alert for workers in the area and trucks entering and exiting the roadway.

The first phase of interchange construction will widen the bridge over I-69 and begin building the new ramps. Later this summer, traffic will be shifted into a double-crossover diamond configuration, which is intended to improve traffic flow during construction of the permanent interchange improvements.

Three men arrested after Best Buy burglary

Three men were arrested Sunday morning after a burglary in Noblesville.

At approximately 3:19 a.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the Best Buy, located at 17200 Mercantile Blvd., in response to a report of a business alarm. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Upon arrival on the scene, officers reported that they could hear voices near and around the building. A few moments later, officers stated that they observed a vehicle speed away from the scene with no lights on. Officers activated

their emergency lights and sirens and attempted to stop the vehicle. The vehicle failed to stop and a vehicle pursuit ensued. The vehicle pursuit lasted approximately five minutes and ended when the suspect vehicle crashed near the intersection of Greenfield Avenue and Boden Road. Officers reported that four suspects ran from the crashed vehicle.


Officers from the Fishers Police Department, Westfield Police Department and Hamilton County Sheriff's Department assisted with a search of the area utilizing motor and foot patrols. Police K-9 units were also deployed in the search for the suspects. Officers were able to

locate three subjects believed to be involved in the incident. A fourth suspect remains at large.


All three captured suspects were transported to the Hamilton County Jail and booked on a number of preliminary charges.

The suspects are identified as: Nathan A.R. Gordy, 25; Elijah D. Davis, 23 and Antoyne L. Parker, Jr., 21. All three are from Detroit, and are all charged with Burglary, Theft and Resisting Law Enforcement.


This remains an ongoing investigation.

Next week, crews will set temporary concrete barriers along the interstate median and begin construction of an additional travel lane along northbound I-69. Southbound lanes in the same section are scheduled to be shifted in late July.

Shifting northbound traffic lanes and setting concrete barriers will require lane closures between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. through next week.

Interstate 69 patching & paving

Milestone Contractors plans to continue paving an asphalt overlay on southbound I-69 south of Campus/Southeastern Parkway (Exit 210) to State Road 37 (Exit 205). Crews will also continue patching existing northbound pavement north of Exit 210. The patching operation will continue north over the next several weeks to the end of the project limits, which is just past State Road 38 (Exit 219), before returning southbound on I-69 back to Exit 210.

Milestone is repairing pavement on about 15 miles of interstate before paving a new asphalt overlay on existing lanes. Motorists may temporarily experience rough pavement after sections are patched and before sections are paved.

Weather permitting, patching and paving operations require alternating lane closures six nights a week on Monday through Saturday nights from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. One lane of I-69 will remain open at all times, and two lanes will remain open during peak daytime travel times.

The speed limit on I-69 through the work zone is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present. Motorists should also be alert for trucks entering and exiting the highway through the construction zone.

About the project

INDOT and the Indiana Finance Authority (IFA) selected a \$92 million proposal from Milestone Contractors and United Consulting to add a travel lane and rehabilitate 15 miles of I-69 in Hamilton and Madison counties as part of Indiana's Major Moves 2020 program. The project will:

- Resurface 15 miles of existing interstate pavement;
- Rehabilitate existing interstate bridges and drainage structures;
- Add a third travel lane to the interstate median in each direction from State Road 37 (Exit 205) in Fishers to north of State Road 38 (Exit 214) in Pendleton;
- Add a southbound lane to the right outside shoulder between the 116th Street entrance ramp and the future 106th Street exit ramp, which is currently under construction;

Reconfigure the Campus Parkway interchange (Exit 210) into a double crossover diamond design to improve traffic flow;

Widen the Campus Parkway bridge over I-69;

Rebuild and lower the State Road 13 (Exit 214) pavement under I-69;

Rehabilitate the Brooks School Road and Madison County Road 650W bridges over I-69

Ivy Tech Community College awards scholarships to Excel Center graduates

Ivy Tech Community College is awarding scholarships to the 2016 class of Excel Center graduates. This month was the first commencement ceremony for the class of graduates from the new Excel Center location at the Ivy Tech Hamilton County Campus.

Sheridan statement on offensive parade entry

The town of Sheridan released the following statement Tuesday evening after receiving complaints about a entry that appeared in the town's Fourth of July parade. The entry contained unflattering figures of President Barack Obama, with many calling the entry racist.

On behalf of the town of Sheridan, I am deeply appalled by the blatantly disrespectful and racist display that took place during the Lion's Club Fourth of July parade in Sheridan yesterday. Such an act is not representative of the town of Sheridan, the town's elected officials, or the residents of our community. Our town, community, and county have always striven to be open and inclusive to

all regardless of race, religion, sexual orientation, or political affiliation. For decades, the Lions Club has coordinated this parade on behalf of the Sheridan merchants, who fund the parade. Historically, anyone has been allowed to participate in their parade as long as the safety of the public was not put at risk. Registration for the parade was not required; however, entrants had the option to register if they wanted to be considered for one of the many prizes that are part of the event. We have been told that the person who decided to promote his own political agenda by way of his display did not register.

As a community, we are profoundly saddened by the discomfort, anger, and humiliation this individual has caused for so many. It is unfortunate that an event that has always provided so much joy for the community may have to be regulated in the future to require advance registration of participants. The town is willing to work with the Lions Club to ensure that one individual's actions will not overshadow the true, inclusive nature of our community.

Shamrocks girls are improving

After graduating a very strong senior class last season, one would expect this coming season's Westfield girls basketball team to be mostly new faces, right?

Not necessarily. There are seven Shamrocks players that are returning to next year's program. A few new schools have been added to Westfield's schedule for next season. The Shamrocks will play at Greenwood on Nov. 26, then host Bishop Chatard on Jan. 3 for their first game of 2017. Another new opponent is Tech, which will play Westfield at The Rock on Jan. 25.

Wimmer approves of 6A football bye week change

Add Fishers football coach Rick Wimmer to the list of coaches who approve of the IHSAA's moving of the Class 6A state tournament bye week.

Beginning with this season, the bye week will take place between the final regular season game and the sectional semi-finals, meaning that all 32 6A teams will get a week off.

"I think it is a very good move and one that most coaches were in favor of from the beginning," said Wimmer. "A bye week following the final regular season game lines up with most schools' fall break so attendance at that first round playoff game has traditionally not been very good. I also like the idea of all sectional, regional, and semi-state championships being aligned all the way through the tournament which they were not when there was no bye week until after the Semi-state in 6A.

"Also a team now will not have to worry so much about who they play in that final regular season game. Now 6A coaches know their players will have a week off before the tournament begins and the concern about playing a tough physical opponent in that last game is somewhat reduced.

"I am very glad to see this move by the IHSAA."

The IHSAA Executive Committee voted to move the bye week in Class 6A football to the week following the last game of the regular season, or Week 9. The bye week had previously been the week after the semi-state championship, so only the two teams competing for the 6A state title got the week off. Now, all 32 teams in the biggest class get a week to recuperate from the regular season and prepare for the tournament.
