

> Coy was charged with six felonies that include one count of Aggravated Battery (which created a substantial risk of death), two counts of Attempted Aggravated Battery, Attempted Arson, Battery Involving Injury to a Public Safety Officer, and Resisting Law Enforcement. Coy was also charged with misdemeanor Criminal Mischief.

Garst was treated for his injuries and released from the hospital. Coy was booked into the Hamilton County Jail.

First phase of Mill Street work underway

Work is underway on the first phase of Mill Street reconstruction in downtown Westfield.

The first phase consists of constructing a three-sided box culvert, as well as extending Mill Street south past Park Street to connect to Union Street. The creation of this culvert will mitigate flooding issues in the downtown.

The second phase will improve the intersection of Mill and Park streets. A 10-day road closure will be required to complete this work, which will likely occur early fall.

The final phase will consist of reconstructing Mill Street. The project is estimated to be completed by the end of

The Mill Street project is a major step forward in the creation of the Grand Junction Park and Plaza, which will provide a downtown hub for Westfield.

Those inducted into the Hall of Fame are individuals in the sports medicine community who have contributed immensely and set themselves apart from others in the field. Sixty-six North American and international individuals have been named to the Hall of Fame since 2001.

Shelbourne began his orthopedic sports medicine career in 1982. He graduated from Wabash College in 1972, where he was a first team Academic All-American as a football player and he received an NCAA post-graduate scholarship for wrestling. He completed medical school and his orthopedic residency at Indiana University School of Medicine from 1972 through 1981. Shelbourne obtained additional training during a sports medicine University of Wisconsin in 1981-82.

Shelbourne served as the team physician for the Indianapolis Colts from 1984-

lege and area high schools since 1982. He Sports University School of Medicine at Indiathe American Journal of Sports Medicine and serves as a reviewer for many other orthopedic journals.

Shelbourne became interested in sports medicine when he tore his anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) while playing football in college. He knew when he began his practice that he wanted to concentrate on the treatment, rehabilitation and research of ACL injuries. Since the beginning of his practice, he established a research department and prospective database for continually recording and evaluating his outcomes after surgery. He has performed more than 6,500 ACL reconstructions, and the follow-up he has obtained on these patients has allowed him to identify problems with treatment and the factors associated with optimum long-term outcomes.

Shelbourne is best known for his adfellowship with Dr. William Clancy at the vancement of ACL rehabilitation, pioneering the contralateral ACL reconstruction

The 28-year-old Evans is a six-year veteran who was with Utah his first five ages of 13.8 points and 5.5 rebounds per seasons and the Mavericks last season. He has career averages of 3.5 points and 2.6 rebounds and was the 2012 NBA Slam Dunk champion. The 6-9, 200-pound Evans played collegiately at Western Kentucky and was the 55th overall pick (second round) by Utah in the 2007 NBA Draft.

> "Jeremy is big and athletic," said Bird. "We're anxious to get him here to put him through our strength and conditioning program. We know he'll be a good fit with the players we have."
