

# Home of the **Millers:** the old armory

spirit flooding the state this summer, in Sunday's Hamilton County Reporter we are publishing an article on Noblesville Schools, written by Noblesville Daily Ledger Reporter Anne Auwaerter in the

Sept. 29 100th anniversary of the paper.

Part of Anne's article has to do with Noblesville basketball and why and how Noblesville built its first high school gym. What the article didn't reveal is where the Millers played before they got a gym of their own.

It was the old Noblesville Armory, located on the river on Logan Street in downtown Noblesville.

The armory played a big part in my life. The Jellisons lived on Maple Street, just a couple of blocks away from the armory.

After school, I would go to the armory and watch the Millers practice.

Times when the Armory was closed or the Millers weren't practicing, I would sneak into a side door and do my own practicing (off the court) on the north side of the gym. A sign over a door was my "basket." I think armory officials knew I was there, but didn't kick me out.

Donald Trump, the presumptive Republican nominee for president, is reportedly making another campaign stop in Hamilton County.

WTHR reported Friday evening that Trump will be conducting a rally at Grand Park in Westfield. Later on, Fox 59 reported that Rex Early, Trump's Indiana campaign chairman, told the Indianapolis Star that the rally would begin around 7:30 p.m.

All this comes amid the speculation that Trump will choose Indiana Governor Mike Pence as his vice-presidential running mate. A decision must be made soon, as the Republican National Convention begins on July 18, while Pence must withdraw his name from the ballot for re-election as Governor by July 15 if he is indeed chosen as Trump's running mate.

Same thing for games. Not only did the Millers play there, so did other county schools.....Carmel, Fishers, Walnut Grove, Westfield and Jackson Central, on occasions. Even the sectional was played there. I watched most of those games, again through my side door entry.

Sheridan didn't play there. Larry Hobbs didn't play anywhere except Hobbs Hall.

I have lots of memories of the armory, first as a kid on Maple Street and then as a sports reporter for The Ledger.

One of my most cherished memories was the night in 1950 when football and track and field coaching legend Bill Mc-Clain took over in mid-season for (football coach) Forest Park as the school's basketball coach.

"Page didn't like to lose and he just went off and quit," McClain told me in an article I did several years ago. "The team wasn't very good; we won only two games."

The next year Page went to Florida for a football coaching position and McClain became the head man for the Millers.

But on that night he was to coach the basketball Millers for the first time, at the armory, McClain's auto was hit by a train on Logan Street at the intersection of Logan and 8th.

"I was thinking about what I was going to tell the kids, and suddenly my car was on the train's cow catcher and we were moving down 8<sup>th</sup> Street. I never saw the darn thing coming," McClain told me.

Good news was McClain still coached that evening. Bad news was the Millers lost.
