

Feds inject new wrinkle....

## Train museum hopeful Fairtrain can still run

this year? That remains an open question following Monday night's meeting of the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority, owner of the Nickel Plate Railroad. The Transportation Museum of Noblesville is hopeful, but not certain after federal railroad authorities threw a "new wrinkle" into the whole matter of use of the railroad, says Jeff Kehler, president of the museum.

The port authority is willing to give its approval from a tourist operator to a "short haul passenger service." Will the popular Fairtrain be running to the State Fair for Fairtrain and other excursion trains if museum officials This could result in delays that would very possibly meet conditions of a new "policy of use" adopted recently. Kehler says his organization can meet those conditions and will submit required documentation shortly. The port authority has a consultant who will essentially give about safety issues and business practices from former approval when satisfied that all conditions are met.

But, in the meantime the Federal Railway Administration is considering changing the museum's classification

keep Fairtrain from running August 5 when the State Fair opens.

The whole problem began in March when complaints museum volunteers caused the port authority to stop the

railroad's only user from operating their trains on the rail line which runs for 37 miles from Indianapolis to Tipton through Fishers, Noblesville, Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta.

The port authority board said it wants to be satisfied the train museum will operate safely when running the Fairtrain and other excursion trains this year. The complaints of safety violations and poor business practices were leveled by seven men who volunteered at the museum but have since been discharged from service.

The complaints went to the Federal Railway Administration early this year. On June 13 the train museum president, Jeff Kehler, issued an open letter to interested parties in which he announced that the federal authorities found no problems with the operation.

The museum, operating from Forest Park facilities, has been restoring and operating historic rail stock for nearly 50 years. The operation is considered a major tourist attraction for Hamilton County with several excursion outings each year.

The Nickel Plate line was built in 1851 and originally was the economic life blood of central Hamilton County. Noblesville and the other communities served by the railroad expanded along the tracks in the second half of the 19th century. With modern highways the railroad declined by the 1960s and was due to be abandoned by the 1990s when Noblesville, Fishers and county government stepped in to form the port authority and preserve the line.

## Trump speaks in Westfield

Presumptive Republican presidential nominee Donald Trump made his way to Westfield Tuesday evening, where he spoke to a packed house at the new Grand Park Events Center for about an hour.

Trump spoke for about an hour. He addressed many of his core issues, including trade and immigration. He specifically mentioned Carrier's decision to move 2100 jobs from Indianapolis to Mexico.

Trump was introduced by Indiana Governor Mike Pence, about whom there has been much speculation over the past week. Pence is reportedly on the short list for Trump's vice-presidential candidates; some were seeing this as an audition of sorts for the VP job. Some were expecting an announcement at this rally due to the timing and the location, but it turns out a decision on the vice presidential nominee will come by Friday. Others considered on the short list include New Jersey Governor Chris Newt Gingrich.

Kurtis Tishner, Dalton Tishner, Roger Prickett and Tom Ivie; and several great & great-great grandchildren.




## Report: Roman steps down as Carmel baseball coach


