

### Heights Project Vision...

## Future focused for 21st Century education

Corporation's Project Vision is a multi-

faceted plan created in 2012 to ensure the school corporation remains a sustainable, high quality educational institution. While this plan has officially coined "Project Vision," Heights has long been forwardfocused in its approach to meeting the

ever-changing needs of its students and raising the academic bar. Its facilities, curriculum, technology, educators, support staff and programs collectively provide students with "21st century skills" to thrive in today's highly competitive workforce and increasingly global economy.

While peering into the future is not an exact science, Heights has had a knack at having success in forecasting what is needed to support education now and 5, 10, and 20 years down the road – especially in the area of facilities. Dr. Derek Arrowood, Hamilton Heights School Corporation Superintendent, says it has been the leadership and vision of past and present school board members, administrators, educators, support staff and the community who have helped the district to successfully meet the many challenges and changes that are inherent in the field of education including risings costs, state mandates, funding, technology, facilities, maintenance and student enrollment among a few."

Project Vision is a well thought out long-term plan that has been years in the making to help the district get the best use and improvement of facilities to support education in 2024 and beyond without increasing tax rates. It involved input from district personnel, community and focus groups. It relied heavily on factual data (past, present and future), analysis, trends and studies at the local, state and national level. The information gathered was designed to help district personnel make informed decisions on the most efficient and effective use of space, programs and services within Heights' four buildings and the costs of doing so.

In addition, state of the Art High School Science Labs, a High School Chiller Replacement, two new soccer fields, and enhanced athletic turf were completed in 2015. Additionally, estimates were calculated to determine how each scenario would financially impact instructional programs supported by the General Fund now and well into the future., "The primary impetus for this project is provide data that allows us to make informed decisions that drive money into the classroom while not over investing or under investing in facilities," said Associate Superintendent, Peggy Jackson, who has been an integral component of Project Vision since its inception.

#### DAR sets Guinness World record...

## Horseshoe Prairie Chapter helps collect 100,904 letters to military personnel in one month

To celebrate the National Society's 125th Anniversary and the culmination of the Celebrate America! volunteer service initiative, the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) channeled its fervor for patriotism and dedicated support of our nation's military service members toward an ambitious goal. During the week of the 125th Continental Congress, held in June at DAR's Washington, D.C., headquarters, the organization set an official GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS(TM) title in patriotism for "most letters to military personnel collected in one month."

DAR members possess an unwavering patriotic devotion that spans the organization's 125-year history. During the past three years alone, Daughters have devoted more than 2.2 million hours of service to veterans, honored more than 288,000 Vietnam War veterans, and donated more than \$250,000 in support of active duty service members and their families. The GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS(TM) attempt served as a test: Could the membership exceed its already high standards of support for our military?

Achieving this ambitious goal required the National Society to collect and then mail at least 10,000 letters to active-duty service members. As dictated by the GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS(TM) guidelines, all letters had to be handwritten, addressed to an active duty service member, placed inside a stamped, unsealed envelope, and delivered in person to one of the designated stations set up at DAR Headquarters. A DAR representative brought the chapter's letters to Washington, D.C., and hand-delivered them to a collection station. Letters of appreciation filled more and more boxes as the week progressed, and an official GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS(TM) adjudicator arrived to conduct the verification process.

The carefully tallied total was revealed at the National Defense Night ceremony on Saturday, June 18, 2016. As thousands in attendance waited to learn the outcome of the attempt, members surprised them by carrying in box after box to give a visual representation of how many letters were submitted. The adjudicator took the stage to announce the results using a number tally on the big screen. Cheers increased as soon as the number topped 10,000, but then the audience, including the night's special guests, Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert McDonald and the USO President and CEO, Dr. J.D. Crouch, all went wild when the tally surpassed 100,000. The DAR had collected 100,904 letters, more than 10 times the minimum threshold needed to set the record for most letters to military personnel collected in one month!

"Congratulations—you are officially amazing!" the adjudicator proclaimed.

This record-setting achievement provides the latest measure of the collective force of the DAR's appreciation for the United States Military, while simultaneously fostering human connection between the American people and those who defend our freedom. As devoted stewards of the legacy of the Revolutionary War generation, Daughters feel equally compelled to express appreciation for the valor, sacrifice and commitment of today's active-duty service members. Each letter represents the support of a grateful nation, and Horseshoe Prairie Chapter is humbled by the opportunity to assist in collecting these missives to the defenders of our country.

By the end of June, all 100,904 letters were on the way to active-duty military personnel serving both at home and abroad. May their handwritten messages of gratitude and encouragement cheer the spirits of those who have raised their right hand and sworn to defend and protect the United States of America.



Milestone Contractors plans to continue patching existing northbound pavement north of Campus Parkway Exit 210. # Fishers Tigers are busy

Following a 7-4 season, there are lots of holes in the skilled positions to fill in the Fishers football program this summer.

Zach Eaton, who threw for over 1,600 yards, graduated. So did leading rushers Jeremy Chinn and Jermaine Huddleston and leading receiver Kade Orris.

Also gone are defensive standouts. Defensive aces such as Zeke Dunnuck and Michael Folta. Count Chinn in that group.

Those, and others, are key positions Coach Rick Wimmer started the summer season searching to fill.

It has been a busy summer for the Tigers. "We have been lifting and speed and agility sessions three days per week," Wimmer said as summer winds down and fall football is just around the corner.

"We have completed eight of our 12 days of padded practices," the coach added.

"We are having no football drills this week, only lifting, speed and conditioning work "

Next week Fishers will have its final four padded practices when hosting its own team camp

"We will continue our strength work in the mornings for three days.

We will give our players a battery of eight physical tests on Monday, July 25," said Wimmer. "Following that testing they will have the rest of the week off before beginning practice on August 1."




