Terror attacks in Nice delay announcement...

Pence reportedly will be Trump's VP pick

to the national ticket means an abdication from the gover-

Multiple news sources have said that Indiana Governor Mike Pence will run as the vice-presidential candidate to Donald Trump, the presumptive Republican nominee. An official announcement was to be made this morning at 11 a.m. in New York City, but Trump postponed the announcement after Thursday's terrorist attack in Nice, be. Other names that had been speculated were New Jersey

Pence has been a source of speculation as a possible VP pick for the past few weeks, and the buzz increased exponentially after he introduced Trump at his rally in Westfield

It appears that a Hoosier will be a vice-presidential Tuesday night. Pence has been a mainstay in the Indiana nominee for the first time in 28 years, and his ascendency political world since the turn of the century, having served as a Congressman from 2001-2013, then being elected Governor in 2012. He began his term as Governor on Jan. 14, 2013, and had been in the process of running for re-election. If Pence is indeed named as Trump's VP candidate, he must withdraw from the Governor's race due to Indiana law - and he must do so by noon today.

Trump has not given any hints as to his nominee will Governor Chris Christie, and former Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich.

Pence would be 8th Hoosier nominee

Assuming Gov. Mike Pence is nominated for vice president, he will be the eighth Hoosier to run for the nation's second highest office. Only New York has had more vice presidents and VP nominees.

In the period between the Civil War and World War Indiana was considered an important swing state and both political parties felt it helpful to have an Indiana candidate on the ticket.

Five Hoosiers were successful in being elected to the vice presidency. They include Dan Quayle, Republican

Trump announced he would delay the vice-presidential nominee announcement Thursday evening due to the terrible terrorist attack in France.

The French were celebrating Bastille Day, their national holiday, and a crowd had gathered at the Promenade des Anglais, a well-known beach road that overlooks the Mediterranean Sea, to watch fireworks. The attack began when a man drove a 19-ton truck over a mile into the crowd while firing a gun.

Police eventually shot the man and killed him, but not before he had killed 84 people and injured 18 others. In a report by Agence France Presse, the French national news service, French President Françoise Hollande said the attack was of a "undeniable terrorist nature."

France has now endured three attacks over the past 18 months. On Jan. 17, 2015, 17 people were killed in a series of coordinated shootings in the Île-de-France region, including Paris. On Nov. 13, another coordinated set of attacks claimed 130 lives in






University's 2015-16 boys basketball season was one for the history books.


