



Brainard for Congress?

Susan Brooks files for governor in wake of Pence selection for VP

Susan Brooks, two-term member of Congress and Hamilton County resident, announced yesterday that she will seek the Republican nomination for governor. In a companion development Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard is rumored to be interested in taking Brooks' Congressional seat

In a day of dramatic political news, Hamilton County figures greatly in a potential political 'domino effect' following Gov. Mike Pence's selection as Donald Trump's vice presidential running mate. Pence gave up his bid for re-election as governor which brings about the need for a new GOP candidate for the state's highest office.

Rep. Brooks stepped forward Friday afternoon and withdrew her candidacy for re-election to Congress. This in turn leaves open the 5th District Congressional seat which reportedly Brainard may seek. And, to complete the the position of mayor of Carmel.



Indiana politics to be sure. The Democrat's Senate candidate Baron Hill dropped out to make room for Evan Bayh to run for another Senate term, and of course Mike Pence is no longer running for gover-

nor, but for Vice President - meaning that the Republicans must nominate a new candidate. Both of these decisions will have broad implications for both this election and the political landscape beyond. Let's take a look at some of the consequences.

First off it promises that the U.S. Senate race will be very competitive. Evan Bayh, although perceived as popular has spent his time since he left the Senate as a lobbyist in Washington, leaving the Republican candidate Todd Young with plenty of ammunition in a state that already leans Republican. Still, Bayh has wide name recognition and is threatening to not only win an election in Indiana but shift control in the Senate over to the Democrats. This makes the stakes especially high for Todd Young and his team, something that they are taking very seriously. For those that enjoy watching politics as the competitive sport it is, this is the race to watch.

Chip and seal operation begins Monday on State Road 38

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will have lane closures on State Road 38 beginning on or after Monday, July 18, weather permitting. S.R.38 will be chip and sealed from Kirklin to Sheridan. Motorists are encouraged to seek an alternate route.

Depending on weather conditions, crews will be on site from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day. Work is expected to last through Wednesday, July 27.

INDOT crews will be applying a chip-seal treatment to preserve and protect just over eight miles of S.R. 38. Loose stone will be on the highway temporarily during the initial cure of the asphalt. Motorists are encouraged to seek an alternate route. Drivers are urged to slow down and allow additional space between vehicles to prevent stone chips from damaging windshields or paint on auto bodies.

Once the chip seal has cured, crews will sweep the highway to clear away loose stone and apply a light application of dark asphalt material to lock in remaining stone and minimize dust.

About Chip-Seal Projects

After years of heavy traffic and winter freeze-thaw cycles, small cracks develop in our highways. If left untreated, moisture seeps into these cracks and form potholes when the water freezes and expands. As the name implies, a chip-seal treatment seals off the cracks. The stone chips provide improved traction for stopping, especially during winter.

During 2015, INDOT employees used more than 86,000 tons of crushed stone and 17,000 tons of liquid asphalt - a total of \$12.7 million in operational resources - to apply the seal-coat to more than 1,200 lane miles of state roads. INDOT estimates that using in-house crews instead of contracting the work saved taxpayers nearly \$8 million. National research has shown that every \$1 used to preserve our pavements saves \$6 to \$14 in future, more disruptive repairs.

On the Governor's race, John Gregg, the Democrat's candidate has run his campaign almost entirely on attacking Pence. Now that Pence is out he will have to write a brand new playbook as we move closer to November. His team is hoping that the addition of Evan Bayh will boost his numbers. They certainly can't count too much on that as Hoosiers have demonstrated that they are very willing to vote for candidates from either party, reelecting Mitch Daniels by over 57 percent the same year our state voted for Barack Obama. Moving forward, Gregg will have to adapt his campaign and fast if he's going to have a shot at winning.

The process for the Republicans to nominate a new governor to fill the vacancy is mostly straightforward. A committee of 22 party leaders will vote within the next 30 days on who the new nominee will be. The candidates that have filed are Rep. Todd Rokita (IN-4), Rep. Susan Brooks (IN-5) and Lt. Governor Eric Holcomb. This in turn has local politicians scrambling as they ponder their own congressional runs for potentially open seats in the 4th and 5th districts

All three Republican candidates for governor are likely to easily triumph over John Gregg, meaning that the decision of 22 party leaders will almost certainly dictate the next 4 and possibly 8 years of Indiana's future. The party leaders who will vote are: Jeff Cardwell - State Committee Chairman, Misty Dees Hollis - State Committee Vice-Chairman, Barb McClellan -State Committee Secretary, Dan Dumezich - State Committee Treasurer, Chuck Williams - District 1 Chair, Rebecca Holwerda - District 1 Vice-Chair, Dan Fleming -District 2 Chair, Nick Barbknecht – District 2 Vice-Chair, Barbara Krisher – District 3 Chair, Bill Davis - District 3 Vice-Chair, Craig Dunn - District 4 Chair, Barbara Knochel - District 4 Vice-Chair, Kyle Hupfer – District 5 Chair, Judy Buck – District 5 Vice-Chair, Mark Wynn - District 6 Chair, Ginger Bradford - District 6 Vice-Chair, Jennifer Ping - District 7 Chair, Mike McQuillen – District 7 Vice-Chair, C. Richard Martin - District 8 Chair, Brenda Goff - District 8 Vice-Chair, Jamey Noel -District 9 Chair, Beth Boyce - District 9 Vice-Chair.

Logan Street Sanctuary hosting NICE **Creativity Workshop July 23-24**

Logan Street Sanctuary is inviting everyone to its NICE Creativity Workshop! It's just a week and a half until we gather at Logan Street Sanctuary to brainstorm about great works of literature, and we want YOUR creative ideas!

NICE stands for Noblesville Interdisciplinary Creativity Expo. It is a signature event at Logan Street Sanctuary, but participants need not live in Noblesville to contribute their art. We are delighted when people from out of town are involved, as long as they or someone they delegate can be present at our main event to show off their art.

The event centers around four quotes from classic pieces of literature; and the organizers want to hear voices from a range of authors. The works this year are Macbeth, Rebecca, Alice in Wonderland, and Wynema: Child of the Forest. Wynema is not as well-known but it's the first novel written by a women of Native American descent (in the late 1800s). For the annual NICE event, artists of ANY medium (music, painting, cake decorating, textiles, poets, writers, dancers, ANY medium) create works of art inspired by these quotes, or the works as a whole. The idea is to use the quote(s) as an entry point to explore great works of literature through art.

The NICE main presentation will be in the Fall, Sept 30-Oct 1. This is when artists present or display their finished works. The workshop on July 23-24 is so artists can begin to prepare their works. It is a 2-day workshop (4 hours Saturday, 3 hours Sunday), but it is not required anyone attend both days.

Day 1 will focus on the quotes by themselves. Day 2 will focus on the quotes in context of the work as a whole.

Download and mail in the registration form (payment can be made by check or via the secure Square Market). Workshop attendance is \$15 per person, or \$10 each if registered as a group of four or more.






