“Unique” county 4-H Fair begins on Thursday

Hamilton County's uniquely non-commercialized fair opens tomorrow. Don't look for a carnival or amusement rides, it's a genuinely 4-H county fair and it's been pretty successful just that way for nearly a century. And, it may be the last non-commercialized such county fairs in the state.

The facilities on East Pleasant Street at Clover Road are also among the best of Indiana county fairgrounds. As usual, admission, exhibits and parking are all free. Official opening day is tomorrow. The fair runs through Monday followed by the livestock auction on Tuesday.

The fair features numerous open events for folks of all ages as well as the large variety of 4-H events and shows. Animals, livestock, foods, clothing, crafts, tractors, horticulture, dancing and a talent show are a few of the annual fair highlights.

While the county is increasingly considered to be suburban in nature, the products and livestock from the substantial rural areas serve to demonstrate Hamilton County still has an agricultural base. But, as the population has

Holiday Inn Express almost done, Hampton Inn just beginning

As one hotel construction project in Hamilton County is about to finish up, another one is just beginning.

Visitors to the restaurants in the Saxony Division, near Exit 210 at Interstate 69, probably have seen the finishing touches being put on the new Holiday Inn Express, which is located at 13625 Tegler Drive (just west of Olio Road). The Holiday Inn Express will have 123 rooms, with the Indianapolis Business Journal reporting that it will open in the fall.

Meanwhile, construction has started on the Hampton Inn by Hilton in Westfield. The Hampton Inn will have 93 rooms, and such luxuries as an outdoor patio with a fire pit, and an indoor swimming pool.

The Hampton Inn is located on Westfield Park Road, which has become a bustling commercial area over the past couple of years. The two reasons: The opening of Grand Park and the upgrade of the interchange at U.S. 31 and State Road 32.

Grand Park itself will likely contribute to another hotel coming up in Westfield, as the IBJ reported that the long-awaited groundbreaking on the Cambria Suites is hoping to take place in the fall.

Longtime residents remember the various gas stations and fast food places at that busy intersection, but they were all torn down to construct the new single-point ur-

The Speedway is now also located at that new intersection, with a Ricker's joining the mix as well. Construction is also almost complete on a new Jimmy John's sandwich restaurant, which is across the street from what will be the new Hampton Inn.

ban interchange at SR 32, and the upgrade of U.S. 31 to a limited-access freeway. The McDonalds, Taco Bell and Speedway stations located at the intersection simply moved west to the intersection of SR 32 and Westfield Park Road, and they are now joined by a Dairy Queen and a Bub's Burgers.

Overnight ramp closures this week at Meridian Street/I-465

During overnight hours this week, crews will install asphalt surface on the ramps at Meridian Street to/from I-465. This work is expected to take place between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. and the following ramps will be closed:

Wednesday, July 20: Westbound I-465 ramp to southbound Meridian Street

Thursday, July 21: Eastbound I-465 ramp to southbound Meridian Street

Friday, July 22: Eastbound I-465 ramp to northbound US 31

A message board will alert motorists of these closures and will direct them to use the next available exit.

Starting Monday, crews shifted traffic on northbound US 31 between 151st and 161st streets to the outside of the roadway to smooth pavement on bridge approaches. Two thru lanes and one ramp lane will remain open on northbound US 31, and the southbound lanes will not be impacted.

At times, crews will need to restrict traffic to one northbound thru lane between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. In an effort to keep crews safe (as some work will not be behind traditional barrier wall), the speed limit between 151st and 161st streets is reduced to 45 mph until this work is completed in late August.

Western Amateur Championship to again feature elite international field

The Western Amateur will once again feature one of the strongest fields in amateur golf when 156 contestants from around the world tee off next month at Knollwood Club in Lake Forest, Illinois.

Headlining this year’s field is Cal sophomore and Pac-12 Freshman of the Year Collin Morikawa, USC Trojan and 2015 U.S. Amateur semifinalist Sean Crocker of Westlake Village, California, and Florida sophomore Sam Horsfield of Davenport, Florida, who was recently named the 2016 Phil Mickelson Outstanding Freshman of the Year.

Horsfield is one of six players in this year’s field to qualify for and play in the 2016 U.S. Open at Oakmont Country Club near Pittsburgh. That list also includes 2014 Western Amateur semifinalist Nick Hardy of Northbrook, Illinois, 2014 Sweet 16 qualifier Scottie Scheffler of Dallas, Texas, as well as Sam Burns, Christopher Crawford and Justin Suh.

In total, nine players who will compete next month for a place in Western Amateur history have played in at least one or more major championship within the last two years.

The field also features defending champion Dawson Armstrong of Brentwood, Tennessee, who will attempt to become the first player since Justin Leonard to win back-to-back Western Amateur titles. Armstrong is coming off a sophomore season at Lipscomb University in which he won two events, notched nine top-10 finishes, garnered all-region honors and was named Atlantic Sun Player of the Year.

“The depth of our field is what has made the Western Amateur one of the most prestigious amateur golf championships in the world for more than a century,” said Vince Pellegrino, Senior Vice president of Tournaments for the Western Golf Association, which has conducted the event since 1899. “We are excited to see how this group of decorated collegiate players, top-tier international competitors and promising juniors perform on the classic design at Knollwood.”

Local players of note include Hardy, Texas junior Doug Ghim of Arlington Heights, Illinois, Miami University junior Patrick Flavin of Highwood, Illinois, and Tee-k Kelly of Wheaton, Illinois, who recently graduated from Ohio State.

Returning are six of last year’s Sweet Sixteen qualifiers, including Armstrong, Horsfield Gavin Hall, Zionsville's Adam Wood, Harrison Endycott and John Coultas.

They will be joined by top-ranked juniors Wilson Furr, future Florida Gator Andy Zhang, UCLA commit Spencer Soosman and Rice freshman Trevor Brown, who finished runner-up at the 2016 Western Junior last month.

The Western Amateur again features a strong international contingent with 20 nations, including the United States, represented in this year’s field. Argentina, Australia, Canada, China, Chile, Colombia, England, Italy, India, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, Singapore, South Africa, South Korea, Sweden, Thailand, Venezuela

and Wales all have at least one player seeking to become the first international player to win the Western Amateur since New Zealand's Danny Lee bested the field in 2008.

The Western Amateur features one of the deepest and strongest fields in amateur golf, as well as the game's most grueling format. It is the world's third oldest amateur championship behind the British Amateur (1885) and the U.S. Amateur (1895), and typically attracts players from more than 30 states and more than a dozen countries.

The 114th Western Amateur will bring with it golf's rich traditions symbolized most dramatically by its who's-who of past champions, including major champions Jack Nicklaus, Ben Crenshaw, Curtis Strange, Phil Mickelson, Justin Leonard and Tiger Woods. The impressive list of runners up and stroke play medalists includes Ben Curtis, Jay Haas, Tom Kite, Rocco Mediate, Gil Morgan, Mark O'Meara, Camilo Villegas and Tom Watson. The legendary Bobby Jones won stroke play in 1920.

PGA TOUR superstars Jordan Spieth, Bubba Watson, Rickie Fowler, Adam Scott, Dustin Johnson and 2014 BMW Championship winner and FedExCup champion Billy Horschel all competed in the Western Amateur.

THE FORMAT

A combination of stroke play and match play competition, the Western Amateur can be the most demanding event in professional or amateur golf.

The Western Amateur champion must play 72 holes of stroke play and finish in the top 16 to qualify for match play. He then must win four matches over two days, meaning that over a five-day period he would have played approximately 144 holes, depending on whether his matches went into extra holes or ended early.

Competition includes 18-hole stroke play rounds on Tuesday and Wednesday followed by a cut to the players with the low 44 scores and ties. Those who make the cut play 36 holes of stroke play on Thursday, with the low 16 – known as the "Sweet 16" - advancing to match play on Friday. On Friday, two 18-hole matches narrow the field to four semifinalists, and on Saturday, the remaining four players compete in the morning semifinal matches. The two survivors face off in the final 18-hole championship match in the afternoon.

Qualifying for the Western Amateur's "Sweet 16" match play competition is one of the treasured accomplishments each year among the world's top-ranked amateurs.
