"Unique" county 4-H Fair begins on Thursday

Hamilton County's uniquely non-commercialized fair opens tomorrow. Don't look for a carnival or amusement rides, it's a genuinely 4-H county fair and it's

been pretty successful just that way for nearly a century. And, it may be the last non-commercialized such county fairs in the state. The facilities on East Pleasant

Street at Clover Road are also among the best of Indiana county fairgrounds. As usual, admission, exhibits and parking are all free. Official

opening day is tomorrow. The fair runs through Monday followed by the livestock auction on Tuesday.

The fair features numerous open events for folks of all ages as well as the large variety of 4-H events and shows. Animals, livestock, foods, clothing, crafts, tractors, horticulture, dancing and a talent show are a few of the annual fair highlights.

While the county is increasingly considered to be suburban in nature, the products and livestock from the substantial rural areas serve to demonstrate Hamilton County still has an agricultural base. But, as the population has

Holiday Inn Express almost done, Hampton Inn just beginning

As one hotel construction project in Hamilton County is about to finish up, another one is just beginning.

Visitors to the restaurants in the Saxony Division, near Exit 210 at Interstate 69, probably have seen the finishing touches being put on the new Holiday Inn Express, which is located at 13625 Tegler Drive (just west of Olio Road). The Holiday Inn Express will have 123 rooms, with the Indianapolis Business Journal reporting that it will open in the fall.

Meanwhile, construction has started on the Hampton Inn by Hilton in Westfield. The Hampton Inn will have 93 rooms, and such luxuries as an outdoor patio with a fire pit, and an indoor swimming pool.

The Hampton Inn is located on Westfield Park Road, which has become a bustling commercial area over the past couple of years. The two reasons: The opening of Grand Park and the upgrade of the interchange at U.S. 31 and State Road 32.

Grand Park itself will likely contribute to another hotel coming up in Westfield, as the IBJ reported that the long-awaited groundbreaking on the Cambria Suites is hoping to take place in the fall.

Rock Island gas odor release seeped into Hamilton County

Hamilton County experienced an usually large number of Fire/EMS runs Tuesday morning as a result of a gas odor in the area.

The odor apparently originated from Marion County. Hamilton County Emergency Management had conversations with Citizens Gas in Marion County, and as it turned out one of Citizen's industrial customers released a chemical containing an odorant smelling similar to natural gas.

The chemical is called Mercaptan, the odor added to natural gas. It came from the Rock Island Plant on 96th Street. Mercaptan is not dangerous. It is added to natural gas due to natural gas having no odor in its natural state.

Residents were still urged to ventilate their homes as they deemed necessary. Persons also could experience headaches or nausea if exposed to large doses; if that happened, they were urged to seek medical attention and get into fresh air.

The odor slowly made its way out of the county as the day went on.



A memorial service will be held at a later date. Warren's family has entrusted Randall and Roberts Funeral Homes in Noblesville with his care.




Carmel Police looking for LA Fitness theft suspect

Carmel Police are looking for a man who allegedly stole a credit card from L.A. Fitness Monday afternoon.



Overnight ramp closures this week at Meridian Street/I-465

During overnight hours this week, crews will install and 6 a.m. and the following ramps will be closed:

Wednesday, July 20: Westbound I-465 ramp to southbound Meridian Street

Thursday, July 21: Eastbound I-465 ramp to southbound Meridian Street

Friday, July 22: Eastbound I-465 ramp to northbound

A message board will alert motorists of these closures and will direct them to use the next available exit.

Starting Monday, crews shifted traffic on northbound asphalt surface on the ramps at Meridian Street to/from US 31 between 151st and 161st streets to the outside of the I-465. This work is expected to take place between 9 p.m. roadway to smooth pavement on bridge approaches. Two thru lanes and one ramp lane will remain open on northbound US 31, and the southbound lanes will not be impact-

> At times, crews will need to restrict traffic to one northbound thru lane between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. In an effort to keep crews safe (as some work will not be behind traditional barrier wall), the speed limit between 151st and 161st streets is reduced to 45 mph until this work is completed in late August.

A combination of stroke play and match play competition, the Western Amateur can be the most demanding event in professional or amateur golf.

The Western Amateur champion must play 72 holes of stroke play and finish in the top 16 to qualify for match play. He then must win four matches over two days, meaning that over a five-day period he would have played approximately 144 holes, depending on whether his matches went into extra holes or ended early.

Competition includes 18-hole stroke play rounds on Tuesday and Wednesday followed by a cut to the players with the low 44 scores and ties. Those who make the cut play 36 holes of stroke play on Thursday, with the low 16 – known as the "Sweet 16" - advancing to match play on Friday. On Friday, two 18-hole matches narrow the field to four semifinalists, and on Saturday, the remaining four players compete in the morning semifinal matches. The two survivors face off in the final 18hole championship match in the afternoon.

Qualifying for the Western Amateur's "Sweet 16" match play competition is one PGA TOUR superstars Jordan Spieth, of the treasured accomplishments each year among the world's top-ranked amateurs.
