Noblesville Schools begins process to relocate transportation center

Noblesville Schools announced on Wednesday that they have started the process of relocating their transportation center from its current location on Field Drive near Noblesville High School to a new facility that would be constructed on Hague Road adjacent to West Middle School. The effort kicked off with a public project and preliminary determination hearing that was held as part of the school board meeting on July 19, 2016.

“Our current transportation center was built in 1978 when Noblesville Schools was a much smaller district and doesn’t provide the space we need today,” said Beth Niedermeyer, superintendent of Noblesville Schools. “The new facility will provide us appropriate space for our bus fleet, maintenance bays, office management, driver parking and storage.”

The Hague Road location was chosen because of its central location for bus routes, its infrastructure design and its cost savings

because the district already owns the land. The location next to West Middle School will also help address the parking shortage at that school, providing West event visitors additional parking options. The design was crafted with the community in mind, incorporating a maximum set-back off the road and landscaping buffers.

Construction for the project is expected to begin this winter, with the new facility opening in the summer of 2017. The expected \$12 million budget will be

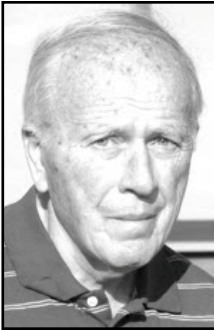
financed through construction bonds, with no increased tax burden for residents and no referendum dollars being spent on the project. The district is also exploring the use of solar panel charging stations at the facility as a green initiative that could lower long term energy costs.

Noblesville Police Department announces promotions and appointment

On June 15, Noblesville Police Chief Kevin Jowitt petitioned the Police Merit Commission to consider three promotions within the Noblesville Police Department. Sergeant Eric Cunningham was recommended for promotion to the rank of lieutenant and Master Patrolmen Jamie Aloisio and Brad Purvis were recommended for promotion to the rank of sergeant. The Commission subsequently voted to approve the recommendations during their regularly scheduled monthly meeting. All three promotions became effective on July 18. Additionally, Chief Jowitt recently appointed Lt. Jon Williams to the rank of captain.

Prior to being hired by the Noblesville Police Department, Capt. Williams attended Indiana University and was a member of the Indiana University Police Department. He was hired by the NPD in January of 1996. Prior to his recent appointment, Capt. Williams served as the agency’s training coordinator. Capt. Williams will now serve as a deputy chief overseeing the agency’s Patrol Division.

Prior to being hired by the Noblesville Police Department, Lt. Cunningham served in the U.S. Army and served in Kuwait/Iraq. He was hired by the NPD in January of 2006. Since being hired, he has been assigned to patrol duties in the Patrol Division. Prior to his recent promotion, Lt. Cunningham served as a field supervisor. Lt. Cunningham will now serve as a shift commander in the Patrol Division. Prior to being hired by the Noblesville Police Department, Sgt. Aloisio attended Indiana State University. He was hired by the NPD in January of 2005. Since being hired, he has been assigned to patrol duties in the Patrol Division. In addition to patrol duties, Sgt. Aloisio is also a member of the Field Training Unit. Sgt. Aloisio will now serve as a field supervisor assigned to the Patrol Division.

Prior to being hired by the Noblesville Police Department, Sgt. Purvis attended Indiana University and was a member of the Indiana University Police Department. He was hired by the NPD in November of 2005. Since being hired, he has been assigned to patrol duties in the Patrol Division. In addition to patrol duties, Sgt. The Indiana State Police Capitol Police Section is now accepting applications. This website will provide a detailed synopsis of the application process as well as information on additional career opportunities with the Indiana State Police Department.

Applications must be received via e-mail by **11:59 pm (EDT), on August 21, 2016**. Applications received after the deadline will **not** be accepted.

Basic Eligibility Requirements and consideration factors for a Capitol Police Officer:

1. Must be a United States citizen.
2. Must be at least 21 years of age when appointed as a police employee. (Appointment date is **February 17, 2017**)
3. Must meet a minimum vision standard (corrected or uncorrected) of 20/50 acuity in each eye and 20/50 distant binocular acuity in both eyes.
4. Must possess a valid driver's license to operate an automobile
5. Must be a high school graduate as evidenced by a diploma or general equivalency diploma (GED).

The starting salary for a Capitol Police Section Probationary Officer is \$35,598.00 a year. The Indiana State Police Capitol Police Section also offers an excellent health care plan, which includes medical, dental, vision and pharmacy coverage for both current and retired employees, along with their families. The State maintains short-term and long-term disability plans for full time employees after six months of continuous employment. As an Indiana State Police Capitol Police Officer, you are automatically enrolled in the Public Employees Retirement Fund (PERF). The State will contribute to your retirement account.

Being a teenager today is much more complicated than it was 20 years ago. Prior to the advent of the Internet and digital cameras, a compromising or thoughtless provocative photograph could only be viewed by person to person sharing. But equally as important as prosecuting child sex crime perpetrators is educating the public about these crimes and how to prevent them in the first place. To do this, the Indiana State Police’s very own Sgt. Chris Cecil has recently been featured on the Be A Kids Hero blog site, operated by Ginger Kadlec, of Zionsville, Indiana.

Sgt. Cecil is a 12 year veteran of the Indiana State Police assigned to Special Investigations – Cyber Crimes. He has been featured on the Be A Kids Hero blog and podcast providing helpful information for parents on how to protect their children from being victimized by Internet criminals. Now, to help get this information to a wider audience and educate even more parents, the Indiana State Police is sharing this information about the Be A Kids Hero blog site.

The below information was prepared by Ginger Kadlec and has been included with this state police news release to promote child safety through education of parents and their teenage children.
