First time in 25 years...

FairTrain won't be running

For the first time in 25 years there will be no FairTrain when the State Fair opens tomorrow.

As recently as a week ago officials of the Indiana Transportation Museum had felt they could run the popular train service. But, yesterday it was learned that demands made by the rail track owner, Hoosier Heritage Port Authority, could not be met in time for the fair.

Transportation Museum president Jeff Kehler said his organization will continue to work to meet safety demands which he said exceed those of the Federal Railway Administration. If successful, trains may be on the tracks by the end of the month to allow a schedule of excursion trains to proceed. He did not reveal the exact corrections on which the port authority wants to have proof of compliance.

The port authority adopted new regulations earlier this year for users of the railroad after former volunteers at the museum made claims of safety shortcomings and certain business practices. The transportation museum is the rail line's only customer, and as a result there have been no trains on the tracks since March.

The FairTrain is considered a tourist attraction for Noblesville, Fishers and the other communities through which it runs. The railroad is the former Nickel Plate line which extends from Indianapolis to Tipton, and was saved from abandonment more than 20 years ago when city officials of

Noblesville and Fishers along with county officials formed the port authority to take ownership in the belief that it could be used as a tourism attraction and possibly even a route for commuter rapid transit.

Director of County Tourism Brenda Myers expressed disappointment over the timing of the problem. "The Indiana Transportation Museum's programs consistently rate among the top items of interest that visitors search for when planning a trip to Hamilton County. They are an important part of our tourism product offerings," Myers said.

The FairTrain which began in 1983 on the old Monon line is also a big source of revenue for the museum which maintains a collection of historic rail stock in Forest Park. The train to the State Fair began running on the Nickel Plate about 1990 after the Monon was abandoned. The tourism bureau is also trying to establish a Nickel Plate arts district along the rail line which runs in 8th Street through downtown Noblesville.

**Tips
Walk Safety**

- Never run into the street; when you come to the curb, STOP; then look both ways. Never run between cars into the street.
- Be sure to cross the street at a marked cross walk or where the crossing guard is. Only walk when the signal flashes the walk sign or when a crossing guard says it's okay.
- Walk on the sidewalk, not in the street.
- Wear clothing that allows drivers and people to see you. That means no dark clothes after dark or early in the morning. If you have to be out in the dark, be sure to put reflective tape on your coat.
- Don't talk to strangers, take anything from them, or go anywhere with them.
- If a stranger approaches you, RUN! Scream! Tell an adult.

- Never take a short cut through the woods or alleys.
- Walk to school with a partner.
- If you see a gun or drugs, stop. Don't touch it. Tell an adult!

Bus Stop Safety

- Always walk to the bus stop. Never run.
- Walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left facing traffic.
- Always go to the bus stop about five minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive.
- While at the bus stop, wait in a safe place away from the road. Do not run and play while waiting.
- Never speak to strangers at the bus stop and never get into

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Statement by the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority

On March 24, 2016, the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority (HHPA) called an emergency meeting of the Board of Directors and suspended the operations of the Indiana Transportation Museum (ITM) until further notice, due to concerns raised by former volunteers of the ITM in a letter addressed to the Indiana Attorney General's Office. In the following months the HHPA has investigated the safety related portions of those concerns and on July 11th at the HHPA Boards regularly scheduled quarterly meeting, approved a Revised Policy of Use issued to ITM that laid out thirteen items that were required of ITM to gain reinstatement of use privileges. Unfortunately, as of today, the HHPA has informed ITM that the suspension cannot be lifted at this time, due to non-compliance with several of the items listed in the HHPA's Revised Policy of Use. These thirteen items were deemed critical by the HHPA for safe travel of trains, passengers and users of the roadway system in Marion and Hamilton

Counties that cross the Nickel Plate tracks at numerous locations.

HHPA will continue to work with ITM in the hopes that all thirteen items are later received and approved by the HHPA. In addition, the HHPA will be working closely with the ITM to ensure necessary repairs to the track are made that are also critical to safe and efficient travel of ITM's tourist railroad operations. This suspension was an extremely difficult decision for all involved, and not taken lightly, as the Fair Train and all the excursions provided by ITM are not only important to our communities that own and oversee the Nickel Plate line, but are truly unique treasures that make our communities such great places to live and work. However, at no time will the HHPA compromise on the Policy of Use items that the HHPA has determined are the minimum standards that must be upheld to ensure the safety and welfare of all the citizens of our communities and the public in general.

Native trees available from County SWCD

The Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District is holding its annual fall native tree sale.

This is a great opportunity to obtain hearty yet inexpensive native trees and shrubs that beautify neighborhoods, provide habitat for wildlife, and enhance communities. This year 37 varieties of native trees and shrubs are available. Claire Lane, Urban Conservationist at the Hamilton County SWCD shared that "over the last three years the popularity of this program has expanded and we sold over 450 trees last year. This is great because these trees enhance the beauty of our neighborhoods and provide a lot of environmental benefit that we all gain from. Plus, the tree sale is the District's largest fundraiser - profits help implement even more conservation practices across the county and reach more people."

Trees provide many environmental benefits to society. Everything from providing oxygen to energy conservation, cooling shade to wildlife habitat, but they also help society in other ways. They increase property values and have even been shown to help build a sense of community in neighborhoods and increase shopping traffic in business areas. This tree sale focuses on species native to Indiana. Native species are those that have been growing in Indiana

since before English settlement. These types of trees are uniquely suited to our soils and weather but most importantly, they are uniquely suited to support our wildlife- especially birds, insects, and other pollinators.

All trees are \$25 apiece and will arrive in three-gallon containers and be approximately 3-5 feet tall at delivery. Order forms can be found online and are due Sept. 3. Trees can be picked up Friday, Sept. 9 from 2 to 6 p.m. at the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds llama barn. New this year, online ordering and payment is available at www.hamiltonswcd.org.

Another tree event offered by Hamilton County is the Distinguished Tree Program. This Parks and Recreation program recognizes a tree that is unusually large for its species and maybe the largest one of its kind within the county. A tree also may be recognized if it has historical significance.

If your tree is listed as a Distinguished Tree you will receive a certificate that states it is on the list. Winning trees may also be nominated for the statewide "Big Tree Program" through the Indiana Department of Natural Resources and the "National Register of Big Trees" through American Forests. the car with a stranger. Always go straight home and tell you parents if a stranger tries to talk to you or pick you up.

- Wait for the bus to arrive, watch for red flashing lights and the stop sign to be extended, and cross only when all traffic has stopped. Look left, right, and left again before crossing.

Home Safety

- Teach children not to let anyone know they are home alone. They should never answer the door for strangers.
- Be sure your kids know how to dial 9-1-1 and report a problem. Know their name, address, and phone number.
- Make sure kids have a list of mom and dad's work and cell phone numbers and at least one other adult they can call in case of an emergency.
- Explain how to lock and unlock all the doors and windows so that no one can get in and so they can leave if necessary.
- Teach your kids to pay attention to the way things look. If something doesn't look right (such as a broken front door), tell them not to go inside, but to go to a safe place and ask for help.

Drive Safety

- Follow the Speed Limit – Slow down! All schools have reduced speed zones around them. Following the speed limit reduces the chances of you being in a crash and improves the chances for survival if a crash does occur.
- Allow More Time. As a new school year begins allow yourself more time to get where you are going until you can figure out the effects of increased traffic.
- Stay Alert! Make a mental note of any new/existing bus stops or students walking to and from school. This way you won't be surprised and will be prepared if you need to stop.
- Learn the Rules. Schools usually have places for parents to drop off and pick up children. If you are driving your child to school, learn where these areas are and follow the procedures
- Stop for School Buses. It is against the law to pass a school bus when the lights are on except when on a divided highway.
- Yield to Pedestrians. Remember to yield to children/parents in crosswalks. When a pedestrian is in a crosswalk they have the

right-of-way.

- Buses Make Frequent Stops. Children may unexpectedly run into traffic or out from the bus. When a bus stops, assume children are in the immediate area and be especially attentive.

Remember: Slow Down. Stay Alert!
