Interstate 69 construction update

Here's an update on the construction taking place on Interstate 69:

Patching & paving

Milestone Contractors is patching existing southbound pavement north of Campus Parkway Exit 210. The patching operation is expected to be complete this week.

About 15 miles of interstate is being repaired before a new asphalt overlay is paved on existing lanes. Paving on northbound I-69 north of Exit 210 is scheduled to begin tonight.

Weather permitting, patching and paving operations require alternating lane closures in various locations six nights a week on Monday through Saturday nights from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. One lane of I-69 will remain open at all times, and two lanes will remain open during peak daytime travel times.

The speed limit through the work zone is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present. Speed detection and LED display signs have been installed in the work zone to alert motorists driving at unsafe speeds. Indiana State Police are patrolling the work zone to promote public safety and compliance with traffic laws.

Milestone Contractors has set temporary concrete barrier along the I-69 median between State Road 37 (Exit 205) and Campus Parkway (Exit 210) to begin construction of an additional lane in each direction.

Motorists should be alert for trucks entering and exiting the roadway. Signs direct large trucks to use the left lane through the shifted section of interstate. The speed limit is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present.





Boudia ready to defend his gold medal...

Summer Olympics begin in Rio

The 2016 Summer Olympics are underway in Rio de Janeiro, and two Hamilton County men will be competing.

Everyone is familiar with the first name: David Boudia. The Noblesville diver is competing in his third Olympics, and will be attempting to defend his gold medal in the 10-meter platform. Boudia finished first at June's U.S. Olympic Trials in Indianapolis.

The second-place finisher at the Trials is from Hamilton County as well. Steele Johnson of Carmel placed second in the 10-meter platform, thus giving final competitions of the Olympics, with the preliminaries at 4 p.m. Eastern Time Friday, Aug. 19 and the semi-finals (at 10 a.m.) and finals (at 4:30 p.m.) the next day.

But first, Boudia and Johnson will be teaming up for the 10-meter synchronized event. The two were winners in at the Trials, and that gives Johnson his first Olympic opportunity. Boudia won a bronze in the synchronized platform

The finals in the synchronized platform take place Monday afternoon at 3 p.m. Eastern time. Local coverage of the Olympics is on WTHR-13, with live streaming available at www.nbcolympics.com.

Prime time coverage on NBC (which begins at 8 p.m.) for Saturday will him a spot on the Olympic team. The 10-meter platform event is one of the feature gymnastics, swimming and beach volleyball. The U.S. Women's Soccer team will play France at 3:45 p.m. on NBCSN (NBC Sports Network). Basketball fans can tune to NBCSN to see the U.S. Men's National Team take on China at 5:45 p.m.

The Millers are ranked 12th in the pre-season poll by IndianaRunner.com, the well-respected cross country/track and field website.

"This is certainly a potential state meet team, but the path couldn't be any more difficult," said NHS coach Kent Graham. As usual, the Millers will have to contend with such powerhouses as Carmel, Hamilton Southeastern, Fishers and Westfield in their sectional and beyond.

Noblesville does have the experience to compete with these schools. Senior Eric Hoffman made it to state as an individual last season, finishing in 16:43, and had a nice track season, with a 9:36 in the 3200 run.

Two other seniors that should make an impact are Levi Neuzerling, part of the Millers' state finalist 4x800 relay team, and Clay Obergfell, who Graham said "is currently rebounding from an injury plagued junior season and is looking strong."

Another key runner is junior Zachary Freeman, who ran last year's sectional in 16:36 and was part of Noblesville's regional squad that finished seventh. Sophomore Justin Amburgy ran 16:40 in the regional as a freshman, and also had a solid track season. Several other runners have the potential to make an impact, including seniors Will Anderson and AJ Snyder, juniors Truman Angel, Luke Balciunas, Nash Calvin and Jack Commeville, and sophomores Braedon Gossard and Blake Hipkiss.


