In Nov. 8 election...

Six candidates declare for school board

After more than a week in the filing period for school board only six candidates have declared their intentions to run in the November 8 election.

Voters will choose a total of 14 school board members this year throughout Hamilton County's six school districts. Candidates have until noon on August 26 to file

their candidacy petitions with the county elections office.

Thus far three candidates have filed for the three at-large seats on the Noblesville board. They are Gary Duvall, Carl Johnson IV and Donna Clark.

In the Hamilton Heights district the lone candidate so far is Laura Reuter in the White River Twp. district. No one has yet filed in the Jackson Twp. district.

At Hamilton Southeastern, Howard Stevenson has filed from the Fall Creek Twp. district, and no candidates have declared from the Delaware or Wayne Township districts.

And in Westfield Washington, Alan Ford running in District 3 is thus far the only candidate.

There have been no candidates yet filed for two at-large seats at stake in the Carmel

Clay district and no candidates at Sheridan where there are two seats up this year from Marion Twp.

School board members elected on a non-partisan ballot this fall, will take their seats January 1, 2017 for four year terms. Most local school boards have five members, the exception being Southeastern with seven.

Interstate 69 construction update

Here’s an update on the construction taking place on Interstate 69:

Patching & paving

Milestone Contractors is patching existing southbound pavement north of Campus Parkway Exit 210. The patching operation is expected to be complete this week.

About 15 miles of interstate is being repaired before a new asphalt overlay is paved on existing lanes. Paving on northbound I-69 north of Exit 210 is scheduled to begin tonight.

Weather permitting, patching and paving operations require alternating lane closures in various locations six nights a week on Monday through Saturday nights from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. One lane of I-69 will remain open at all times, and two lanes will remain open during peak daytime travel times.

The speed limit through the work zone is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present. Speed detection and LED display signs have been installed in the work zone to alert motorists driving at unsafe speeds. Indiana State Police are patrolling the work zone to promote public safety and compliance with traffic laws.

Added travel lane

Milestone Contractors has set temporary concrete barrier along the I-69 median between State Road 37 (Exit 205) and Campus Parkway (Exit 210) to begin construction of an additional lane in each direction.

Northbound lanes have been shifted toward the right shoulder, and southbound traffic lanes are scheduled to be moved toward the right shoulder next week. This

will require single-lane closures between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m.

Motorists should be alert for trucks entering and exiting the roadway. Signs direct large trucks to use the left lane through the shifted section of interstate. The speed limit is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present.

Campus/Southeastern Parkway Exit 210

Construction of the new double-cross-over diamond configuration is underway as Milestone builds up the new interchange ramps and widens the Campus Parkway bridge over I-69.

Campus Parkway traffic lanes are narrowed to 11 feet and installation of concrete barrier is scheduled for next week.

Motorists should be alert for workers in the area and trucks entering and exiting the roadway.

Later this summer, traffic will be shifted into a double-crossover diamond configuration, which is intended to improve traffic flow during the remainder of construction of the permanent interchange improvements.

Hamilton County Sheriff's Office seeks CALEA re-accreditation

A team of assessors from the Commission of Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA) will arrive Aug. 14, 2016 to examine all aspects of the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office. Areas to be examined include policy and procedures, management, operations, and support services. The Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office must comply with 188 standards in order to gain re-accreditation status.

As part of the on-site assessment, agency employees and members of the community are invited to offer comments at a public information session at 7 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 15. The session will be conducted at the Hamilton County Judicial Center Commissioner Court Room located at One Hamilton County Square, Noblesville.

Agency employees and members of the community are also invited to offer comments by calling (317) 776-8499 on Monday, August 15, 2016 between the hours of 2 and 4 p.m. Comments will be taken by the assessment team.

Telephone comments as well as appearances at the public information session are limited to 10 minutes and must address the agency’s ability to comply with CALEA standards. Copies of the standards are available at the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office located at 18100 Cumberland Road, Noblesville, IN. Local contact is Tim Garner, and he can be reached at 317-773-1872.

Anyone wishing to submit written comments about the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office’s ability to comply with the standards for accreditation may send them to the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement, Inc. (CALEA), 13575 Heathcote Boulevard, Suite 320 Gainesville, Virginia, 20155

The assessment team is composed of law enforcement practitioners from similar but out-of-state agencies. The assessors will review written materials, interview individuals, observe procedures, and visit offices and places where compliance can be witnessed. The assessors are: Chief Phillip S.

Kasten, current Chief of Police for the Town of Hartford, Vermont and Ms. Nora Ackerley who works as the Accreditation Manager, Grants Administrator, Police Planner, Policy Writer, and producer of the department’s annual report at the Bartlett, Illinois Police Department. Once the commission’s assessors complete their review of the agency, they report back to the full commission which will then decide if the re-accreditation will be granted.

The accreditation period will change from a three year to a four year process upon completion of this re-accreditation. The new process will require the agency to submit annual reports attesting the continued compliance with standards under which it was initially accredited. This is the second re-accreditation process for the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office. Accreditation was first obtained in November 2010.






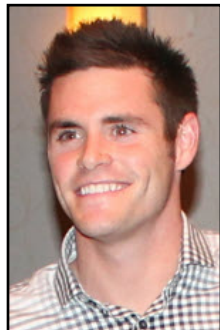

Boudia ready to defend his gold medal...

Summer Olympics begin in Rio

The 2016 Summer Olympics are underway in Rio de Janeiro, and two Hamilton County men will be competing. Everyone is familiar with the first name: David Boudia. The Noblesville diver is competing in his third Olympics, and will be attempting to defend his gold medal in the 10-meter platform. Boudia finished first at June's U.S. Olympic Trials in Indianapolis. The second-place finisher at the Trials is from Hamilton County as well. Steele Johnson of Carmel placed second in the 10-meter platform, thus giving him a spot on the Olympic team. The 10-meter platform event is one of the final competitions of the Olympics, with the preliminaries at 4 p.m. Eastern Time Friday, Aug. 19 and the semi-finals (at 10 a.m.) and finals (at 4:30 p.m.) the next day.

But first, Boudia and Johnson will be teaming up for the 10-meter synchronized event. The two were winners in at the Trials, and that gives Johnson his first Olympic opportunity. Boudia won a bronze in the synchronized platform in 2012. The finals in the synchronized platform take place Monday afternoon at 3 p.m. Eastern time. Local coverage of the Olympics is on WTHR-13, with live streaming available at www.nbcolympics.com. Prime time coverage on NBC (which begins at 8 p.m.) for Saturday will feature gymnastics, swimming and beach volleyball. The U.S. Women's Soccer team will play France at 3:45 p.m. on NBCSN (NBC Sports Network). Basketball fans can tune to NBCSN to see the U.S. Men's National Team take on China at 5:45 p.m.
