Rep. Brooks is back on the Fifth District ballot

It's not often that a candidate must be nominated twice for the same election, but Congresswoman Susan Brooks (R-Indiana) ran and won her second nomination in a Fifth District caucus yesterday. She had been nominated in the May primary, then withdrew earlier this summer to seek nomination for governor after Gov. Mike Pence was named Donald Trump's running mate.
Since she was unsuccessful, finishing a close second to Eric Hol-

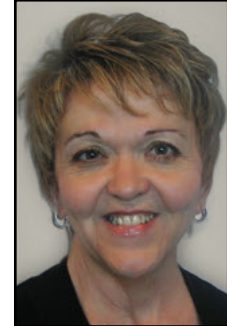


comb, she had to be re-nominated for Congress. Rep. Brooks, a Carmel resident, won easily Saturday afternoon in the Republican caucus held at Noblesville's IVY Tech auditorium. Her opponents were scheduled to be Hamilton County residents, Stephen MacKinsey from Fishers and Cynthia Sweet of Cicero, but Ms. Sweet dropped out before the meeting.
Precinct committeemen from throughout the sprawling Fifth District met in the 3 p.m. gathering. For the first time in recent memory the caucus was open to the news media. Hamilton County with 218 precincts had by far the largest delegation in attendance although not all eligible committeemen attended from any of the counties in the district.

Brooks will be the odds-on favorite to win a third term in Congress in the November 8 general election, not only because she is a popular incumbent, but also due to the fact that the district is heavily Republican. Besides Hamilton County, the 5th District includes portions of Blackford, Grant, Howard, Madison, Marion and Tipton counties.
In speaking at yesterday's gathering of GOP partisans, Brooks thanked the 224 committeemen and others who attended. She thanked her opponent for waging a strong campaign and urged a united effort in this fall's campaign. Her winning vote total was not announced.

Looking back at the county's (many) state championships

Editor's Note: The following article, written by Chuck Godby, appeared in the Sept. 29, 1988 100th anniversary edition of the Noblesville Daily Ledger. It is the first of a series dealing with the early state championship history of Hamilton County teams.

First In A Series

The ultimate achievement in high school athletics – a state championship – has been

a part of Hamilton County athletics since 1913 when Noblesville won the Indiana High School Athletic Association's 10th annual Boys Track & Field Tournament Series.
Through the years, four county schools have won state championship trophies – Carmel, Noblesville, Hamilton Southeastern and Sheridan – in a variety of sports.
Carmel, the county's largest high school, has won the most state championships of the

county's six high schools currently in operation.
Besides football, the Greyhounds have packed their glass-enclosed trophy display cases with state championship team trophies from boys golf, boys basketball, girls swimming, boys and girls cross country, boys tennis, girls golf and boys and girls soccer.

Forest Park Campout to be held overnight Aug. 27

The Noblesville Parks Department invites residents and families to participate in a unique event at Forest Park. The Forest Park Campout on Saturday, Aug. 27 and Sunday, Aug. 28 is perfect way for kids to experience the outdoors and will be the only time camping is allowed this year at the historic park.

“We are trying to get as many people involved as possible that appreciate good old fashioned camping in a tent,” said Alex Wirth, event coordinator.

Families will need to bring a tent, sleeping bags, camping gear and food while the parks department will provide the activities. Families are invited to camp overnight in Forest Park beginning at 3 p.m., August 27 (check out is 1 p.m. August 28). Parks Department staff will be onsite the entire time and will be available to assist with tent setup and other camping issues as well as to help lead outdoor experiences. Also, Disney Pixar’s “The Good Dinosaur” will be shown at Shelter No. 1 at dusk.

“We will be providing activities that will get participants in touch with the outdoors with our nature and photo safaris, leave no trace camping, campfire cooking, bird watching hikes, nature crafts and games. The activities aren’t required but will be provided throughout the weekend so people can come and go as they please,” said Wirth. “These activities are just one way families can create lasting memories of playing outside after dark and gazing at the stars.”

Noblesville, the county’s second largest high school, has won three state championships in the last two years to up the school’s overall total to four.

Besides boys track and field, Noblesville’s Lady Millers have won two straight state championship trophies in girls golf and they were champions in girls basketball two years ago.

Sheridan, the county’s smallest high school, and Hamilton Southeastern have won their state championships on the gridiron.

Sheridan, once a school known primarily for its basketball during the fanned “Hobbs Era” of the 1950s, has evolved the past 12 years as a small-school football power. Since 1980, the Blackhawks have won three state football titles in Class 1A.

Hamilton Southeastern, one of the county’s fastest growing schools, won its only state championship in football in 1981 when the Royals competed in the state’s small-school division.

*Paul Walton scored 15 points to enable Noblesville to win the state track and field championship held at Earlham College. The Millers had 16.5 points to 15.5 points for second place Fairmount.

*Carmel High School captured the 34th annual IHSAA Boys State Golf Championship by squeezing out a one-stroke victory over North Central, the defending state champion. It was the first state golf crown for Carmel.

Carmel’s four man team, coached by Don Huffer, compiled a total of 611 strokes. Team members were John O’Neal, Pete Holm, Russ Craig and Don Currise. O’Neal was third low medalist in the state meet.

1970-71

*Carmel High School became the fifth team in the 35-year history of the boys state golf championship meets to successfully defend its state title. The State Meet was held at the Old Oakland Golf Club.

Huffer’s Greyhounds rolled up a winning score of 613. The team was led by John O’Neal and also included Bill McDaniel, Russell Craig and Steve Norris.



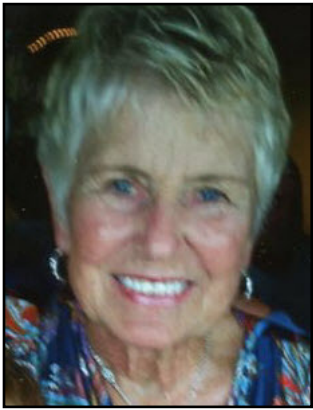

Construction on Carmel Drive/Range Line Road roundabout begins Monday

Motorists who drive through the Carmel Drive and Range Line Road intersection will need to start using their alternate routes, as roundabout construction on that intersection is scheduled to begin within the next 24 hours.

In addition to the roundabout the project also includes utility relocation work, curbs and sidewalks. Street signs near the intersection have said that it will close "on or after" today, although the official date for construction to begin is Monday.

Despite the closure, access to local businesses in the area will remain open throughout the duration of the project.

Below are the official detours for the project:

Carmel Drive: Westbound traffic will be routed north on Keystone Parkway, west on Main Street, south on Guilford and resume travel west on Carmel Drive. Eastbound Carmel Drive traffic will be

routed south on Guilford to 116th Street to then continue east.

Range Line Road: Southbound Range Line Road traffic will be routed east on Main Street, south on Keystone Parkway and west on 116th Street back to Range Line Road. Northbound Range Line traffic will be routed east on 116th Street, north on Keystone Parkway and west on Main Street back to Range Line Road.

Meanwhile, 3rd/4th Avenue SW remains closed between 2nd Street SW and Industrial Drive, as crews are relocating a sanitary sewer in this area to allow a storm water line to move to the Monon trail from Emerson Road towards 3rd Avenue SW.

The road closure began early this week, and is expected to last for another two to three weeks.
