## Hamilton Heights announces school reconfiguration

**Arrowswood**

The Hamilton Heights Board of School Trustees voted to reconfigure the school corporation's current school structure at Thursday night's meeting.

The new grade configuration will house preschool through fourth grade at the new Primary/Elementary School, including an addition of 7,500 square feet for the Little Huskies Learning Center (Primary building). Fifth through eighth grade students will attend the new Middle School (Elementary building), and ninth through 12th graders will be at

the High School. Additionally, the new Middle School will have two spectator gyms and four locker rooms.

The current Middle School will remain in full use until project construction is complete and then demolition of 77,891 square feet of space will take place. The East and West Gyms as well as the Administration area at the current middle school will remain and will be renovated during this process as well.

## Kenny Wright's bold actions got county's park system going

Kenny Wright never got enough credit. Today few folks remember Kenny. But, if you like public parks, you'd like Kenny and thank him for what he started 50 years ago this summer.

While still only a candidate for County Council, Kenny started attending council meetings feeling confident he would be a member after the November 1966 election. During the August meeting he asked council members to consider appropriating some money for parks and recreation.

There was no county park department, but Kenny felt if money was made available, creation of a department would be likely. His argument was simply what we now know so

well: that Hamilton County was starting to grow and developers were buying up choice acreage for housing and business construction at increasing prices.

As a young news reporter, I attended most council meetings and remember thinking Kenny had a big challenge. The council members were mostly older men representing rural areas where parks were not a top priority. But, Kenny was in public relations with the local Firestone plant, and knew how to sell his story.

A few months later with Kenny on the council, a lucky situation developed. A land speculator owned 90 acres at 151st Street and U.S. 31. A gas line ran through the property from southwest to northeast, and a creek ran through north to south. It was largely wooded and looked ideal for a park, but developers showed little interest in the land. A newly formed county park board looked it over and were offered what members felt was a good price.

After some debate, the county purchased the ground and the park system was underway. Today we know the 90 acres as Cool Creek Park. The park system has come a long way since then. From Coxhall Gardens in the southwest to Koteewi Strawtown in the northeast, there are at least a dozen parks in a county system that is considered one of the best in the state, likely the best.

Kenny Wright is gone now. He left the council after probably two terms. He left Firestone and started a weekly newspaper at Fishers, then died way too early. His story came to mind this week when Kenny's name was mentioned in the Reporter's '50 Years Ago' feature.

It would be appropriate for today's park board to name something in Kenny Wright's honor, for without his bold suggestion and power of persuasion, our parks might well not be what they are today.

HHSC superintendent Derek Arrowood made the following comments about the school reconfiguration:

"The HHSC Board of School Trustees is committed to creating the best learning spaces possible for all students and feels strongly that reconfiguration will allow this to happen not just in the near term (likely completion is the 2019-2020 school year) but for years to come. The current middle school was constructed in 1957 for Jackson Central High School students and has served our community well for almost 60 years. The Board believes creating current learning spaces for the learners of 2020 and beyond is imperative to our continued commitment to creating the best possible learning environment for HHSC students. It is also important for the community to know that the HHSC Board is committed to keeping a presence in Arcadia and intends to use the original West Gym and newer East Gym long term for our students.

All costs incurred during this process will result in the Board’s continued commitment to a flat tax rate of \$1.0461, currently the 2<sup>nd</sup> lowest in Hamilton County. The Board is extremely conscious of spending tax payer dollars and has committed long term to a flat tax rate and being the only public school corporation in Hamilton County without a Referendum tax of any kind. The current HHSC Board strives to continue to build upon previous HHSC Boards’ and Administrative Leadership’s long term commitment to spending efficiency.

The Board has worked diligently throughout the summer to inform our community about the potential for reconfiguration. Town meetings were held in Atlanta, Arcadia, Cicero, Walnut Grove, and at Beck’s Hybrids. Representatives of the Board have met with members of the Town Boards of Arcadia, Atlanta, and Cicero to inform them of the potential of this project.

Finally, as great a place as our schools are now for student learning, we believe this process will allow HHSC to serve the students and community in an even better manner. Indiana State Police Trooper Competes in CVSA North American Inspectors Championship

Forty-eight roadside inspectors representing jurisdictions across North America gathered in Indianapolis, Indiana, Aug. 8-12, 2016, to compete in the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance's (CVSA) 24th annual North American Inspectors Championship (NAIC), the only event dedicated to testing, recognizing and awarding commercial motor vehicle inspector excellence.

Each year, CVSA recognizes the best of the best by inviting the top inspector from each jurisdiction throughout North America to participate in NAIC. In addition to the competitive events, each inspector receives training on the latest safety information, technology, standards and inspection procedures.

All of the inspection categories are timed events and the compilation of scores for these categories result in a Grand Champion. The Jimmy K. Ammons Grand Champion Award is the highest NAIC honor for roadside inspectors.

This year, the Grand Champion Award was awarded to Daniel Voelker of the Arizona Department of Public Safety for his combined performances in six competition elements:

- North American Standard Level I Inspection
- North American Standard Level I Inspection Procedure
- North American Standard Hazmat/Transportation of Dangerous Goods Inspection
- North American Standard Cargo Tank/Other Bulk Packagings Inspection
- North American Standard Level V Passenger Vehicle (Motorcoach) Inspection
- North American Standard Out-of-Service Criteria Exam

This is the third year that the Indiana State Police Department has sent the winner of the state competition to the national

championship. Commercial Motor Vehicle Enforcement Master Trooper Jeremy Woods, a Randolph County native and 21 year member of the Indiana State Police, placed 19th in this year's competition and represented the department well. "I thoroughly enjoyed the competition with all of the other representatives from across the North America," stated M/Trp. Woods. "The different levels and types of inspection and written testing modules enhanced my personal inspection procedures which in turn is an asset to the public.

The Indiana State Police has been represented the last two years at the NAIC by M/MCI Charles Lovins in 2014 at Pittsburgh, PA. and M/MCI Melinda Shelton in 2015 at St. Louis. Mo.

"We were very pleased to be the host state for this year's championship event," stated Indiana State Police Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division Commander Major Mike Eslinger. "Master Trooper Woods did a great job during the competition and has continued the tradition of being a great representative of the ISP/CVED.

"The best inspectors throughout North America aspire to compete at NAIC. Many of the competitors here this week are winners of their jurisdiction's inspector's championship or were selected to compete at NAIC as esteemed representatives from their agency," said CVSA President Maj. Jay Thompson with the Arkansas Highway Police. "However, it's important to note that NAIC is much more than a competition. It's an opportunity for training, education and professional growth, and it fosters camaraderie and cooperation among inspectors, jurisdictions and countries."

# Millers play tough in close loss to LN

For the third year in a row, the Noblesville football team opened its season by playing Lawrence North.

It's a series that has developed into a nice little rivalry. On Friday, the Wildcats got the better of the Millers by the score of 21-17, the first time LN has beaten Noblesville after the Millers won the series' first two games.

Despite the loss, head coach Jason Simmons remained upbeat. It really was a game that could've gone either way, there were just a couple of big plays that tipped the outcome in favor of the Wildcats.

"I really thought we played great," said Simmons. "When you look at the game of football, they always say there's four to six plays that decide the outcome. We had one go through our fingertips right at the goal line - we were right there to make it. We fumbled inside the 15, put one on the deck, and then two long runs. Well, there's four plays right there that, either way."

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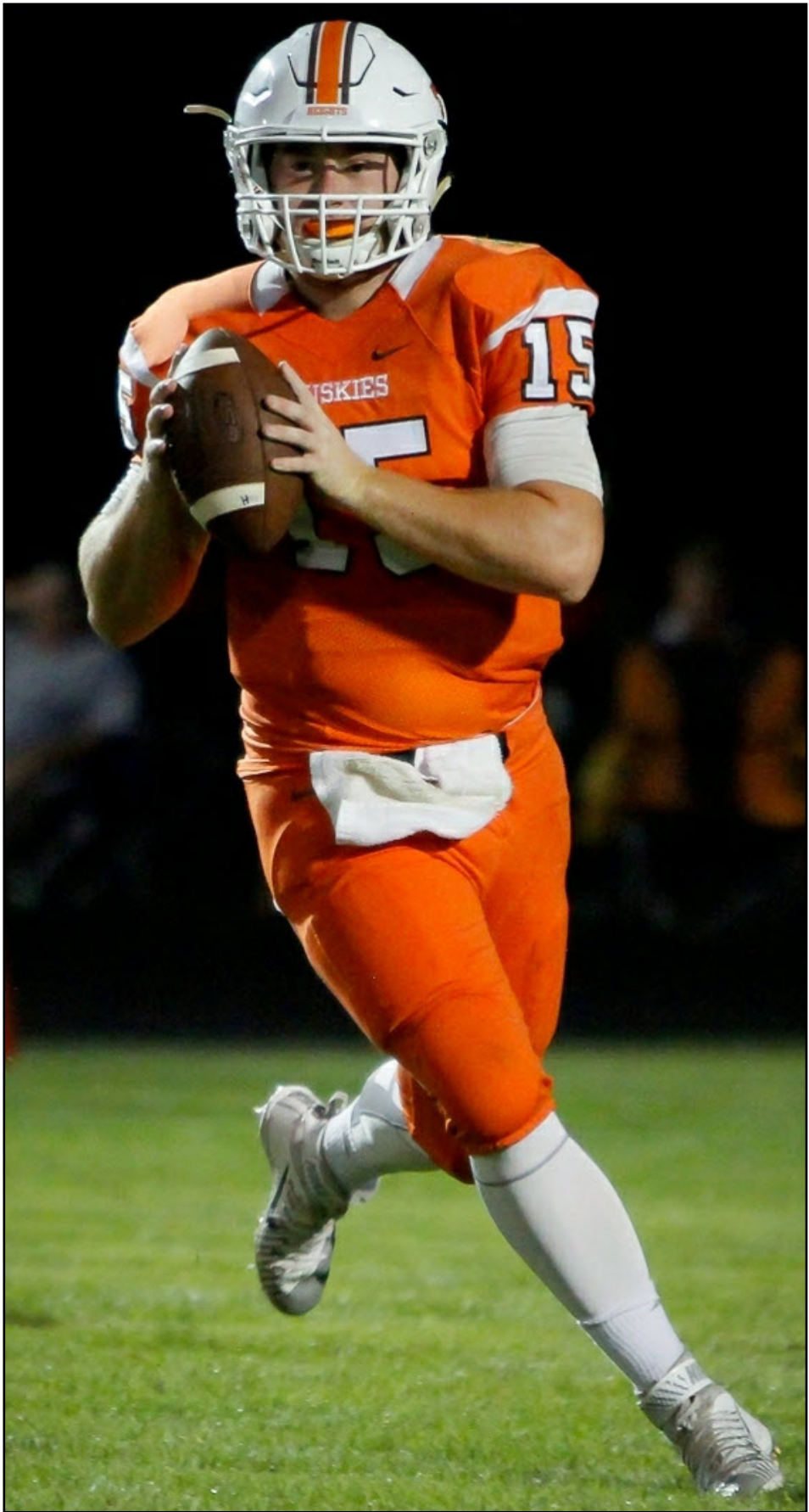
