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

## **Indiana State Police Trooper Competes in CVSA** North American Inspectors Championship

Forty-eight roadside inspectors representing jurisdictions across North America gathered in Indianapolis, Indiana, Aug. 8-12, 2016, to compete in the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance's (CVSA) 24th annual North American Inspectors Championship (NAIC), the only event dedicated to testing, recognizing and awarding commercial motor vehicle inspector excellence.

Each year, CVSA recognizes the best of the best by inviting the top inspector from each jurisdiction throughout North America to participate in NAIC. In addition to the competitive events, each inspector receives training on the latest safety information, technology, standards and inspection procedures.

All of the inspection categories are timed events and the compilation of scores for these categories result in a Grand Champion. The Jimmy K. Ammons Grand Champion Award is the highest NAIC honor for roadside inspectors.

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

For the third year in a row, the Noblesville football team opened its season by playing Lawrence North.



Boudia finished fourth in the preliminary round of the high-diving event, scoring 496.55 points and advancing to today's semi-final round. Great Britain's Tom Daley was first in the prelim with 571.85, followed by two Chinese men, Qiu Bo at 564.75 and Aisan Chen with 545.35.

Meanwhile, Carmel's Steele Johnson also advanced to the semis after placing 18th in the prelims with a score of 403.75. The top 18 advance from the prelims to the semi-finals. Boudia placed 18th in the Beijing prelims four years ago - and he went on to win the gold

Boudia and Johnson won a silver medal in last week's synchronized platform compe-

The semi-finals of the 10-meter platform take place at 10 a.m. today, with the final round at 3:30 p.m. today.
