Hamilton County Humane looking for new home

The Hamilton County Humane Society is looking for a new home. The non-profit organization has outgrown in a facility at 1721 Pleasant Street in Noblesville. The society located there 10 years ago when county commissioners agreed to build

the present animal shelter and the society agreed to care for unwanted animals the county would otherwise have to care for.
The humane society is currently looking for a parcel of about five acres on which to build. Adding onto the present facility is not an option. The shelter took in 3,105 dogs and cats last year, got many of them adopted and presently has 200 in foster care. But, conditions are crowded with cages in the office and hallways.

A fund raising campaign is expected to be started as soon as a location for the new building can be secured. The Pleasant Street shelter was built ten years ago for the humane society which was first organized more than 30 years ago. A spay/neuter clinic is housed in the same building operated by a separate organization and is expected to remain in the building.
Besides offering more space for animal care, a new location will allow the society to offer more flexibility in the care of ani-

mals and programs. The staff is composed of both paid and volunteer members. Forty percent of the funds to run the operation come from individuals. The county and the municipalities contributions along with annual fundraisers account for the rest of the needs.

Animal care and control in the county has come a long way in the past 40 years. At that time the only shelter was a rather

Cicero receives state funding for road improvement projects

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) announced earlier this week that the Town of Cicero is one of the 2016 grant recipients of the Community Crossing Matching Grant. An official announcement of the Town's road projects and check presentation by INDOT to the Town of Cicero will be on Tuesday, August 30 at 9:30 a.m. at the Cicero Town Hall.
The Town of Cicero will receive \$365,397.00 from the INDOT grant program. The Town of Cicero submitted four road improvement projects that totaled \$730,794.00 with half coming from INDOT and the other half coming from the Town's allotment of the Local Option Income Tax that was to be used for roads and streets. Project priority was determined based on a road assessment completed earlier this summer by the Town. Those projects with the higher priority were selected to include in the grant application.
Town Board President, Brett Foster stated, "The Town of Cicero is excited and grateful to have received the INDOT Community Crossing matching grant. The funds from the grant will provide our community an opportunity to complete projects that would have taken nearly five years to be able to have enough funds to complete. We have a great Town staff who worked together in all aspects of completing this grant and we look forward to starting on these projects. A special thanks to our Community Development Specialist Shae Kmicikewycz and our Street and Utilities Director Pat Comer for their hard work on this."

Lt. Governor Eric Holcomb made the announcement that 102 Central Indiana cities, towns, and counties are receiving a combined \$47 million to improve local roads and bridges through the State's Community Crossing matching grant fund. The grant program was created by the General Assembly and signed into law by Governor Mike Pence in March of 2016. Projects that are eligible for funding through the grant include road resurfacing, bridge rehabilitation, road reconstruction, resurfacing, and Americans with Disabilities Act compliance in connection with road projects. Material costs for chip sealing and crack filling operations are also eligible.

Sheridan Rotary hears about waste water issues

The Sheridan Rotary Club hosted an important public meeting at their most recent Tuesday evening meeting. The club invited Sheridan resident Todd Burtron to talk about the recent water utility study commissioned by the Sheridan Town Council. About 25 community members attended.

According to club president Steve Martin there are a lot of rumors going around about this issue and whether or not the town is considering selling off the utility. Burton was closely involved with the completion of this study and because of his background in municipal government operations he is very knowledgeable of this issue here in Sheridan.

Burtron began the meeting with a PowerPoint presentation which included the findings of the study, the impact it will have on current 1200 utility users and options available to the community. The meeting ended with Burtron taking questions from those attending the

Tornadoes strike Howard County

Even a small chance of severe weather can turn into an outbreak of bad thunderstorms.
That was the case Wednesday. Several tornadoes touched down in Central Indiana that evening, with many of them turning their wrath on the Kokomo area. One tornado measured as an EF-3 on the Enhanced Fujita Scale. An EF-3 tornado is estimated to have winds of 136 to 165 mph.
The tornado caused extensive damage in Kokomo, the most dramatic example of which was the collapse of a Starbucks in the Markland Mall, which is located at the intersection of State Roads

22 and 931 (the former US 31). The Starbucks collapsed almost like a deck of folding cards, but miraculously, no one was injured.
Kokomo Schools will be closed today, and late Wednesday evening the Taylor School Corporation, located just east of Kokomo, also canceled classes. Indiana University-Kokomo has canceled classes as well. A state of emergency was in effect for Kokomo until 10:30 p.m. last night.
Another tornado was reported in Crawfordsville, and ruled to be an EF-1, which means it had wind speeds of 86 to 110 mph. The

Semi truck, trailer overturn on I-69

A semi truck and trailer over-turned at the 206 mile marker on northbound Interstate 69 in Fishers Wednesday morning. Just after 11 a.m., the vehicle and trailer over turned onto its side in the ditch. There were no injuries to the driver of the truck. Fishers Firefighters determined batteries in the trailer were leaking and created hazardous circumstances. The leak was contained and there was no concern for the immediate health of anyone in the area. Hamilton County Emergency Management coordinated cleanup efforts, while Garners Wrecker Service managed the vehicle. The Fishers Police Department and Indiana State Police handled the investigation and traffic. The right northbound lane was closed from the time of the accident, and was re-opened Wednesday evening.

From Page 1 tornado warnings persisted well into the evening, and were issued for areas as far east as Delaware County. While Hamilton County saw some brief heavy rains, it was spared the severe weather that took place in Howard County Wednesday. Down in Indianapolis, rains also caused flooding, with one instance reported at Kessler and Binford boulevards on the northeast side. There was a report of hail near 38th Street and Interstate 65 on the city's west side. The Storm Prediction Center had Central Indiana under a Marginal risk of severe weather for Wednesday, which means around a two percent chance. But as many people learned today, "two percent" still means there's a chance. And there's another Marginal risk again today, so even if the possibility is small, everyone should still be aware that the potential for severe weather is there.






Carmel Special Census begins today

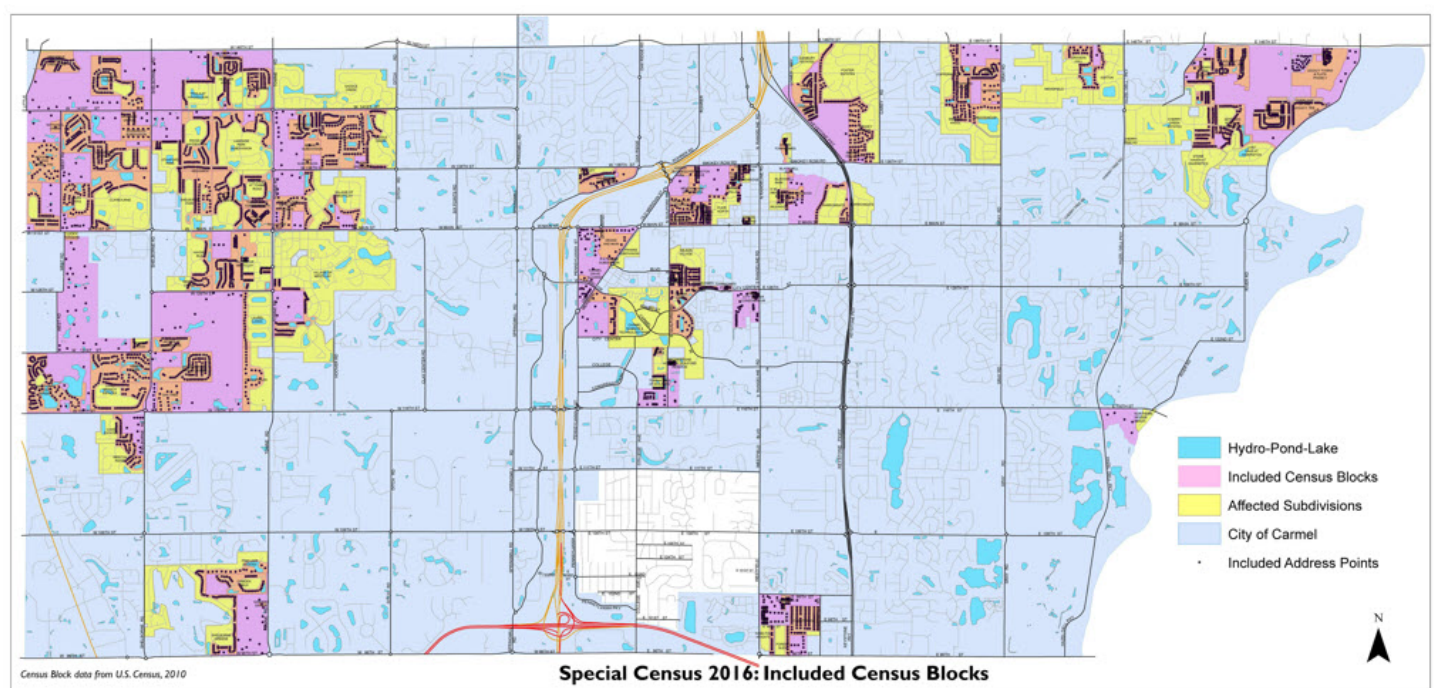
The Special Census for the City of Carmel starts today. The Carmel Special Census office has hired more than 50 people to assist in this process. Special effort was made to hire qualified Carmel citizens first, because they know the neighborhoods and so that residents may see some familiar faces among the enumerators, who are walking door-to-door.

The Special Census will update Carmel's population count and give the City greater access to tax dollars distributed according to population. This could mean as much as \$2.4 million in additional tax revenue for Carmel between now and when Carmel would receive updated revenue amount from the next census. This additional revenue from the state could be used for road projects, infrastructure and other projects that enhance our daily lives.

The census will be conducted by workers who will go door to door, gathering information on seven subjects:

- * Name
- * Household relationship
- * Gender
- * Date of birth
- * Age
- * Hispanic or Latino origin
- * Race

Race and Hispanic origin are asked because individuals of Hispanic origin could be of any race. Answers to both questions



are used to plan, monitor, and fund programs that target certain populations.

If you happen to miss the census worker, they will leave a flier with a toll free number, where you can call in your information. If you do not call in your information the census workers will follow up with a visit several times, in order to get your information. The Census Bureau never releases information that identifies you or your household. These workers should identify themselves as Carmel Special Census workers. They will not need to enter your home for any reason and can only ask questions on the seven subjects above.

"The participation of all Carmel citizens is key to obtaining an accurate population count. Providing truthful information to the Special Census workers will ensure that Carmel taxpayers get more of their tax dollars returned to our community to help keep our district tax rate one of the lowest in Indiana," said Nancy Heck, Director of Community Relations and Economic Development.

NICE event accepting entries from artists

The Logan Street Sanctuary said thank you to those that participated in the NICE (Noblesville Interdisciplinary Creativity Expo) earlier this month.

Now, the Sanctuary is preparing for its second annual NICE event, which takes place Friday, Sept. 30 and Saturday, Oct. 1 at LSS, 1274 Logan St., Noblesville. Participating artists are encouraged to submit as many pieces as they like.

The evening begins with viewing and mingling at 6:30 p.m., with live presentations from 7 to 9 p.m.

While the NICE event is free for participating artists (who are asked to attend both nights), other attendees are encouraged to support Logan Street Sanctuary with a suggested donation of \$12 at the door; \$25 for groups of 4+. This is not an entry fee or ticket price and no one will be turned away if unable to pay, but donations support the venue's efforts to remain open.

Artists may have their created pieces for sale during both nights of the event. Visual artists may sell their NICE

submissions, musicians may sell CDs or T-shirts, authors may sell books. Please do not bring large amounts of merchandise, as space is limited. NICE retains 20 percent of any art sales.

Entry forms must be submitted by Sept. 12; any form postmarked by that date will be accepted. The NICE committee will review submissions from Sept. 13-18, and will email all those artists with accepted entries on Sept. 19, as well as which date they will be presenting.

Any entry that will be displayed (such as paintings or textiles) must be dropped off at Logan Street Sanctuary between 3 and 7 p.m., on Thursday, Sept. 29. Please bring an easel if your work needs one. Performances that need no advance setup may bring all necessary props, instruments, etc the night the artist is scheduled to present. Please arrive no later than 6 p.m. on the night you present so the LSS staff can coordinate last-minute logistics.

The public is offered two nights to come enjoy the artists' work: Friday, Sept. 30 and Saturday, Oct. 1. Both

nights will feature open viewing of artwork from 6:30 to 7 p.m., and timed presentations from 7 to 9 p.m. Please attend both nights if possible. (Logan Street Sanctuary staff can present for you if necessary, but attendees prefer to hear from the artist-participants themselves.)

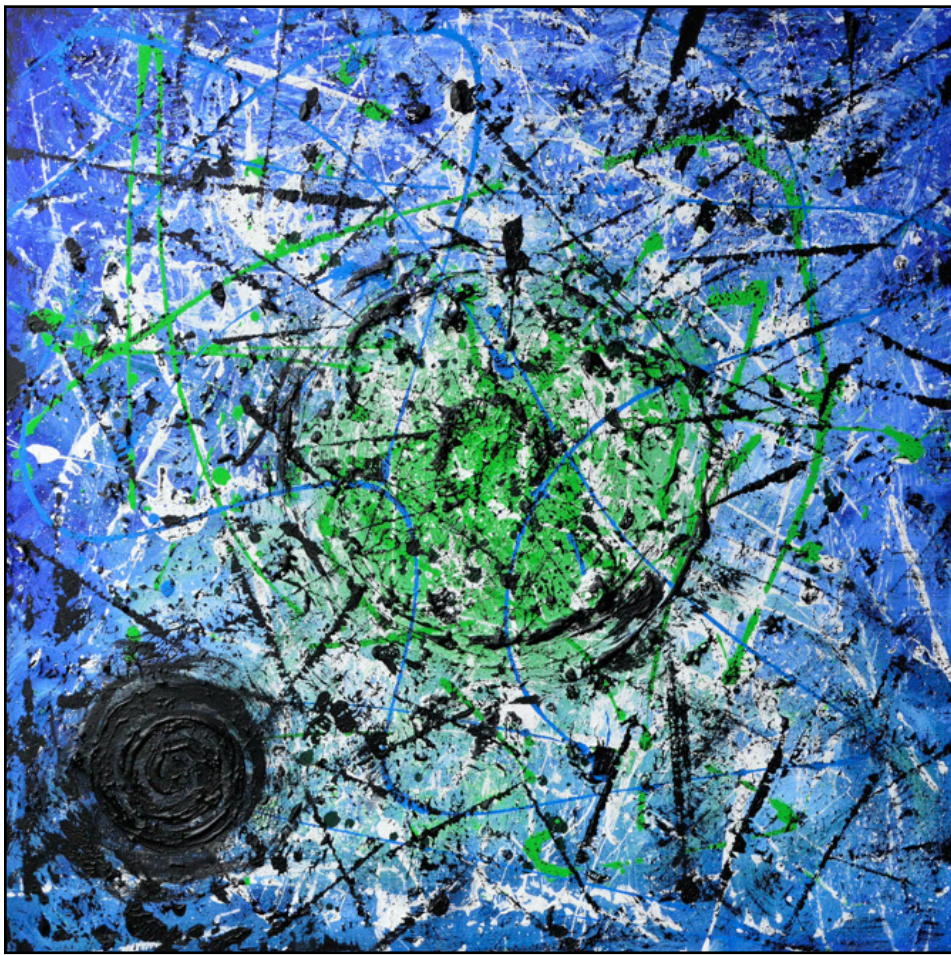
Donations are tax deductible, and the Sanctuary will provide you with a tax-deductible receipt for any donations to LSS.

Noblesville hosts Carmel

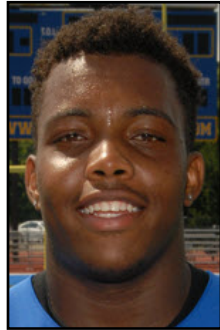

"McGwire Plumer," Simmons continued, "had a highlight reel laying out to haul in around midfield. McGwire showed great leadership and direction for our entire team throughout the night."

"Chase Evans, Jack Knight, Andy Cleverly and Grant Christie performed really well on special teams," Simmons added.

"Our players of the week were Jerome Halsell, Beau Robbins and Jack Van Remortel," said Hebert.

Kokomo will want to sling

If Hamilton Heights is to win its second consecutive game of the season Friday when traveling to new opponent Kokomo, the Huskies' defense may need to accomplish what it didn't achieve in a 34-27 win over Mt. Vernon last week.

Heights will need to stop Kokomo's passing game. Against Mt. Vernon, the Huskies allowed 308 yards through the air.

Kokomo, coming off a great 12-1 season but losing to Chesterton 14-7 in its season opener last week, returns only 5 offensive starters, one of which is its quarterback. Kyle Wade passed for 1,419 yards and 14 touchdowns last season.

"We will have to play much more efficient football on both sides of the ball to give ourselves a chance against Kokomo," said Heights coach Mitch Street.

"Their offense stresses you so much on the defensive end that you have to maximize your possessions offensively. You also have to protect the football.

"Kokomo is very well coached, and they play a brand of physical football. You have to be able to match their physicality and stay discipline to your assignments.

"It will be very tough for us, but we are looking forward to the opportunity to play a very solid football program," said Street.

Last season Kokomo went undefeated during the regular season; won the sectional

with victories over Muncie Central 20-15 and Huntington 57-0; won the 5A regional by beating Westfield 21-19 and then lost to Ft. Wayne Snider 56-20 in the semi-state.

Hamilton Heights had good offensive balance in its opening win over Mt. Vernon. The Huskies ran for 133 yards and quarterback Josh Feltz passed for 229 yards.

Leading the rushing were Jake Beale with 48 yards in 5 carries; Clayton Cowan 39 yards in 13 trips and Jesse Brown with a 37-yard carry.

Feltz was outstanding throwing the football. He hit Caymn Lutz 5 times for 118 yards.

"We did some good things against Mt. Vernon," said Street, "but have a lot to improve. We came out a little slow on both sides of the ball, but got it going in the second and third quarters.

"I thought we were able to get the passing game going," added the coach.

"Defensively, after our slow start we did some good things. We took some minor injuries late, and that contributed in part to two late scores. Overall, I thought Clayton Cowan played a really solid football game. He was involved in 21 tackles. Riley White played well defensively, as well. He had an interception return for a TD. Sterling Weatherford also had a special teams kick-off return," said Street.

The game Friday will be the first between the Huskies and the Wildkats.

Hawks have dominated foe

Sheridan football coach Bud Wright pulls no punches. He believes his Blackhawks should have won their season opener last week against Western Boone.

They didn't. Sheridan lost 15-12, despite dominating the stats. Sheridan outrushed the Stars 219 yards to 97. They out-passed Western Boone 98 yards to 41.

"We made a few mistakes at the wrong time," said Wright.

Now, this week, in a second consecutive game at Larry Wright Stadium in Sheridan, the Blackhawks will meet a Clinton Central team which they have dominated. Sheridan has defeated its long-time rivals six consecutive times, dating back to a 13-6 loss in 2009. Sheridan won 26-12 last year, and that was the closest margin in any of the six games.

Clinton Central is coming off a 1-9 season, including a 70-8 loss to Lafayette Central Catholic in the sectional.

"They have three good athletes," Wright talked about CC. Their best player is quarterback Keenan Orr, a triple threat. He's the real deal."

"We played good against Western Boone last week," said Wright. "But, mistakes killed us."

Sheridan featured a solid running game, led by Joe Callahan and Kenny Burnell. Callahan carried 20 times for 92 yards and Burnell 18 times for 94 yards.

"Callahan and Burnell ran the ball well," Wright said. "Our offensive line did a good job 95 percent of the time."

Sheridan has a big offensive line with 260-pound Karl Whaley at center, 270-pound Ian Pence and 258-pound Tanner Swindle at tackles and 280-pound Aver Bundy and 252-pound Alex Gipson at guards. The two guards are seniors.

Sheridan's defense also played well.

"We didn't allow any big plays," Wright agreed. "They had one pass for 21 yards and one run for 20 yards. We held them to a total of 134 yards."

Wright said his young quarterback played well. Sophomore Drake Delph started his first varsity game.

"He did a good job," said the coach.

"This North Central team is athletic and improved," said May. "It now is running an option type attack. This is a different look for anyone with all the zone offenses out there."


