News briefs...

Property sales scheduled for Sept. 22

Following are some news briefs of information for Reporter readers.

The annual sale of properties which are delinquent on property taxes will be held September 22. Several hundred county property owners have failed to pay their taxes, but the number of properties in the sale will likely be only about 100 as homeowners scurry to pay thereby avoiding

sale of their property. The auction sale will be held at 10 a.m. in the County Government and Judicial Center. To avoid having a delinquent property sold, owners can pay taxes owed until noon on September 21 to the County Treasurer.

The Hamilton County Household Hazardous Waste District is continuing to attract more business. Jeff Rushforth, district director, reported this week that the collec-

tion site at 1700 E. Pleasant Street had 31,000 visitors last year who brought potentially hazardous chemicals, electronics, appliances, tires and other materials for recycling. The waste district board met Monday to adopt a budget of about \$1.1 million for next year's operations. For July of this year, residents bringing in items for disposal numbered 3,372 compared with 3,134 in July of last year.

Hamilton County helping Kokomo with recovery

As Kokomo continues to work through the series of tornadoes that hit Howard County on Wednesday, Hamilton County is helping out.

Tonight's football game between Hamilton Heights and Kokomo at Lucas Oil Stadium has been canceled due to the ongoing cleanup and recovery effort that continues in Kokomo after an EF-3 tornado went through the city.

The Huskies football team will be traveling up to Kokomo this afternoon to volunteer with the cleanup. The Heights players and coaches will meet with the Wildkats team at 4:30 p.m. at Kokomo High School and help the United Way.

Refunds will be available for those that purchased tickets to the game. That will begin at 10 a.m. today at Hamilton Heights High School, entrance B. You must bring your tickets with you to receive a refund.

Those who purchased tickets can also have their refund donated to the Kokomo Disaster Relief Fund. Again, you must have your ticket in order to donate.

City officials from Noblesville and Westfield announced on Thursday crews from both Hamilton County communities have been sent to aid Kokomo in cleanup efforts from Wednesday's tornado.

Robert Herrington, spokesperson for Noblesville stated four employees and two lightning loaders traveled to Kokomo on Thursday. A lightning loader is a truck with a grappler that is used to pick up and haul heavy debris.

Zach Burton, spokesperson from Westfield indicated a team of public works employees, along with two dump trucks and a backhoe will be assisting Kokomo crews.

Like many of you, I'm sure, for the last several years each morning I had the opportunity of driving a child to school.

Drake, my grandson, turns 21 early in September, so, for the most part, those days are over.

I still remember Drake's first day of school, with me driving. He was in a pre-school in a building on the campus of the Saint Louis de Montfort church in Fishers. It was a Montessori school.

Drake and I arrived early to check things out. A bell tower caught his eye.

When it became time to enter the building, Drake had a long sidewalk in front of him. One step forward; two steps backwards. Then, the tower bell sounded and Drake, immediately, headed for the front door.

That was the beginning of my drive to school experiences.

Later that same school year the school moved to an area just across Geist Reservoir. It was a longer drive than just driving to Fishers.

Drake's first four years of elementary school was spent at a school just a couple of blocks from where he lived. I was out of the loop.

Duke Realty sells Parkwood Crossing Office Park

A longtime office park fixture near U.S. 31 and Interstate 465 is getting a new owner. Parkwood Crossing Office Park, which is located at 250 to 900 E. 96th St., right on the Hamilton County Line, is being sold to Rubenstein Partners LP and Strategic Capital Partners in a joint venture. Parkwood Crossing had been built and owned by Duke Realty since 1989, but that company is selling the office park for \$162.9 million.

According to a report from costar.com, Parkwood Crossing's buyers said they plan to "invest at least \$20 million into the complex by adding a standalone amenity center," in addition to other updates of the complex.

There were times, to be honest, when we didn't know if Drake would make it through University High. He turned things around his final two years, making the honor roll and improving day by day on the cross country course.

He then enrolled at Adrian College in Michigan, where he now just started his junior year. He made the Dean's list three times in the previous four semesters.

More driving for me. Although I was warned differently, very few weekends in those first two years did I not drive (there's that word again) to Adrian to have a Sunday lunch with Drake. I needed those more than he did. I'm sure you know what I mean.

Actually, Drake's junior year hasn't started at Adrian. It started last weekend with Drake and me driving to the Detroit Airport. He is studying in Japan this semester.

Not, however, the end of this story.

We drove to Detroit on Saturday for a scheduled Sunday flight. That didn't happen. A typhoon in the Pacific delayed his flight until the next day. It was a different route on a different airline, too. He was separated from his two travel buddies from Adrian. Drake departed on his own.

He flew from Detroit to Dallas and from Dallas to South Korea and then finally from South Korea, making a change from Delta to Korea Air, to Japan.

I got an email simply stating, "It was hell, but I made it."

I had to drive home from school, from Detroit, by myself. All along the way I kept hearing that bell ringing at Saint Louis de Montfort.

Grandpa was left behind and Drake became a man entering his first day of classes in Japan.

Motorists using 116th Street between Fishers and Carmel will soon find the route closed at Gray Road for construction of a roundabout. Officials report the closing will be effective Monday, August 29 assuming there is cooperative weather. The road is a main traffic artery across southern Hamilton County. A detour using Hazel Dell to 126th Street, west to Keystone and back to 116th will get motorists around the construction area.

Candidates for Noblesville School Board remain unopposed as the deadline for filing nears for three at-large seats. Incumbents Gary Duvall and Donna Clark along with first time candidate Carl Johnson are the only candidates filed. Longtime incumbent Jane Barr is not seeking re-election. Filing for the non-partisan November 8 school board election ends at noon today. Other county school districts will have contests for board seats with the exception of Sheridan where two Marion Township (Boone County) incumbents are unopposed.

Noblesville Main Street will again present Jazz on the Square on September 2 as part of its continuing First Friday program of events on the courthouse square. The jazz concert will be followed on September 10 with the White River Celebration and duck race, and then the Old Mill Festival on September 17. The events are free to the public.

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

Fishers receives \$1 million from INDOT for 116th Street

On Monday, August 22, Lieutenant Governor Eric Holcomb and officials at INDOT announced that Fishers will receive one of many Community Crossing Matching Grants, a program designed to match local agency investments in transformative infrastructure projects. Fishers accepted \$1 million for a rehabilitation project on 116th Street from Eller Rd. to Commercial Dr.

“Improving infrastructure in our community will increase the quality of life of our residents and help attract and retain businesses,” said Mayor Scott Fadness. “As one of the city’s most-used thoroughfares, modernizing the corridor and making necessary repairs will be transformative and pave the way for redevelopment in the 116th St. and Allisonville Rd. area.”

The Fishers’ Engineering Department applied for the Community Crossing Matching Grant earlier this year for the western portion of the Fishers’ 116th St. corridor. The total cost of the improvement project is \$2 million, and includes base-layer repairs, road resurfacing, crosswalk upgrades, and installation or repair of Americans with Disabilities Act access ramps.

“The \$1 million Community Crossing Matching Grant has allowed us to program 116th Street improvements sooner than originally planned,” said Jeff Hill, Director of Engineering for Fishers. “The next few years are sure to be busy from an infrastructure improvements standpoint, but the end result will be an updated transportation network that better meets the needs of our growing community.”

Fishers will bid and manage the improvement project. Construction is expected to take place during the early summer of 2017. As the project timeline moves forward, additional details will be communicated.

The City of Fishers, through federal grants, creative partnerships and local investment, is aggressively improving road infrastructure and traffic flow throughout the community. Carmel road closures to impact traffic during festival weekends in Arts & Design District

From classic cars to marathon runs, late night parties on Main to international arts – the Carmel Arts & Design District is one happening place for the next several weeks. The activities will bring much excitement to residents and visitors, but it will also bring traffic restrictions and road closures.

In addition to posting signs along Main Street and Range Line Road, the City of Carmel wants to be proactive by releasing in advance the restrictions motorists will see this weekend during the annual IU Health North Hospital Carmel Artomobilia, which takes place in the District this Saturday, August 27 from Noon–5 p.m. Last year, the event drew more than 8,000 attendees.

Roads will be closed for the festival beginning at 6 a.m. Saturday to accommodate the setup of the festival and move-in of the cars. The closures will remain until about 8 p.m. The main road closure points for the festival are:

- 1st Ave. NE/SE & E. Main Street (by Woodys Library Restaurant)
- 1st St. NE/NW & N. Range Line Road (by PNC Bank and Vine Healthcare)
- 4th Ave. SW & W. Main Street (by the roundabout)
- 3rd St. SE/SW & S. Range Line Road (just south of the Indiana Design Center)

As usual, parking will still be accessible to all lots behind buildings, in the Sophia Square parking garage, in the Indiana Design Center parking garage, the Lions Club lot and all available on-street public parking surrounding the festival area. With the current construction in the area, we urge all residents and visitors to allow extra time, patience and caution in the area. Similar closures will also be forthcoming for other events on the calendar. Including the following:

Run317 – A 5K event that starts and ends in the District.

- Closure date & time: Thursday, September 1 from 6–9 p.m.

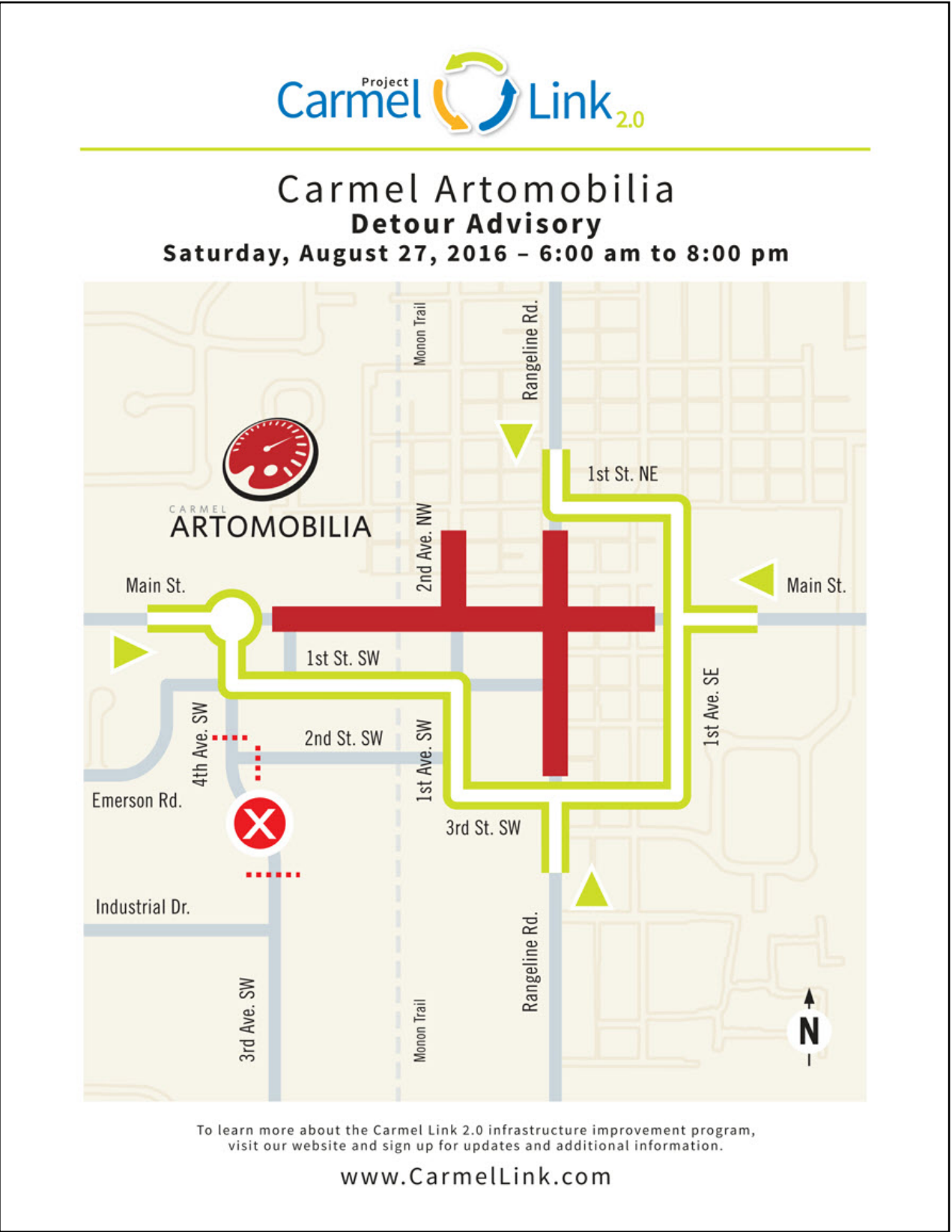
Golf Celebration Week/Late Night on Main – A festive event being held in conjunction with the BMW Championships at Carmel’s Crooked Stick Golf Club.

Carmel International Arts Festival – One of the city’s largest festivals featuring international art, music and food booths.

- Closure date & time: Friday, September 23 through Sunday, September 25, exact hours to be determined.
- Event date & time: Saturday, September 24, 10 a.m.–6 p.m. and Sunday, September 25, 10 a.m.–5 p.m.

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Football preview...

Golden Eagles take on No. 1 Central Catholic

After getting a nice win over a Class 5A school last week for its opening game, the Guerin Catholic football team will travel to Lafayette Central Catholic to take on Indiana's top ranked 1A school.

But, as any high school football fan knows, the Knights have long been able to dispatch schools twice and three times their size, all as warm-ups for state championship runs.

"We are very excited to play at Central Catholic," said GC coach Tom Dilley. "We have great respect for their program and know that we will need to play a great game to compete with them. Our top priority is that we improve from last week."

Since 2009, the Knights have won state in the last five 1A tournaments they've played - the success factor bumped LCC up to 2A in 2013-14, where the Knights held their own, losing only to runner-up Tipton

in 2013 and champion Rensselaer in 2014, the later year after winning a regional. Central Catholic began its season last week with a 70-0 win over John Marshall, a 3A school.

The Golden Eagles, also a 3A school, got a big win over 5A Martinsville 42-22 last week. Carter McGinnis ran for four touchdowns and 277 yards. Luke Keller, the junior quarterback, scored the other two, a 53-yard throw and a short run.

"Our offensive line featuring senior co-captain Joe Boise, returning senior starters Graham Keller, Will Bates, and Nathan Shewmaker, along with senior Kyle Hennie will be key this week against Lafayette Central Catholic," said Dilley. "Creating opportunities for senior running back Carter McGinnis and junior quarterback Luke Keller will be a tremendous challenge. The LCC defensive front is very quick and physical, and they play extremely hard."

Dilley said his team's defense was led "by senior co-captain Ed Poynter and juniors Logan Weaver and Jake Labus."

"Our football records differ a little from what was in the Reporter this morning. Missing were 1928 (Noblesville won 25-6), 1929 (0-0 tie), 1930 (Carmel won 12-9), 1931 (Carmel won 35-0), 1932 (Noblesville won 7-0 and 1933 (Noblesville won 6-0)," Tony wrote in an email.

"Also missing," Tony added, "was a 2003 regular season game won by Carmel 31-0 and the 2008 sectional game won by Carmel 31-0.

"We have the series at 44-14-1, in Carmel's favor," Tony added.

"This is why we collaborate," wrote back Jimmy. "Good catch! I have not listed any scores prior to 1951, since that is when we officially started football at the school and Edgar Cotton wasn't putting together teams at the Lumberyard Mall."

I do remember the early days of Carmel football. I wasn't writing in 1951 but started a few years later.

I do remember reading, and probably writing, about those scores before 1951.


The sad part, for Noblesville fans, is that down through the years Carmel has handed Noblesville its head on a silver platter.

44-14-1, as has been pointed out before, just isn't good, for Noblesville or even for Carmel. It would be great for Noblesville and Carmel to have a more-contested rivalry. Good for Hamilton County football.

That type of thing happened last week when Hamilton Southeastern, also dominated by Carmel throughout the years, finally defeated the Greyhounds.

It would be good if Noblesville and Carmel in football could develop the

Bids shall be properly and completely executed on Bid Forms contained in the Contract Documents. Each Bid shall be accompanied by a completely filled out Form No. 96 (Revised 2013), and acceptable bid security. Any Bid not accompanied by the aforementioned required items shall be deemed to be a non-responsive Bid.

No Bidder may withdraw the proposal within a period of 60 days following the date set for the receiving of bids.
