School board elections are now set for the November 8 election. Twenty-five candidates qualified for the ballot before yesterday's noon filing deadline. A total of 14 seats are at stake in the six county school districts.

There will be no contest for Noblesville School Board. Three at-large seats are up for election this year. Two Browning, Cherish Davis, Timothy Smith and Lin Zheng. incumbents, Gary Duvall and Donna Clark will begin new four-year terms in January. They will be joined by newcomer Carl Johnson. Jane Barr, current member of the board, is not running for re-election.

Inaugural stakeholder meeting

Legacy Fund of Hamilton County. an affiliate of Central Indiana Community Foundation (CICF) and Hamilton County Youth Assistance Program will conduct an inaugural stakeholder meeting the morning of Tuesday, Aug. 30 at the IMMI Corporate Campus, 18881 IMMI Way, Westfield.

The meeting is scheduled for 7:30 to 8:45 a.m. Opening remarks and a video presentation will take place at 8 a.m., followed by remarks by Westfield Mayor Andy Cook and Hamilton County Superior Court 1 Judge Steve Nation at 8:15 a.m. a board panel discussion about why and how the program works begins at 8:25 a.m.

Over 150 people, including all Hamilton County mayors and district school superintendents, county sheriff and prosecuting attorney, judges and other city and county officials, will attend the inaugural board and stakeholder training for Hamilton County's Youth Assistance Program.

The early-intervention program was created to help at-risk youth avoid making mistakes that lead to long-term involvement in the county's legal system. Legacy Fund, government officials, schools and community members provided the seed money for Youth Assistance Programs in all six Hamilton County school districts, but now the program is strongly support by the broader community.

Other speakers include Terry Anker, president, Legacy Fund and Hamilton County Youth Assistance Program board leaders.

The Hamilton County Juvenile Services Center in Noblesville is at just 14 percent capacity, on average, and youth being detained is half of what it was at its height in 2009 when the first Youth Assistance Pilot Program launched.



ITT Tech facing uncertain future

ITT Technical Institute could soon be out of business.

The federal government is no longer allowing the Carmel-based educational services company to accept "new students that receive federal loans and grants" in order to pay tuition, according to a report in the Wall Street Journal. The article said that the Department of Education has "lost faith" that ITT will get past the myriad of investigations that it is under, including from its accreditor.

Ted Mitchell, the U.S. Under Secretary of The U.S. Department of Education, posted the following on the potential damages to taxpayers and students. department's official blog, "Homeroom," Thursday:

"In recent years, ITT Educational Services, Inc. 
