## Fishers Fire takes delivery of two new fire engines

The Fishers Fire Department took delivery of two new Pierce Saber fire engines earlier this week. The trucks replace two

Fishers Fire Department took delivery of two new Pierce Saber fire engines earlier this week. Firefighters began training on the trucks this week and anticipate them being fully equipped and ready for service next week.

These trucks will replace two current engines, one is 25 years old and the other is 16 years old. The two older trucks will go into reserve status which will be used when a front line truck is taken out of service for maintenance. This allows firefighters to maintain coverage in all districts for the time it takes repairs to be made.

Each engine cost approximately \$427,000. This is an estimated \$200,000 per engine savings for our citizens, under the recommended list price. Because Fishers is a member of the Houston-Galveston Buying Group, this discounted price was made available due to the consortiums quantity purchasing power.

The estimated life of a fire engine is 8-12 years as a front line fire truck and five years as a reserve truck.

The engines are designated Engine 392 and Engine 394. "3" is the Mutual Aid County Identifier Number (Hamilton County), "9" is the Hamilton County District Identifier (City of Fishers) and "2" is the Station Number.

## Early morning fire breaks out in Noblesville

A fire broke out early Sunday morning at a residence near Greenfield Avenue and Boden Road in Noblesville.

Shortly after 1 a.m., Noblesville Fire Department was dispatched to a reported residential structure fire at the 12200 block of Braddock Lane. First arriving units reported fire coming from the roof of the home above the garage, of a two-story home.

Crews were able to gain entry into the home and extinguish the fire within 30 minutes. The occupants were able to escape the home, uninjured, prior to calling 911. One Noblesville Firefighter was treated at the scene for heat exposure and transported to Riverview Hospital in good condition.

A second home, located at the 12600 block of Braddock Lane sustained moderate damage to the exterior as a result of this fire. Secondary crews, outside, were able to contain that damage to the exterior of that home.

The cause of the fire is currently undetermined as the investigation is currently taking place. The Noblesville Fire Department was assisted by Fishers Fire Department.





## Building permits...

## Single family permits up 10 percent over last year

increase in building permits, according to Destination Drive. numbers from the Building Association of Greater Indianapolis.

Through July 31, the county has issued 1287 single-family building permits, up 10 percent over the similar period in 2015 (a total of 1169 permits). Hamilton County issued 157 permits during the month of July, which is down slightly (four percent) from July 2015's total of 164.

Westfield has the most permits issued both in the month of July (56) and for the RBR Decks, Brighton Knoll, 10739 entire year (395). As for other communities, Fishers issued 42 permits in July, Noblesville issued 35 and Carmel/Clay issued 23. There was also one permit issued in an unincorporated part of the county.

A total of 457 building permits were issued for the nine-county Indianapolis region in July, up five percent from last July's 437. For the year, the area has 3459 permits, up 12 percent from the 3076 issued through the first seventh months of 2015.





Regular season rivalry renewed...

# Carmel tops Noblesville, 24-9

A regular-season football rivalry was renewed in Hamilton County Saturday night, after 12 years and 24 extra hours.

Carmel and Noblesville faced off at Hare Chevrolet Field, in a game that was pushed back a day due to stubborn Friday thunderstorms. After a close first half, the Class 6A No. 7 Greyhounds scored two third-quarter touchdowns, and that was enough to give them a 24-9 victory over the Millers.

While Carmel and Noblesville have played each other in the sectional, it was the first time the two teams had met for a regular-season contest since 2004.

It was Carmel's first win of the season, after the 'Hounds dropped their opener to Hamilton Southeastern last week. Greyhounds coach John Hebert said that the key question of the game was, after the delay, "Were we going to come out sluggish, or were we going to try to create opportunities?'

"We kept trying to keep their attention, but it's hard when you have that much time," said Hebert. "Definitely pleased with the way we approached this game. Came out in the first half and tried to establish some things, and we were able to."

Carmel got the first score of the game, with Jake McDonald finding Jalen Walker for a 36-yard touchdown pass midway through the first quarter. That would be the only score of the period.

Both teams traded field goals in the second quarter. Jack Knight kicked in a 23-yarded midway through the period, with Matt Fortier making a 20-yard field halftime score 10-3.

culminated in another touchdown throw from McDonald to Walker. This one was a short toss, from four yards.

The Millers answered that with a solid drive of their own. Ryan Barnes, the junior quarterback, made six carries in the drive, and the final rush got him into the end zone on a one-yard QB keeper.

But Carmel came back with another touchdown on the very next drive. McDonald made a 47-yard pass to Ethan Merriweather, who ran into the end zone. Fortier made the extra point kick, as he had for the other two touchdowns.

"We didn't play well enough to win," said Noblesville coach Jason Simmons. "That's the bottom line. For the second week in a row, we gave up big plays offensively, and we struggled in the red zone. If you're going to win football games, especially big football games against good opponents, we have to be able to execute in the red zone and we can't give up big plays."


