ITT Tech stops enrolling new students

ITT Technical Institute announced on Monday that it is no longer enrolling new students.

The Carmel-based technical school was already banned from accepting new students that receive federal loans and grants to pay tuition, an edict handed down from the U.S. Department of Education late last week. It is not clear what will happen with current ITT Tech students.

The ITT Tech website was relatively unchanged as of Tuesday evening, except for a yellow banner with the statement "We are currently not enrolling new students." No other information has been given out; the school's Twitter account has been silent since Thursday, right before the government's ban.

ITT Tech has 130 campuses serving over 40,000 students in 38 states. The company granted over \$260 million in scholarships in 2014, according to its website. It was founded in 1946, and moved to Carmel in 1969.

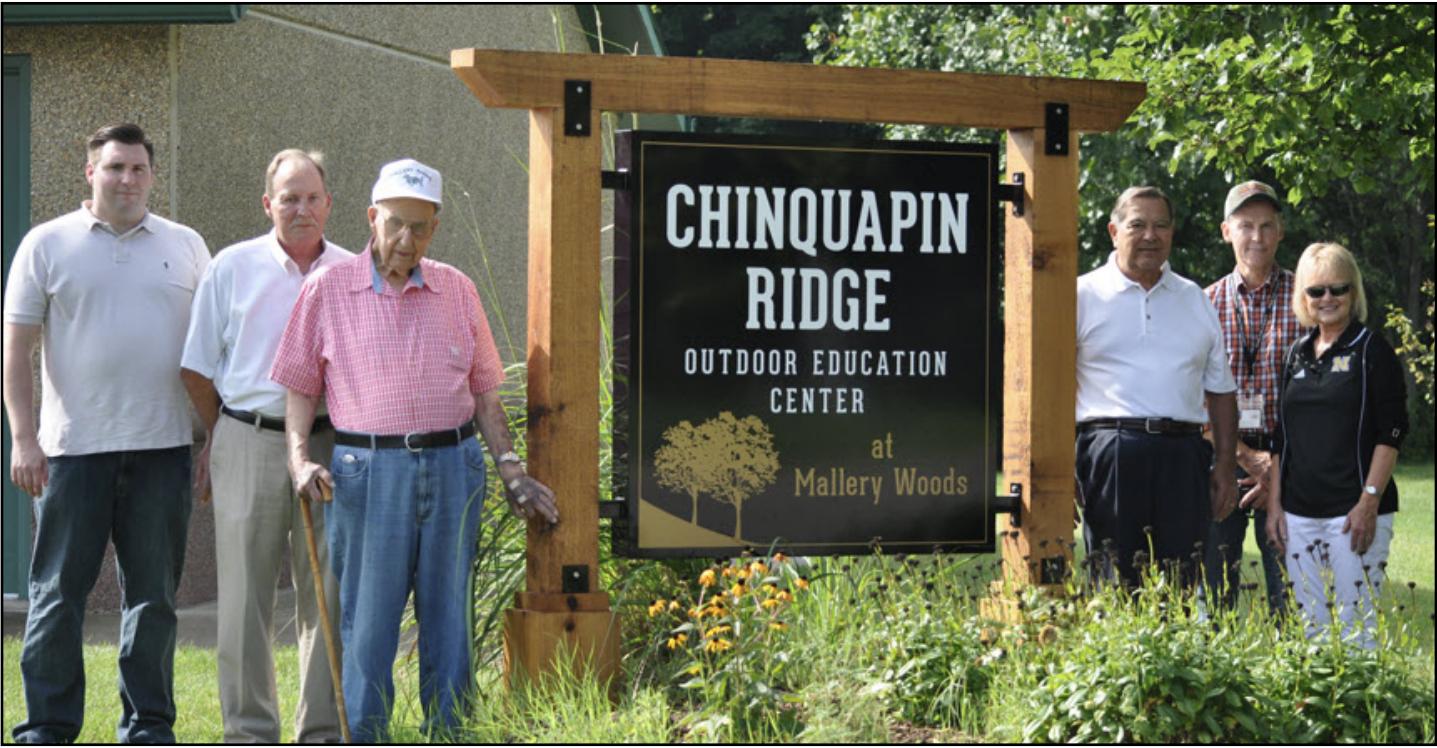

Noblesville Schools dedicates Mallery Woods

Noblesville Schools honored Mr. Garrick Mallery on Aug. 26 at a dedication to name *Mallery Woods*, part of the property acquired by the district from Mallery in 1992.

The woods are adjacent to White River Elementary School on Cumberland Road and surround the Chinquapin Outdoor Education Center, which is used by Noblesville Schools for outdoor student study and exploration. The elementary, and nearby cross country and soccer facilities, were all built on former Mallery land.

Prior to ownership by the Mallery family, the property was part of a land grant deeded by President James Monroe in 1824. That deed, framed in historic barn wood from the site, is on display at White River Elementary.

Mallery is a Noblesville resident and 1945 graduate of Noblesville High School. His five grandchildren attended White River Elementary.

Alumni are often called upon to serve on boards of county organizations and volunteer their time for community development efforts.

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Huskies will try again ...

Heights enters loop play

It was a big postponement, that’s for sure. Hamilton Heights second game of the season, a scheduled appearance against Kokomo at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis, was canceled because of the huge weather-damage in Kokomo last Friday.

But, said Heights coach Mitch Street, other things were more important than playing football.

“It’s obviously unfortunate we had to miss the game, especially for the people of Kokomo,” Street said. “But, us missing a game is minor compared to the things many in that community are going through.”

Instead of playing football, the Huskies traveled to Kokomo to help clean up storm damage.



“I was really proud of our kids for jumping in to help,” Street continued. “I was most proud of the attitude and approach they had through it all. They worked hard without complaining. They were kind, caring and compassionate in a time of need.”

“The two teams combined were able to get a lot done in a short amount of time. Both coaching staffs and administrations were proud of that. Many involved were positively impacted by the weekend, and therefore it was successful,” Street added.

Now, this Friday at Hamilton Heights, the Huskies will try to return their attention to football, hosting Lewis Cass.

It will be the Hoosier Conference opener for both teams. Hamilton Heights began its season with a non-conference win over Mt. Vernon. Lewis Cass opened losing to Pioneer 47-0 and then last week lost to Churubusco 18-12 in overtime.

Heights defeated Cass 20-9 last year after losing 26-14 two years ago. That Lewis Cass victory broke a five-game Hamilton Heights series winning streak.

In Heights’ opening win this season, the Huskies were led on offense by the passing of Josh Feltz, who was 10-of-19 for 229 yards and two touchdowns. Caymn Lutz had five catches for 118 yards.

On the ground, Clayton Cowan carried 13 times for 39 yards and Jake Beagle 11 times for 48 yards.

Cowan also led Heights’ defense with 11 solo tackles and nine assists. Zach Stevens had nine and four and Lutz collected eight tackles.

“Lewis Cass is a football team that plays really hard,” Street said. “They do some really good things and will stress you.”

“We will need to play well, and continue to get better.”

“We have to make sure we take another step forward this week. We can’t let not playing last week be an excuse for not coming out and playing sharp,” Street added.

An “offensive” game at Westfield

Westfield and Zionsville have seen some offensive blowouts in their football series. Westfield won 45-30 last year and 44-34 two years ago.

The offensive explosions may not be over.

In Westfield’s first two games this season, both Shamrock wins, Coach Jake Gilbert’s club has rolled to a 38-17 decision over Harrison and a 27-0 verdict over Southport. Zionsville has defeated Pike 55-35 and beaten Lebanon 55-54.

The game this Friday at Westfield is the first Hoosier Crossroads Conference battle for both teams.

Westfield can expect Zionsville to throw the football. Quarterback Blake Levy is 37-of-60 for 654 yards and seven touchdowns. His leading receivers are Jay Edwards with 11 catches for 218 yards and Brenden Mikesell with 10 catches for 173 yards.

Mikesell leads the Eagles in rushing, carrying 48 times for 210 yards.

“We have to get off to a better start offensively,” said Gilbert. “We have to eliminate dumb mistakes.”

Defense will be a key for the Shamrocks. “Against Southport,” said Gilbert, “our defense played lights out. We pressured the quarterback, created takeaways and ran to the ball really well.

“Our defense had a blast. Byron Hubbard had a great game at defensive end. He recorded his third sack of the season. Koby Hauser and Jackson Garrett each had an interception. Josh Tuffnell also played great, especially against the run,” added the Westfield coach.

Westfield has featured a balanced offense in both of its wins.

Nate Froelich and Johnny Swidan are the leading rushers. Froelich has 208 yards

Carmel to visit Trojans

Following a season-opening split while playing two Hamilton County, sectional-area teams, losing to Hamilton Southeastern and beating Noblesville, Carmel coach John Hebert says. “The identity of the 2016 team is still developing.”

This week, the Greyhounds will enter MIC Conference play when traveling to Center Grove, which also is 1-1 on the season after losing to Warren Central of the MIC, 21-16, and blasting Whiteland 43-0.

“Despite the weather delaying our game in Week 2 to Saturday night, getting the victory over a much-improved and tough Noblesville team was a big moment for our team,” said Hebert.

“Against Noblesville, our focus was better throughout the ups and downs of a tight game.

“Defensively, there were far few missed assignments compared to Week 1, and we played with more passion.

“Offensively, Jerome Halsell was able to rush for over 150 yards thanks to very solid play by our offensive line, tight end Kurt Rafdal and fullback. Offensive guard Justin Williams had a very strong game. Jake McDonald was able to convert on play-action passes to Ethan Merriweather and Jalen Walker for touchdowns.”

McDonald, a junior who last week filled in for the injured Elliot Charlebois at quarterback, in two games has been 22-of-35 slinging the pigskin for 288 yards and four touchdowns.

Walker has 10 catches for 139 yards and 3 touchdowns and Merriweather 9 catches for 139 yards and 1 TD.
