A Noblesville man is recovering after he was accidentally shot Wednesday after-

At approximately 1:15 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department and Hamilton County Sheriff's Department responded to the address of 17625 River Road in reference to a report of a person suffering from a gunshot wound. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Preliminary information suggests that Danny L. Warren, 67, of Noblesville, was accidentally shot by his son, Jeremy A. Warren, 29, also of Noblesville. Danny Warren was transported by ground ambulance to St. Vincent's Hospital in Indianapolis to be treated for a gunshot wound to the knee. The injury was characterized as nonlife-threatening.

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
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George Adam Kachelein Jr.

Noblesville boy defeats the odds, raises awareness for cancer

September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. These special 30 days are dedicated to honor children who have fought or are fighting cancer, and the month is represented by the color gold. The St. Baldrick's Foundation, a volunteer-powered charity dedicated to raising money for the gold standard children's cancer research, believes September is an opportunity to prove that #KidsAreGold and deserve a childhood free from cancer.

Matthias Vescelus, 8, from Noblesville, is a six-year cancer survivor who refuses to let anything slow him down – even being completely blind. At just 3 months old, Matthias was diagnosed with a rare tumor in both eyes. He spent the majority of his first year fighting for his life – enduring six months of chemotherapy, having both eyes removed and replaced with prosthetics before his first birthday.

Matthias does not let his blindness slow him down and even tackles obstacles that would be hard for adults. This summer, he was on his local swim team – where his coach swam in front of him, leading him with her voice so he could compete with the other kids. He's also an avid hiker - having spent time in Zion National Park and on other hikes

with his adventurous family. Additionally, he had participated in the Junior Spartan Race, an extreme walk/run obstacle course race, with his brother. Matthias is an incredible inspiration who hasn't and won't let cancer or blindness keep him from experiencing life to the fullest.

Matthias has just started second grade and is totally obsessed with the weather. When he grows up, he says he's going to be a stay-at-home dad or a meteorologist.

The reality is that childhood cancers take more lives than any other disease in the U.S. Matthias was a 2013 Ambassador for St. Baldrick's and has shaved his head multiple times - a few times alongside his mom, Katie.
