Sheridan fireman not guilty

A Sheridan Fire Department captain that faced official misconduct and obstruction of justice charges has been found not guilty.

Travis Stern's charges stemmed from a crash on Jan. 31, 2016 when Joshua Stoops, 37, was involved in the wreck at State Road 38 and Six Points Road near Sheridan.

Stern, along with other Sheridan Fire Department personnel, responded to the crash. Investigators charged Stern after an informant came forward with information about the incident, alleging he removed narcotics and paraphernalia from the scene.

Ivy Tech recognizes partners, expands dual credit offerings

Ivy Tech Community College is partnering with 105 schools in central Indiana this year to offer free college credits to 10,735 high school students. The College recognized several high schools and career centers in central Indiana for their partnership in the dual credit program at a breakfast September 1.

Ivy Tech's dual credit program has reached a record enrollment with 56,337 students enrolled statewide and 10,735 in central Indiana for the 2015-16 school year. This year's dual credit enrollment represents a 6.5 percent increase in students, compared to the 52,908 high school students enrolled last year and a 23 percent increase in students compared to the 45,819 students enrolled two years ago.

The program allows high school students to simultaneously earn both

Dual credit plays an important role in strengthening the connection between high school and college, making the transition between sectors easier for students while providing high school students with a realistic understanding of college-level academic expectations. Ivy Tech uses dual credit to encourage greater participation in higher education and to help students overcome real or perceived obstacles to higher education.

The most common form of Ivy Tech dual credit involves courses taught in a high school, by a high school instructor, and offered during the regular school day. High school faculty who offer the dual credit course must meet credential requirements and participate in professional development provided by Ivy Tech. To reach a dual credit agreement for a course taught in a high

Carey Road roundabouts construction scheduled to start Sept. 19

The roundabouts planned for Carey Road at both 136th Street and Hawthorne Drive will be reconstructed in unison to reduce the long-term impact on the residents of Carmel. The temporary closure of these intersections will begin on or after Monday, September 19th. We have found that a short term, typically 45-day, full closure creates less hardship and increases safety for the workers than a longer partial closure. These projects are part of the CarmelLink 2.0 bond projects that the Carmel City Council approved.

Please take the time to pre-plan and re-route you daily commute and routine errands if they include these intersections. The short term discomfort of road construction is offset by the long-term economic development benefits to our community of having an efficient network of carefully-planned and well-maintained roads.

Carey Road and 136th Street: This T-intersection will be fully reconstructed to a single lane roundabout. This project will include new full-depth pavement, curb and gutter, an enclosed storm water system and a shared-use path with new curb ramps. Any private drives located within the limits of the intersection reconstruction will be replaced. Access to residential properties within the project limits will be maintained at all times. The intersection will be closed to thru traffic for the duration of construction, roughly 45 days, with thru traffic being detoured along 146th Street and Gray Road.

Carey Road and Hawthorne Drive: This intersection also will be fully reconstructed to a single lane roundabout. The roundabout construction will include, but not be limited to, new full depth pavement, concrete curb and gutter, new storm drainage features and use of existing drainage features, reconstruction of existing sidewalks within the project limits and new ADA compliant curb ramps. Permanent Right of Way will need to be acquired in the southeast and northeast quadrants of the roundabout. The intersection will be closed to through traffic during the construction of the roundabout, roughly 45 days. The detour route is tentatively planned to use 146th Street and Keystone Avenue.

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Barnes rolls in for game winner...

Millers win exciting HCC opener over Tigers

Even after 24 carries in his previous game, and still more in his current game, Noblesville quarterback Ryan Barnes wanted the ball.

The junior traveled from Kansas City to his new home, and got thrown into the fast lane of Indiana high school football right away. But with 24 seconds left in the Millers' Hoosier Crossroads Conference opener at Fishers on Friday, Barnes found the right lane, and sped 41 yards to the end zone. That touchdown put Noblesville on top, and the Millers hung on for their first win of the season, 28-21 over the Class 6A No. 8 Tigers.

That was Barnes' 23rd carry of the night, but he wasn't tired.
"I'm pumped and excited for the team," he said.
Of course, every player on a football team has a role in the touchdown. Barnes had excellent blocking that opened up that lane.

"I really think it came down to Nolan Ginther and Drew Scheib on the edge," said Noblesville coach Jason Simmons. "Those two guys did a nice job setting the edge. Chandler Hurst was a lead blocker on it. Ryan gets the credit for the yards, but those guys, those three deserve credit too, because they gave him an opportunity to get down hill and to go bang that thing."

Barnes agreed.
"Great blocking," said the quarterback. "And they just opened up a lane for me, and it was right there, wide open."

Noblesville's winning touchdown was the final score of an exciting, back-and-forth game, in which both teams played with much effort and provided some exciting moments on offense and defense.

The Millers had the first big moment, when Hurst blasted off on a 54-yard run to get the first score of the game with 7:48 left in the first quarter. Jack Knight made the extra point kick; he would make all four of his kick attempts on the night.

Fishers' defense would then get the next score, as Jalen Moss recovered a fumble in the end zone to give the Tigers their first touchdown. Ben Norton kicked the extra point; he was also perfect in kicking with three successful attempts.

Fishers would soon get the ball back, and scored again on a long drive that began with 19 seconds left in the first quarter. Trevor Newman, Michael Noble and Joel Smyth took turns making short runs down the field, with quarterback Smyth making a couple of passes along the way (to Newman and Bryce Gee). Noble got the ball on the one-yard line, and he carried it in, making the score 14-7. That was with 6:30 remaining in the second quarter, which meant it was a nearly six-minute drive. That would be the last score of the first half.

Noblesville tied things back up midway through the third quarter. Starting on the Millers' 22, Barnes zoomed ahead 32 yards to get the ball in Tiger territory. The quarterback led the way down the field, with several short runs, and with three solid passes (two to Jackson Thurman and one to Ben Gruver). Barnes ended the drive with a two-yard dash into the end zone, making the score 14-14.

Fishers took the lead one more time, when Smyth connected with Michael Jonson for a 17-yard touchdown pass. That gave the Tigers a 21-14 lead with 8:45 left in the game.
Noblesville answered with a score of its own. This time Barnes threw towards the end zone, and towards Jackson Thurman.

Jackson made the catch for a nine-yard touchdown, and Knight's kick tied the game up - again. The Millers got the ball back with 2:24 left, which set up Barnes' big run and Noblesville's winning drive.

"I felt great about the look in our kids' eyes," said Simmons. "They believed. And there's magic in believing, and our kids

believed taking the field with 76 yards to go that we were going to go squash that inch." Simmons credited Noblesville's defense, too.

"I thought our defense played really well," said the coach. "We bent a little, but we didn't give up big chunks. We stopped the fake punt. We did a lot of things tonight really well defensively, but the one thing that we did defensively well was, we played with an attitude and an edge, and that's something we had to do. We had to be fundamental and we had to win the initial take off. And we did that tonight."

Barnes carried the ball 23 more times, totaling 158 yards. Hurst rushed for 81 yards, including his big touchdown run. Barnes completed 10 of 16 passes for 99 yards. Thurman caught five of those passes for 50 yards.

Smyth threw 29 passes, completing 15 of them for 147 yards. DeVonte Adams had five catches for 48 yards. Newman led Fishers' rushing, with 48 yards.

"I was proud of the way our kids played," said Tigers coach Rick Wimmer. "We're playing with some JV guys out there. We are just beat up and injured. I thought we played very, very hard. Proud of our effort."

Both teams have huge games next week. The Millers (1-2) host Westfield, the No. 3-ranked team in 5A. Fishers (2-1) will travel to Hamilton Southeastern, taking on the 6A No. 7 Royals for the Mudsock trophy.

But, following the game, Coach Jake Gilbert had lots to say about the 5A No. 3 Shamrocks’ defense.

“The first team gave up only its second touchdown of the season,” pointed out the coach. “The defense played well. We held (Brenden) Mikesell to just 17 yards in 17 carries.”

Leading that defense in total tackles was Hank Grenda with two solo tackles and eight assists.

On offense, Gilbert said the Shamrocks ran the ball well.

“We did run it well (316 yards in 42 carries),” said Gilbert. “We got off a couple of long passes to Evan Manley. Andy Sweet had a good night throwing the foot-ball.”

On the ground, lots of Shamrocks contributed. Johnny Swidan had 14 carries for 73 yards; Nate Froelich 14 carries for 66 yards and Sweet ran six times for 86 yards. Owen McGraw came off the bench and carried three times for 80 yards.

Froelich and Swidan each scored two touchdowns. Will Harrison added to the point total with five PATs and a pair of field goals.

Zionsville never challenged. Westfield leaped to a 14-0 first quarter advantage and led 28-8 entering halftime.

The Shamrocks, now 3-0, have a big conference game next Friday at Noblesville.

Lewis Cass’ first touchdown came with 29 seconds left in the first half. The only score of the game in the third period was a Cass TD with 6:31 remaining.

The win left the Huskies 2-0 with an old rival coming in next week. The Huskies will host Tipton.

Center Grove broke a scoreless tie with a pair of second quarter field goals. Luke Eckert booted a 45-yarder and then kicked a 29-yard.

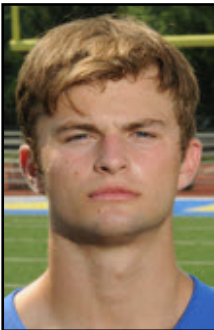

But, Carmel didn't score again, while Center Grove was collecting a pair of fourth quarter scores.

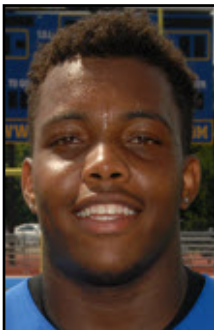

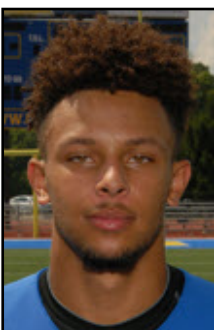

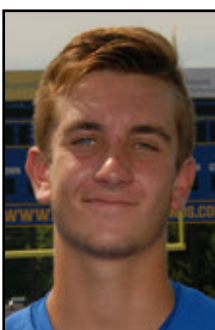
