News briefs

Early voting gets more county locations

Some interesting news briefs for Reporter readers:

For the first time Hamilton County election officials will offer "early voting" at remote locations in advance of the Nov. 8 general election. Early voting was offered at the Government and Judicial Center in recent elections and proved so popular that long lines formed. To avoid some of this problem, remote voting locations will be at Carmel Public Library and Fishers City Hall for voters in the populous southern part of the county. Early voters may also cast ballots at the Judicial Center as in the past where voting starts Oct. 12. The Fishers and Carmel locations open on Oct. 19.

A study of downtown Noblesville parking needs will be forthcoming in another two weeks, according to Deputy Mayor Steve Cooke. The professional study is the latest in a long series of surveys and studies of the parking problem. Presumably the new study, commissioned in May, will offer possible ways of finding more parking. A study last year was apparently an analysis of the problem on the popular Courthouse Square and immediately surrounding areas.

County Republicans interested in supporting the party will have a choice on September 15. The party organization will hold its annual Fall Dinner at the Ritz Charles in Carmel, while supporters of Curtis Hill, candidate for Attorney General, are having a fundraising event at the

Forrest Lucas Estate nearby. Could the scheduling of the two events on the same date be a competition between factions of the local GOP? No one is saying so, but generally two such events are not planned to conflict with each other.

The first roundabout in the old city of Noblesville is planned at the five points intersection of South 10th Street, Christian Ave. and Greenfield Road. Construction was scheduled to get underway this summer with completion before winter. Now the project has been delayed until next spring due to right-of-way acquisition problems. Another roundabout which will likely be underway next year is planned at North 10th and Cumberland Road.

Indiana Senate Republicans offering paid Internships

The Indiana Senate Republican Caucus is offering paid, spring-semester internships in its legislative, legal, policy, communications and information technology offices during the 2017 session of the General Assembly, said State Sen. Luke Kenley (R-Noblesville).

Qualified candidates must be at least a college sophomore. Recent college graduates as well as graduate school and law school students are also encouraged to apply. Positions are open to Indiana residents and non-residents who attend a college or university located within the state.

Benefits include a \$700 bi-weekly stipend, scholarship and academic credit opportunities, professional development, community involvement and networking.

Senate internships are full-time positions at the Statehouse in downtown Indianapolis that begin with a mandatory orientation in late December and conclude at the end of the legislative session in April 2017.

"The Senate internship program is a unique opportunity for students to gain experience in the legislative process while developing professional skills," Kenley said. "I encourage anyone who has an interest in learning more about state government or public policy to apply."

ITT Tech permanently cancels classes

The bad news that had been snowballing for ITT Technical Institute finally reached its conclusion on Tuesday morning, as the Carmel-based technical school announced that it was permanently discontinuing all student services and classes.

ITT Tech had been under investigation for various reasons for years, but things finally came to a head when, in late August, the federal government banned the school from accepting new students that receive federal loans and grants to pay tuition.

As a result, ITT Tech announced it would stop enrolling new students last week. The school has 130 campuses serving over 40,000 students in 38 states.

In a statement released on Tuesday, ITT called the government's action "a complete disregard by the U.S. Department of Education for due process to the company," and noted that "more than 8,000 employees will be negatively affected," in addition to the students and alumni.

Indiana Wesleyan University has offered to help ITT students, although details are still being worked on at this time.

John B. King, Jr., the U.S. Secretary of Education, issued a statement on the closing of ITT Tech. It can be found on Page 5.

Overnight closures due to setting of...

Bridge beams this week at I-69 and 106th Street interchange project

Walsh Construction plans to continue setting beams this week for the new 106th Street bridges over Interstate 69. Crews have finished setting beams over southbound I-69 and have plans in place for overnight traffic restrictions to set beams over northbound I-69..

The innovative roundabout design of the new interchange consists of two separate bridges, each carrying one direction of 106th Street over I-69. Twenty-four beams, measuring 50 inches tall and totaling 175 feet long, are being set in pairs over I-69.

Work is dependent on favorable weather, and construction schedules are subject to change.

Each night this week between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m., drivers should expect:

- Up to three right lanes of northbound I-69 will be closed,
- Up to two left lanes of southbound I-69 will be closed,
- Rolling slowdowns of up to 40 minutes each on northbound I-69.

During rolling slowdowns, pilot vehicles will slow traffic approaching the construction zone to create gaps in traffic that will allow for safely lifting the large beams over the interstate. Multiple rolling slowdowns lasting up to 40 minutes at a time will be required to set all beams over the northbound roadway.

Backups and delays should expected. Traffic will be allowed to clear between each beam setting. Motorists should seek alternate routes to avoid congestion and delays.

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Westfield gas & sewer rate cases: Consumer comments invited

If you would like to comment on Citizens Energy Group's proposed rate increases for its natural gas and sewer utilities in Westfield, here's your chance.

The Indiana Office of Utility Consumer Counselor (OUCC) – the state agency representing consumer interests in cases before the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC) – is reviewing both requests and is inviting written consumer comments.

Citizens Gas of Westfield – IURC Cause No. 44731

The OUCC is inviting comments through September 21, 2016 and is scheduled to file testimony on September 28, 2016.

Citizens Gas of Westfield's proposal would raise its monthly customer service charge from \$5.79 to \$12.00 for residential customers and from \$5.79 to \$37.00 for commercial customers. The proposal would also increase the base rate's volumetric portion, increasing the utility's annual operating revenues by approximately 16.2 percent (not including natural gas commodity costs that are recovered on a dollar-for-dollar basis). According to its testimony and exhibits, the utility is seeking the rate increase due to rises in operating and maintenance costs, as well as new infrastructure investments. Its request would raise a total average monthly residential bill from \$65.93 to \$71.37.

The proposed increase in this case would only apply to the utility's base distribution rate, which comprises approximately 58 percent of a typical Westfield residential customer's monthly heating bill. Base distribution rates cover "non-gas" costs such as operating and maintenance expenses, and capital infrastructure improvements.

Citizens Wastewater of Westfield – IURC Cause No. 44835

The OUCC is inviting comments through November 10, 2016 and anticipates filing testimony on November 18, 2016.

Minimum monthly sewer charges for 5,000 gallons would rise from \$51.10 to \$64.09 under Citizens Wastewater of Westfield's request. Monthly minimum commercial customer charges would be set at \$64.09 for customers using 5/8 and 3/4 inch meters, and at \$155.81 for commercial customers using larger meter sizes.

Citizens' proposal would increase annual sewer utility revenues by nearly 25.3

percent. According to its testimony and exhibits, the utility is seeking the sewer rate increase due to capital improvements including the 156th Street Interceptor and Downtown Lift Station projects.

The requested rate changes are limited to service in Westfield. Rates and charges for Citizens customers in Marion County are not at issue in these cases.

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U.S. Secretary of Education posts message to ITT students

Today, ITT Educational Services, Inc. (ITT) announced that it is closing all of its ITT Technical Institute campuses. For most of the world, that news will be covered as a business story or a political one, but I know that for you it is deeply personal. You are probably wondering what this means for your future; how it is going to affect your finances and your ability to continue your education.

In recent years, ITT has increasingly been the subject of numerous state and federal investigations. In August, ITT's accreditor, the Accrediting Council for Independent Colleges and Schools (ACICS) determined that ITT "is not in compliance, and is unlikely to become in compliance with [ACICS] Accreditation Criteria." This came amid increasingly heightened financial oversight measures put in place by the Department over the past two years due to significant concerns about ITT's administrative capacity, organizational integrity, financial viability, and ability to serve students.

The school's decisions have put its students and millions of dollars in taxpayer-funded federal student aid at risk. [Last week](#), the Department of Education took oversight actions to prevent ITT from continuing to add to that risk. When we made that decision, we did not take it lightly. One possible outcome of oversight actions is that a school may choose to close rather than take corrective actions, which can cause disruption and disappointment for current students. Ultimately, we made a difficult choice to pursue additional oversight in order to protect you, other students, and taxpayers from potentially worse educational and financial damage in the future if ITT was allowed to continue operating without increased oversight and assurances to better serve students.

We are committed to helping you as you consider next steps. Most immediately, you have two basic options to choose between:

1. If you are currently or were recently enrolled at ITT, you may be eligible to have your federal student loans for your program at ITT discharged. Your federal loan debt

will be wiped away and you will have the option of restarting your education somewhere new. We will post and update information about how to receive a discharge at our [ITT announcements page](#).

2. If you wish to continue and complete your program at a different school – especially if you are close to graduating – you may be able to transfer your credits. It is important to note that transferring your credits may limit your ability to have your federal loans discharged. Closed school discharge may be an option if you enroll in a different program that does not accept your ITT credits.

Both of these options have pros and cons, depending on your unique circumstances, so it is important that you consider your specific situation carefully. The Department's Office of Federal Student Aid is ready to support you with resources and information, including through this website, and will be updating you with more information in the coming days and weeks.

Whatever you choose to do, do not give up on your education. Higher education remains the clearest path to economic opportunity and security. Restarting or continuing your education at a high-quality, reputable institution may feel like a setback today, but odds are it will pay off in the long run. 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Heights, Tipton rivalry....

Teams will come out firing

There aren't many, if any, better high school football rivalries in this neck of the woods than Hamilton Heights and Tipton.

Located just a football flip and a gas station stop away from each other on State Road 19, these two long time rivals will get together Friday for a Hoosier Conference battle at Heights.

"Tipton will exploit your faults," said Hamilton Heights coach Mitch Street.

This will be Heights' second conference game of the season, the Huskies having defeated Lewis Cass 35-12 last week after opening the season with a 34-27 non-conference win over Madison Heights and then having a Week 2 date with Kokomo cancelled.

Tipton, yet to play a conference game, has defeated Madison-Grant 41-7 and Elwood 42-0 and lost last week to Lafayette Central Catholic 51-23.

The series between the Huskies and Blue Devils hasn't been all that competitive the last two years. Heights won 31-6 last year and 52-0 two years ago. But, Tipton won the previous two years, 28-7 and 19-14.

Look for an aerial battle on Friday.

Tipton quarterback Kellen Woods has completed 34-of-50 passes for 606 yards. As a team, Tipton is 40-of-58 through the air for 743 yards. As a team, Tipton has run the football only 77 times for 288 yards.

Heights can sling it, too.

Quarterback Josh Feltz has completed 26-of-42 passes for 513 yards.

Feltz's big receivers are Jesse Brown, Caymn Lutz and Sterling Weatherford. In the two games, Brown has seven catches for 141 yards, Lutz seven for 144 and Weatherford three for 61.

For Tipton, Caleb Burkett has 14 receptions for 298 yards and Matt Gutierrez 15 for 232.

Street liked the way his Huskies played, in the second half, against Lewis Cass last week.

"It was a good win for us," said the coach. "I thought we came out in the second half and played more like we are capable of playing."

"In a lot of ways, with Week 2 off, the game last week felt like our first game all over again."

"With that said," Street continued, "we must accelerate our growth this week."

Along with the passing game, the Huskies also have proven they can run the football. Senior Jeff Beale has carried 24 times for 94 yards and senior Clayton Cowan 16 times for 45 yards.

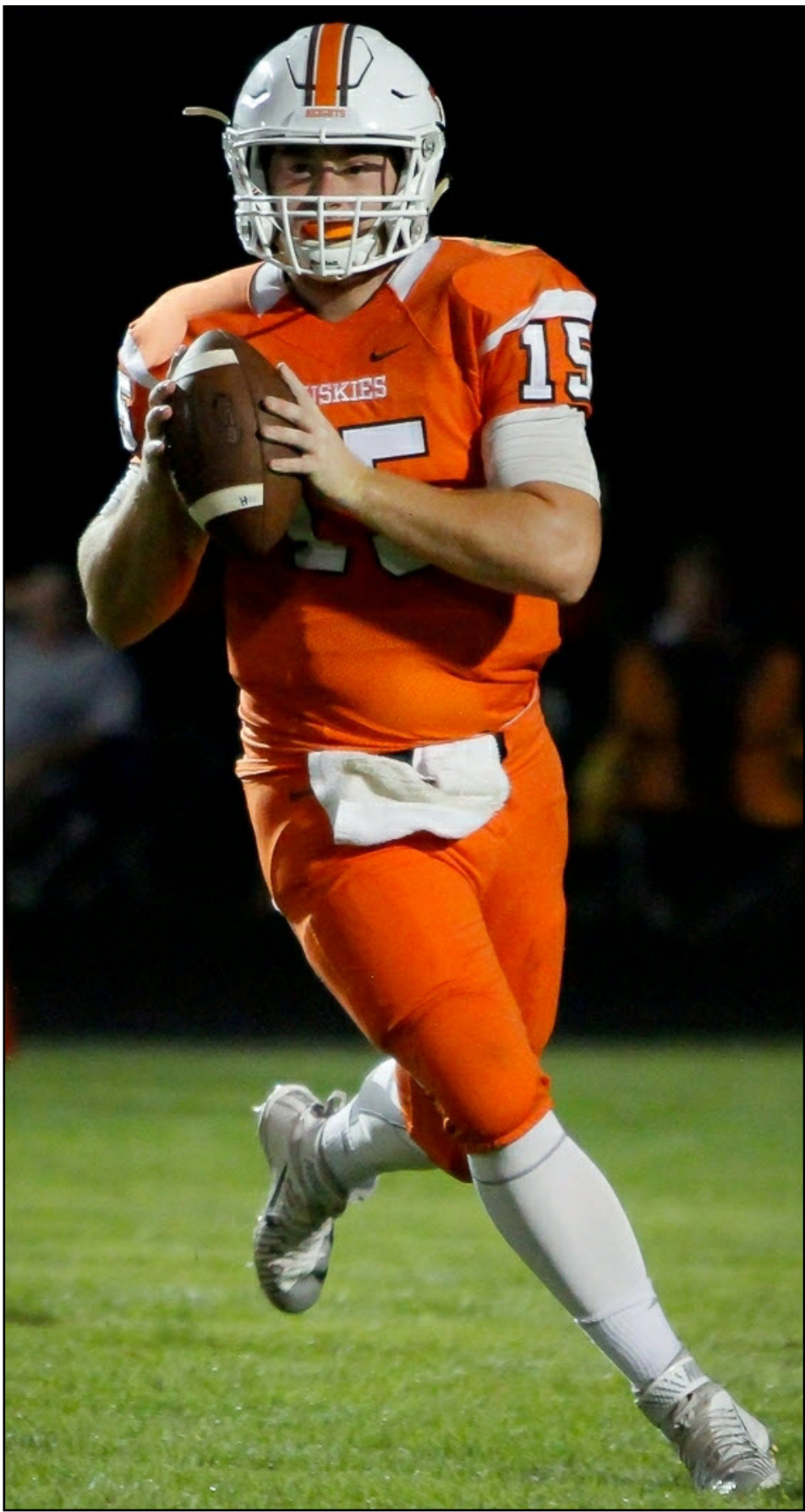
The Huskies have scored five times through the air and three times on the ground.

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The battle for Mudsock ...

This one more than huge

If you lived back in the old days when a little community nestled in southeastern Hamilton County was known to many as “Mudsock,” you never would have believed it.

You would not have believed that years later a football game would be played at Hamilton Southeastern’s Reynolds Royals Stadium and that tickets would be “limited” to the first 10,000 buyers. Or, that a seat in the end zone, a very special seat to be sure, would be a value at \$50.

But, that will be the situation Friday when the home Royals face city-rival Fishers in the Mudsock Game.

Fishers and Southeastern.... that says it all. Hometown bragging rights will be on line.

There’s more. The winner will stay alive in the chase for a Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship. It’s doubtful if the loser can pull out of a deep, deep hole. You see, Southeastern lost its conference opener last week at Avon. Fishers, playing at home, lost its conference opener to Noblesville. In a seven-team conference, it will be difficult for anyone to challenge for the crown after starting the season 0-2.

Both teams were 2-0 before starting the HCC run last week. Fishers had defeated North Central and Pike, two teams from the strong MIC Conference. Hamilton Southeastern also had two wins over the MIC, knocking off Carmel and North Central.

“It was one of those games that we just couldn’t get and keep things rolling,” HSE coach Scott May talked about the Royals’ lost to Avon. “On paper we looked like we won, but three turnovers to one take away was the bottom line difference in the game.

“I thought our kids kept fighting and tried to come back but we just didn’t make enough plays to make it happen. Avon is a young team in spots but they have the tools to win, no doubt.

“I thought,” May continued, “Jackson Sweeney had another good game on offense. Brock Burns was all over the place on defense, along with Alec Jessop.”

Sweeney is Southeastern’s leading rusher with 330 yards in 56 carries. Quarterback Adam Mullett has passed for 796 yards and six touchdowns. His leading receivers are Matt Klink with 16 catches for 190 yards; Max Brooks with nine catches for 135 yards and Nick Mutchner with nine catches for 111 yards.

“I thought our players played very hard,” Fishers coach Rick Wimmer talked about his team’s loss to Noblesville. “I was

pleased with our effort. Noblesville is an improved team. The thing we were worried about going into the game was Noblesville’s quarterback running game and that is what beat us in the second half.

“We are playing with a number of injuries right now, so for us to be competitive at this juncture is a positive sign. But we have many areas we need to improve. We have to generate more offense and get better production in a number of areas.

“But, again, I was proud of the effort we got from our players,” Wimmer added.

“Now, we will find out if we can respond,” May looked ahead to the Friday game. “This is a big week, not only because it is Fishers, but to see how we respond after losing a big HCC game. To get into the running for the conference, this is a must game for both teams.

“We stayed healthy against Avon and now must have a great week of practice,” May said. “Fishers is always big upfront on offense and they are mixing up their zone game with some power football and a passing attack. On defense, I think they are good on the edges and R.J. Potts is a force out in space. We know they will be ready and we must step up our game, too.”

“Southeastern is an outstanding football team with speed, size and skill,” Wimmer talked about the Royals. “I am very impressed with their receivers as a group. Sweeney may be as fast a back as we will see all year. Their secondary looks very athletic.

“We hope to get a couple of our injured players back this week and hopefully they can be effective.

“We must have better play from our offensive line and must find a way to generate a more consistent passing game. Defensively, we will need to fill the taps and tackle well. The HSE offense will spread you out and make you defend the run and the pass on the same play. We will need a very disciplined and physical game to win,” Wimmer added.

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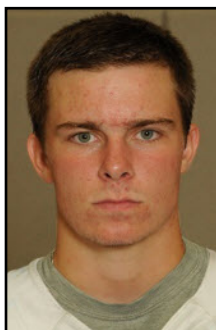

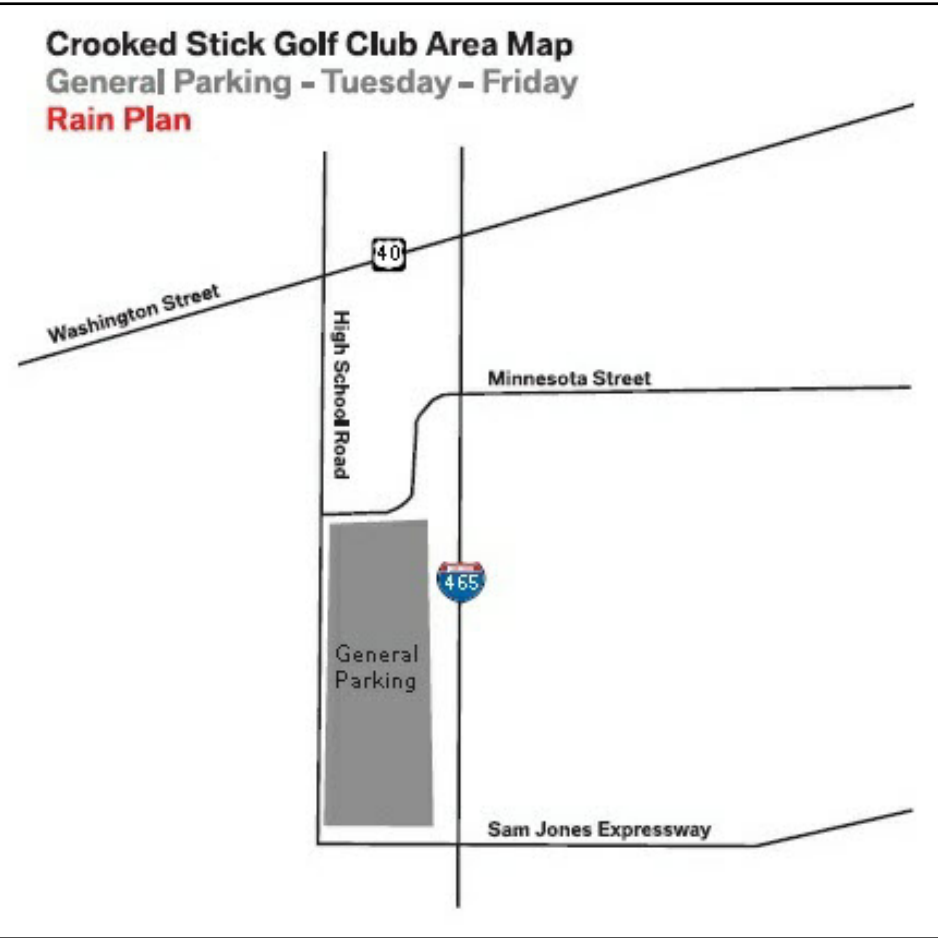
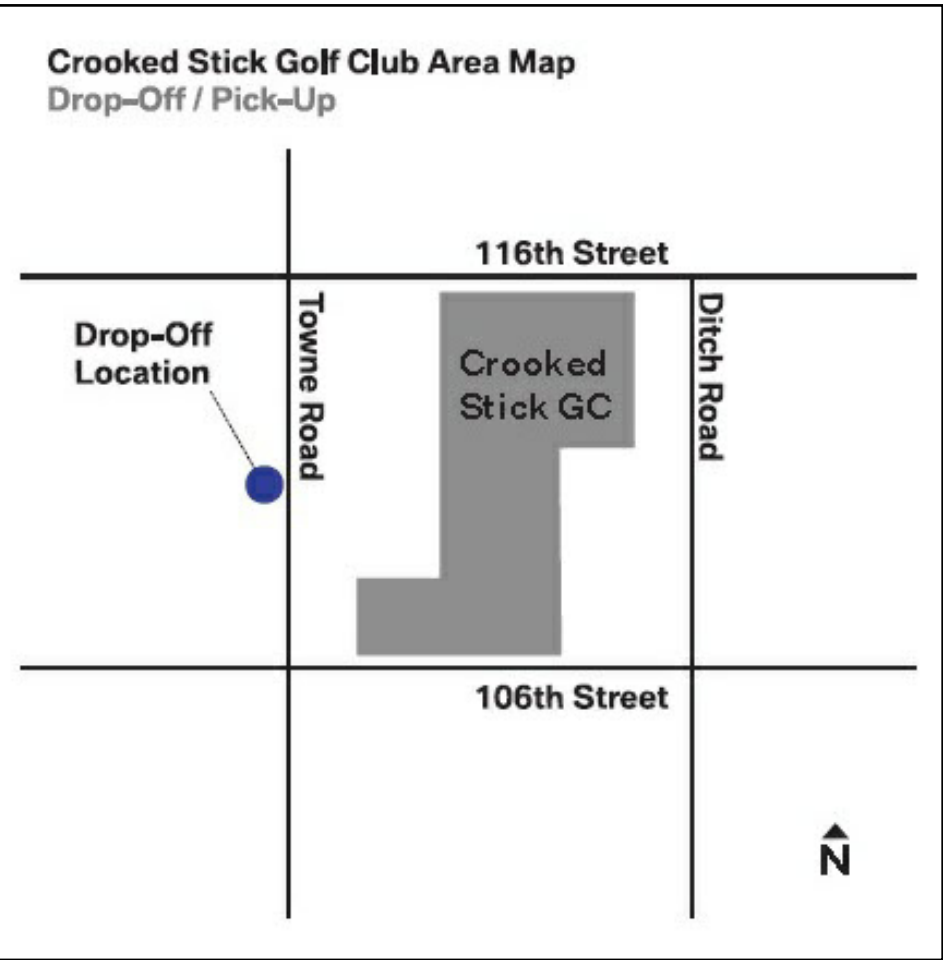
