Spectator parking changes announced for 2016 BMW Championship





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Another thriller?

Take it to the bank

Westfield coach Jake Gilbert is predicting that the Noblesville-Westfield game this Friday at Hare Chevrolet Stadium in Noblesville, "Will be a one-score game which comes down to the end."

Good prediction, Coach. It usually is just that when the Millers and Shamrocks meet in what has become one of the hottest rivalries in Hamilton County and one of the hottest rivalries in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference.

Six of the last seven games between the two foes have been separated by a grand total of 34 points. That's an average of 5.7 points a game. The only blowout in that stretch was Westfield's 42-14 victory five years ago.

Westfield won last year, 18-14. Noblesville won two years ago, 17-12.

Noblesville is 1-2 overall and 1-0 in the HCC after a 28-21 victory over Fishers last week. Earlier, the Millers lost to Lawrence North 21-17 and Carmel 24-9 in a pair of non-conference games.

Westfield is 3-0 after blasting HCC foe Zionsville 48-8 last Friday. Earlier, the Shamrocks knocked off Harrison 38-17 and Southport 27-0.

"I think Noblesville is underrated," said Gilbert. "They are very solid on defense and have always given us trouble. Their defensive line is excellent, especially against the run. Their linebackers are very fast and are great readers. I love their quarterback. He seems like a natural leader and is a work horse for them."

That Noblesville quarterback is Ryan Barnes, a junior who has passed for 428 yards and ran for 358 yards. He is the Mill-



ers' leading rusher, with Chandler Hurst second with 148 yards in 36 carries. Barnes has 65 carries. On the receiver end are Jackson Thurman with 16 catches for 254 vards and Ben Gruver with nine catches for 105 yards.

"We have a tremendous challenge ahead of us with a very balanced Westfield team," Noblesville coach Jason Simmons talked about the Shamrocks. "When you watch them on film, it is hard to find a weakness. They are a complimentary team with an aggressive mindset. Their offense is led by quarterback Andy Sweet. He is an electric play-maker in the run game and the passing game. Their offensive line is big, physical and well coached. We gave up some big plays in the first two weeks of the season that we will have to minimize this week if we are going to be able to slow down this high powered offense.

Noblesville's Chandler Hurst has rushed 36 times for 148 yards over the Millers' first three games of the season. Noblesville will host Westfield Friday night.

Cougars may come in firing

Sheridan coach Bud Wright has seen the stats on the Carroll football team his Blackhawks will face Friday at Larry Wright Stadium in Sheridan.

"They like to pass the football," said Wright. "We'll have to match up."

Carroll quarterback Trey Filbrun, a junior, has connected on 30-of-48 attempts for 638 yards and six touchdowns. Devon Anderson, a junior, has 14 receptions for 372 yards and senior Brandt McClain has caught eight passes for 140 yards.

So much for Carroll's stats.

"We rushed for 326 yards last week against North White and still lost," Wright said. "We should have won that game.

We've got to be more consistent," Wright continued. "We can't make silly mistakes. Some of our older players are making key mistakes. It's not always the same person."

Carroll will come to Sheridan undefeated, including victories over Tri-County 44-42, Delphi 33-7 and Tri-Central 35-6.

Sheridan is 1-2. The Blackhawks have lost heartbreakers to Western Boone 15-12 and North White 28-27 and have defeated Clinton Central 28-25.

While Carroll will want to throw, the Cougars can run the football. Senior James Spesard has carried 32 times for 180 yards and six touchdowns

Carroll has rushed for 13 touchdowns and passed for six.

Sheridan can pass the ball, but, of course, the Blackhawks are known for their rushing attack. They have rushed for 778 yards in 141 carries, led by Joe Callahan with 401 yards in 65 attempts. Kenny Burnell has carried 36 times for 187 yards and quarterback Drake Delph has carried 29 times for 104 yards.

Delph, a sophomore, has hit on 20-of-50 passes for 220.

"Delph is young, but he is doing a good job," said Wright.

His leading receivers are Brody Perry with seven catches for 118 yards and Gunnar Williams with seven receptions for 61 yards.

On defense for the Blackhawks, Cole Cummings leads in solo tackles with 15. Jesse Kolb has 13 and Nick Burnell, Hunter Pflugh and Alex Gipson 12 each.

"We just have to be more consistent," Wright said. "You shouldn't rush for over 300 yards and lose."

The Carmel-Pike football rivalry goes back years, but in recent MIC play the Greyhounds own a 3-0 edge. Carmel won last year 38-33; won 48-21 two years ago and won 40-32 three years ago.
