HAND plans groundbreaking...

For newest housing project

The Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development organization, known as HAND, hopes to break ground yet this year on its first housing project in the southern portion of the county. The private housing group currently has apartment complexes in Noblesville, Sheridan and Cicero for low to moderate income citizens. If the target date for starting construction cannot be met the start date will be spring of 2017.

HAND's program director Michelle Westemeier will go before county commissioners on Monday seeking \$30,000 in Community Block Grant money to complete funding of land acquisition for the planned Home Place Gardens development. The project will be built on a parcel of land that

Multi-vehicle accident on I-69 kills Fishers man

A six-vehicle crash on northbound Interstate 69 south of 96th Street claimed the life of a Fishers man and injured two others Thursday morning.

A multiple vehicle crash on northbound Interstate 69 just south of 96th Street claimed the life of a Fishers man Thursday morning.

At approximately 4:40 a.m., emergency crews responded to the area on reports of a serious multiple vehicle crash. Upon arrival, responders found three semi tractor-trailers and three passenger vehicles involved in this chain reaction crash. One driver of a passenger vehicle, Jaspreet Darrar, 23, of Fishers, was pronounced deceased at the scene and two other drivers were taken to the hospital with minor injuries.

Three lanes of I-69 were closed while the crash was investigated and the wreckage was removed.

Shortly before the six vehicle crash, construction crews had temporarily closed the northbound lanes of I-69 to set a bridge beam at 106th Street. During that closure, there was a separate crash on I-69 northbound just north of 96th Street in which both vehicles caught fire, causing all lanes

Government agencies to help displaced ITT employees

ITT Technical Institute employees who found themselves suddenly out of a job due to the sudden closure of the Carmel-based educational service will be getting some help from the state of Indiana.

Inside Indiana Business reported on Thursday that the Indiana Department of Workforce Development, EmployIndy and WorkOne Central have teamed up to activate the Rapid Response team. The primary focus will be on Carmel and Indi-

anapolis workers, helping them with such things as "resume assistance, interview workshops and skills assessments."

A total of 8,000 employees worked for ITT Tech across the country. Two former employees have filed a lawsuit against the company, saying that it violated the Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification Act, which requires employers to give 60 days advance notice before mass layoffs.

On the Monon Trail...

Sun King Brewery to open Carmel location next fall

A popular brewery announced plans to open a new location in Carmel.

Sun King Brewery will build a distillery and tap room in the city's downtown, along a place that's already popular: The Monon Trail. Sun King hopes to have its third location open by the fall of 2017.

The brewery already has two locations, one in downtown Indianapolis, and the other in Fishers, at 7848 E. 96th St. The Carmel location will have outdoor seating, a private event room, and a second-story balcony that overlooks the Monon.

stretches from 105th to 106th streets along the east side of McPherson Drive in Home Place.

HAND has secured \$1.2 million from the Indiana Housing Authority for construction of the complex that will have 10 living units. Most of the apartments will be for senior citizens with limited incomes. Two units will be reserved in cooperation with Prevail, for victims of domestic violence.

Chris Allen with the Noblesville Housing Authority which administers the Block Grant program will appear with HAND representatives at Monday's meeting. The two organizations work in cooperation with each other on the county's housing needs.

Also in the works is a second effort at arranging financing for a housing project on the site of the former Farm Bureau Co-op in Noblesville. HAND was turned down on that project early this year by the state housing authority, but there were indications that another try might be more successful.

At their Monday meeting Commissioners will also receive a proposal on providing the county with electronic poll books. Elections administrator Kathy Richardson has asked for funding previously, but met resistance from some County Council members. She was asked to get proposals

to once again be closed. Investigation into that crash determined a 2004 Mazda, driven by 23 year old Morgan Thomas of Indianapolis, rear ended a 36 foot box truck. The collision caused both vehicle to become engulfed in flames, however there were no reported injuries. Thomas was arrested on the suspicion of driving while intoxicated and taken to the Hamilton County Jail. The results of her certified blood alcohol test is pending.

Both accidents continue to be ongoing investigations.

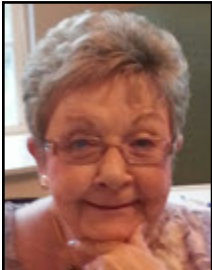

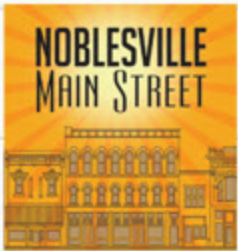

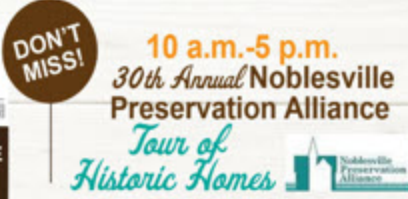

Catchings joined the Indiana franchise in 2001 when she was the club’s first-round draft selection – just one year after the club was established. Since that time, she has been the face of the franchise through 16 seasons, 13 playoff appearances, eight visits to the conference finals, three trips to the WNBA Finals and a 2012 WNBA championship.

Despite over 520 games in a Fever jersey and the owner of virtually every record in Fever history, Catchings is much more than a basketball player. She has routinely earned distinction as one of the nation’s finest citizen-athletes with committed community engagement throughout the country and even internationally. In 2015, she was inaugural winner of the ESPN Sports Humanitarian of the Year. Earlier this summer, she became the first two-time recipient of the WNBA’s Dawn Staley Community Leadership Award. In November, she will be honored in consecutive weeks with the Pathfinder Award by the Indiana Sports Corporation, honoring those who improve the lives of America’s youth; and the Musial Award by the St. Louis Sports Commission, for extraordinary sportsmanship.

Universally liked by fans, coaches and fellow players, Catchings also is a two-time winner of the WNBA’s Kim Perrot Sportsmanship Award.

With her base in Indianapolis, Catchings has become a local community icon, revered and respected by players, coaches, youth, parents, corporate partners, executives and civic leaders. Catchings’ Catch The Stars Foundation (CTSF) has become a respected charitable agency that spread its roots during a league-wide Legacy Tour as part of her final pro season. She has served as an international ambassador with the NBA and WNBA, the Women’s Sports Foundation and the State Department of the United States.

Legacy Tour postgame events in each of 12 WNBA cities included a \$2,000 gift to a local charity in every city. Founded in 2004, CTSF was established to host fitness clinics and basketball camps, but has ballooned to include mentoring programs for boys and girls, a scholarship program for high school student-athletes, and reading corners in area schools and Riley Children’s Hospital.
