I played on the senior league basketball team. Each Saturday morning, Morris, whose family lived in the same house as the Jellisons on west Maple Street, would load up the van and we would travel to play another Boys Club. 



Westfield scored two more touchdowns in the fourth period. The first one came in another big play, with quarterback Cameron Nance (who was subbing for the injured Andy Sweet) making a pass to Evan Manley.
