Schwartz agrees housing juveniles from other counties would help bring down the cost of operating the facility. "That was the plan 10 years ago when the facility was built. 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

# Three more intersections close Sept. 19

#### **106th Street and Towne Road**

This intersection will be closed on or after Sept. 19th for about 45 days for construction of a roundabout. Detour routes will be posted, using Ditch Road, Shelborne Road, 96th Street, and 116th Street. The existing signalized intersection will be at all times. The intersection will be closed reconstructed to a multi-lane roundabout. to thru traffic for the duration of The reconstruction will include new fulldepth pavement, curb and gutter, an traffic being detoured along 146th Street and enclosed storm water system, shared-use path, and sidewalk with new curb ramps. #### City Center Drive and Pennsylvania Street

This intersection will be closed on or after Sept. 19th for 45 days for construction of a roundabout. Detour routes will be posted, using Carmel Drive, Guilford Road, and 116th Street. The existing T-intersection will be fully reconstructed to a multi-lane roundabout. The reconstruction will include new full-depth pavement, curb and gutter, an enclosed storm water system, shared-use path and sidewalk with new curb ramps. The private drive for the hotel, on the west side of the roundabout, will be reconstructed. #### **Carey Road Roundabouts**

The roundabouts planned for Carey Road at both 136th Street and Hawthorne Drive will be reconstructed in unison to reduce the long-term impact on the residents of Carmel. The temporary closure of these intersections will begin on or after Monday, Sept. 19th for 45 days.

# Southbound US 31 restrictions near 116th Street begin today

Beginning after the morning rush hour today, Sept. 14, crews plan to restrict southbound US 31 to two lanes near 116th Street to smooth the pavement on the bridge approaches.

These lane restrictions are expected to

a single lane roundabout. This project will include new full-depth pavement, curb and gutter, an enclosed storm water system and a shared-use path with new curb ramps. Any private drives located within the limits of the intersection reconstruction will be replaced. Access to residential properties within the project limits will be maintained construction, roughly 45 days, with thru Gray Road.

The roundabout construction will include, but not be limited to, new full depth pavement, concrete curb and gutter, new storm drainage features and use of existing drainage features, reconstruction of existing sidewalks within the project limits and new ADA compliant curb ramps. Permanent Right of Way will need to be acquired in the southeast and northeast quadrants of the roundabout. The intersection will be closed to through traffic during the construction of the roundabout, roughly 45 days. The detour route is tentatively planned to use 146th Street and Keystone Avenue.

#### Current city paving projects

Residents may also see occasional lane paving projects. A map and list of remaining 2016 paving projects can be found on the

>>> Carey Road and 136th Street: This completed more than 75 percent of its projects, paving about 23 lane miles of road this year. Most of the remaining projects will be done by the end of October, weather permitting.

#### **City Projects in Process:** 116th & Grav Road

Utility relocation work continues. Construction should begin in the next couple of weeks. Detour routes are posted. Please use Keystone and Hazel Dell for north-south traffic, 96th Street for east-west traffic.

#### **3rd Avenue SW**

This utility improvement project is >>> Carey Road and Hawthorne Drive: mostly completed and the road is open. There is still some storm water work to be done west of the road, so please use caution if you see road crews or construction equipment present.

#### **Range Line Road & Carmel Drive**

Utility relocation work continues at this intersection. Construction is set to begin within the week. Local traffic is flowing better. Local businesses are still open. This project is still scheduled for a mid-November completion, weather and work permitting.

#### 126th Street

Restriction remains in place. Utility work continues in the south lane of 126th Street. This street will remain open only to westbound traffic between Range Line Road and Keystone Parkway through the remainder of the project. The city anticipates west bound traffic moving to the newly paved lanes in four to six weeks.



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

# **Carmel set to leap into MIC race**

Carmel has found its way back into the state's Class 6A football rankings. The Greyhounds this week are ranked No. 8.

Now, a week later, can Carmel get back into the MIC Conference chase?

Coach John Hebert's team is 2-2 overall and 1-1 in the conference. In the MIC, the Greyhounds have lost to Center Grove 19-6 and last week defeated Pike 65-27. In non-conference play, Carmel has lost to Southeastern 27-21 and defeated Noblesville 24-9.

In comparing scores, this week's foe, Lawrence North, has defeated Noblesville 21-17. The Wildcats have lost to Brownsburg 13-8 and in Hoosier Crossroads Conference play they have lost to Lawrence Central 27-25 and defeated North Central 35-27.

Carmel has defeated Lawrence North 11 consecutive times, last losing 23-18 in 2004.

"Lawrence North has a very physical and talented football team," said Hebert. "Each year Coach Mallory has been there, they have improved drastically and are now conference contenders."

Carmel has proven it can defeat opponents both on the ground and through the air.

"We battled with Pike tightly in the first quarter until we were able to get some stops defensively against their high powered offensive attack," Hebert talked about last week's win

"Our offensive line provided opportunities for running backs Camari Hunt, Jerome Halsell and Jalen Walker. They all ran very well. Jake McDonald had an outstanding night, going 14-of-16 and passing for six touchdowns."

McDonald has been red-hot. He's 50-of-70 for 623 yards and 10 touchdowns and has been intercepted only two times.

Walker leads the team with 18 receptions for 201 yards. Ethan Merriweather has 14 catches for 220 yards Kurt Rafdal has caught 11 balls for 100 yards.

Carmel has been just as tough on the ground. Halsell has carried 55 times for 264 yards and Hunt 26 times for 169 yards.

The Greyhounds have passed for 10 touchdowns and rushed for four scores.

"This game will be a battle from start to finish," Hebert predicts.

"We hope to protect the football; limit big plays, and be solid in special teams in order to have an opportunity to win this game.'

# **Fishers needs a victory**


