

Sheriff's juvenile center could be on chopping block

By JEFF JELLISON

Sheriff Mark Bowen found himself facing a rarely united and low number of detainees. Hamilton County Council Wednesday during the council's annual budget meeting.

The issue was the county's juvenile detention center.

Council members want the Sheriff to ship juvenile offenders to other counties and use the detention center for adult prisoners.

The Sheriff wants to continue housing juveniles in what he described as a state of the art facility.

Council members expressed concern over the detention center's operating cost

Bowen is concerned about the cost of housing juveniles in other counties. "It would cost approximately \$500,000 per year to ship our juveniles around the state to other detention facilities," stated Bowen.

The Sheriff is also concern with what type of care Hamilton County juvenile offenders would receive outside Hamilton County. "If we send those kids to other facilities in other communities we don't know what kind of treatment or programming they are getting."

The discussion between the Sheriff and council will continue today. The budget meetings are scheduled to conclude Friday.

Noblesville Schools announces Homecoming plans



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


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


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Phyllis Louise Church

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



It's still early in the season. It is very early in the conference. But, the Northwestern at Hamilton Heights football game Friday could go a long ways in deciding the divisional winner in the Hoosier Conference.

The visiting Tigers are undefeated. They are 4-0 and 1-0 in the Hoosier. The host Huskies are undefeated. They are 3-0 overall and 1-0 in the Hoosier.

Both teams have defeated conference foe Lewis Cass, Northwestern by a 34-14 and Hamilton Heights by a 35-12 spread.

That comparison, alone, should predict a dilly of a football game.

"They are a team that is undefeated and playing very good football," Heights coach Mitch Street talks about Northwestern. "They have beaten badly every team they have played and have dominated the games.

"Their offense is one that is going to control the football, and is incredibly difficult to stop. They are big and physical on both sides of the ball. I'm really impressed with their motors on the defensive side of the ball.

"It will be a very tough test for us," Street continued. "It's not a team that you can make a lot of mistakes or turn the ball over much, or you're going to be in trouble."

Along with the win over Cass, Northwestern has defeated Clinton Central 47-7, Twin Lakes 34-7 and Benton Central

Hamilton Heights also has beaten Mt. Vernon 34-27 and Tipton 20-14.

Northwestern can pass or run. Quarterback Trey Richmond is 19-of-46 for 493 yards. His main receiver is Noah Dowden with 13 catches for 343 yards. On the ground, Evan Cardwell has carried 126 times for 857 yards.

Hamilton Heights has the same type of offense. Quarterback Josh Feltz is 39-of-66 for 675 yards throwing the pigskin. He has a host of receivers, including Sterling Weatherford with seven catches for 134 yards, Jesse Brown with nine for 179, Riley White with seven for 107 and Caymn Lutz with seven for 144 yards. On the ground for the Huskies, Clayton Cowan has 37 carries for 281 yards.

Heights' defense is led by Zach Stevens with 25 solo tackles, Cowan with 21, Lutz with 20 and White with 19. White and Lutz offense, which was critical. each has two interceptions.


