Discussion continues today...

## Sheriff’s juvenile center could be on chopping block

Sheriff Mark Bowen found himself facing a rarely united Hamilton County Council Wednesday during the council’s annual budget meeting.

The issue was the county’s juvenile detention center.

Council members want the Sheriff to ship juvenile offenders to other counties and use the detention center for adult prisoners.

The Sheriff wants to continue housing juveniles in what he described as a state of the art facility.

Council members expressed concern over the detention center’s operating cost and low number of detainees.

Bowen is concerned about the cost of housing juveniles in other counties. “It would cost approximately \$500,000 per year to ship our juveniles around the state to other detention facilities,” stated Bowen.

The Sheriff is also concern with what type of care Hamilton County juvenile offenders would receive outside Hamilton County. “If we send those kids to other facilities in other communities we don’t know what kind of treatment or programming they are getting.”

The discussion between the Sheriff and council will continue today. The budget meetings are scheduled to conclude Friday.

## Noblesville Schools announces Homecoming plans

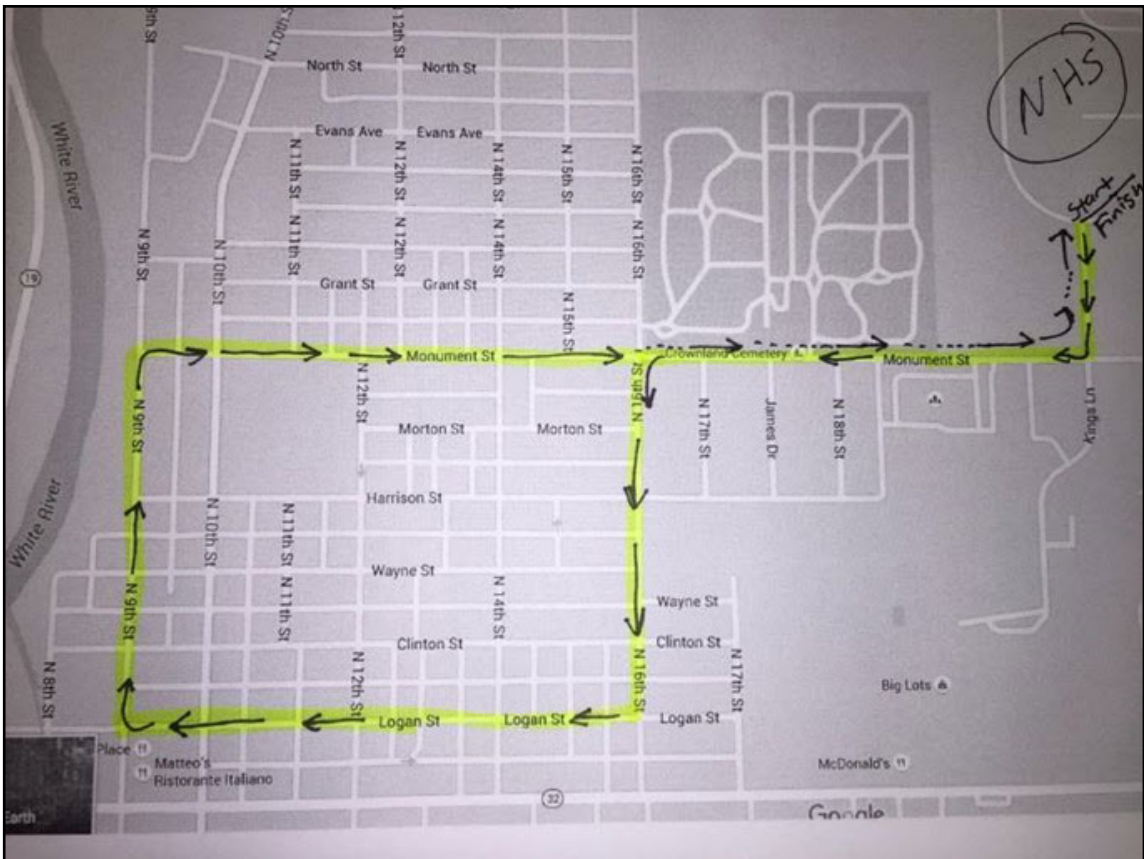

This is the parade route for the Noblesville Homecoming parade, which takes place at 4 p.m. Friday, Sept. 23. The Homecoming football game between the Millers and Hamilton Heights will start at 7:30 p.m. that night, with the semi-formal Homecoming dance beginning at 8 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 24.

Noblesville Schools has released its schedule of festivities for Homecoming, which takes place next week.

## IU Health employees to volunteer at Cool Creek Park Friday

On Friday, September 16, an army of dedicated volunteers from IU Health, IU Health North and Saxony Hospitals will join with Hamilton County Parks staff to undertake improvements to Cool Creek Park that will add to the enjoyment of park visits for years to come. Annually, since 2013, IU Health has partnered with Hamilton County Parks for their *Day of Service* program that represents an extension of the health care provider’s initiatives to enhance the health of the communities they serve. Those initiatives may include the promotion of fitness, nutrition and education. Past projects with Hamilton County Parks, have ranged from the installation of exercise equipment along park trails, to the creation of a full-scale community garden. In addition to the valued labor provided by hospital staff,

IU Health staff will provide in excess of over 200 volunteer man hours in support of the yearly collaborative effort. “We are extremely proud to once again partner with IU Health North and Saxony Hospitals,” said Hamilton County Parks Director, Al Patterson, “and remain grateful for the role IU Health plays in supporting our department’s mission to provide quality recreational services and facilities for Hamilton County residents and visitors.”

This year, nearly 100 hospital volunteers and park staff will work to improve Cool Creek Park’s popular nature center, greenhouse, grounds, trails and playground. To beat the heat during the day’s labors, volunteers and park staff will be treated to icy refreshments, courtesy of Kona Ice. Don Nicholls, with the parks department added, “It is

always gratifying to see the volunteers leave at the end of their shift, tired and sweaty, but smiling, knowing that they have personally made a difference in improving their community.”

Hospital personnel with responsibilities preventing them from volunteering in the park, will remain on site at their respective facilities, to place milkweed seeds in packets. The packets will then be distributed free to the public, as part of the park department’s ongoing Mission Monarch program, intended to increase the reduced monarch butterfly population.

# Andie Kalembe to throw out first pitch for College GameDay softball

The third annual “College GameDay” softball event will be held at Grand Park on Sunday, featuring 14 collegiate softball programs. The Opening Ceremonies at 10:40 a.m. will include special guest Andie Kalembe to throw the first pitch and Carol Bruggeman, executive director of National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) as featured speaker.

Andie Kalembe, from Saint John, Indiana, was diagnosed with a rare genetic condition called Fanconi Anemia at eight months old. Now 13 years old and still battling the disease, Andie was matched with the Valparaiso University softball program through Team Impact, a nonprofit organization that creates team-based support systems for children facing life-threatening and chronic illnesses. The Valparaiso team officially signed Andie to the softball program in the spring and she has been an active participant at practices and home games ever since. “We’re excited to host this college softball event in its 3rd year at Grand Park. The opening ceremonies of this year’s event will be especially meaningful with Andie Kalembe throwing the first pitch and bringing attention to the Team Impact organization,” said Westfield Mayor Andy Cook. “We’re also honored to have Carol Bruggeman as a featured speaker.”

Carol Bruggeman, Executive Director of NFCA, is one of the biggest names in softball. Bruggeman is a longtime NCAA Division I coach at Michigan, Purdue and Louisville, and a well-respected national speaker, clinician, educator and author. During her career, Bruggeman has been a part of over 700 victories, and has had a hand in many conference titles and coached numerous NFCA All-Americans.

Of the 14 teams attending College GameDay, 10 come from the Division I rank, including Indiana University, Purdue University, Ball State University, Butler University, Miami University (OH), Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis (IUPUI), Indiana State University, University of Evansville, Valparaiso University and Western Kentucky University. Additionally, the four remaining programs are from the ranks of Division II and NAIA Athletic Divisions. Saint Joseph’s College (Indiana and University of Indianapolis will be representing the Great Lakes Vally Conference (DII). Grace College and Marian University will represent the Crossroads League (NAIA).

Each program will compete in at least one game against another top-notch program. Play will begin at 11 a.m. with batting practice available to the public at roughly 9:30 a.m. Second round games will begin at 1:15 p.m., followed by the third and final round of games beginning at roughly 3:15 p.m. [The full schedule can be found at this link](#).

Here's a list of events and themed dress-up days for Homecoming:


Monday - Frat/Preppy Day. This day is also the first to buy Homecoming t-shirts; they cost \$10.

# Millers to test Zionsville

Noblesville is just 1-3 this season, but with a 1-1 mark the Millers are very much in the chase for a Hoosier Crossroads Conference title. To remain that way, the Millers will need to win a tough Friday battle at Zionsville.

Coach Jason Simmons says much more is at stake.

"We have an opportunity to represent our community and school this way," said the coach. "We need to take pride in what Noblesville stands for and bounce back from our tough performance."

That will need to come against a tough Zionsville team. The Eagles have defeated Pike 55-35, Lebanon 55-54 and Brebeuf 33-25 and have dropped their only conference game, falling to Westfield 48-8.

In comparing scores, Noblesville lost to Westfield last week, 28-7. The Millers also have fallen to Lawrence North 21-17 and Carmel 24-9 in non-conference games and in a HCC contest they have defeated Fishers 28-21.

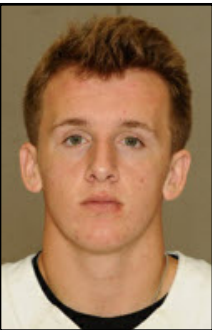
# Royals, Rocks go to war

# Northwestern at Heights

It's still early in the season. It is very early in the conference. But, the Northwestern at Hamilton Heights football game Friday could go a long ways in deciding the divisional winner in the Hoosier Conference.

The visiting Tigers are undefeated. They are 4-0 and 1-0 in the Hoosier. The host Huskies are undefeated. They are 3-0 overall and 1-0 in the Hoosier.

Both teams have defeated conference foe Lewis Cass, Northwestern by a 34-14 and Hamilton Heights by a 35-12 spread.

That comparison, alone, should predict a dilly of a football game.

"They are a team that is undefeated and playing very good football," Heights coach Mitch Street talks about Northwestern. "They have beaten badly every team they have played and have dominated the games.

"Their offense is one that is going to control the football, and is incredibly difficult to stop. They are big and physical on both sides of the ball. I'm really impressed with their motors on the defensive side of the ball.

"It will be a very tough test for us," Street continued. "It's not a team that you can make a lot of mistakes or turn the ball over much, or you're going to be in trouble."

Along with the win over Cass, Northwestern has defeated Clinton Central 47-7, Twin Lakes 34-7 and Benton Central 55-0.

Hamilton Heights also has beaten Mt. Vernon 34-27 and Tipton 20-14.

Northwestern can pass or run. Quarterback Trey Richmond is 19-of-46 for 493 yards. His main receiver is Noah Dowden with 13 catches for 343 yards. On the ground, Evan Cardwell has carried 126 times for 857 yards.

Hamilton Heights has the same type of offense. Quarterback Josh Feltz is 39-of-66 for 675 yards throwing the pigskin. He has a host of receivers, including Sterling Weatherford with seven catches for 134 yards, Jesse Brown with nine for 179, Riley White with seven for 107 and Caymn Lutz with seven for 144 yards. On the ground for the Huskies, Clayton Cowan has 37 carries for 281 yards.

Heights' defense is led by Zach Stevens with 25 solo tackles, Cowan with 21, Lutz with 20 and White with 19. White and Lutz each has two interceptions.

"I think we did some really good things against Tipton last week," Street said. "I thought we improved in some areas we needed to improve in. I thought defensively we did a much better job of getting off the field and avoiding long drives. Offensively, we had to establish a running game and we were able to do that. I thought Clayton Cowan ran the ball very well, and the

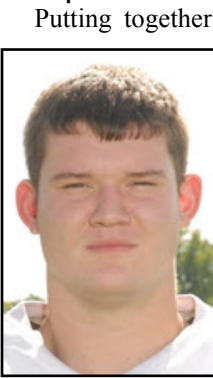

# Eastern next up for Sheridan

Putting together a scouting report for Sheridan's next football game this week hasn't been easy for Coach Bud Wright and his staff.

The Blackhawks play at Eastern on Friday in a Hoosier Heartland Conference game.

The Comets are 1-3 and have yet to play a conference game. Sheridan is 1-3 and owns a 1-0 conference record.

"The problem is," explained Wright, "is that quarterback Scott Mullenix played the first half of Eastern's opener; missed two games with an injury, and last week returned to play defense only. He got in only a couple of offensive plays.

"When Mullenix has played, Eastern has looked pretty good," Wright said.

Eastern opened its season losing to Oak Hill 27-10, Madison Grant 23-12 and Tri-County 32-14. Last weekend the Comets streaked by Frontier 40-0. They have yet to play a conference game.

On defense, Cole Cummings leads with 18 solo tackles, while Jesse Kolb and Alex Gipson each has 17.

"We're working hard on the mental part of the game," said Wright. "Hopefully that will help with the mistakes we're making."

In the only conference meeting between the two teams, Sheridan slammed Eastern 50-21 last season.
