# Council accepts Sheriff's plan

On Wednesday the Hamilton County Council gave adult inmates. Sheriff Mark Bowen less than 24 hours to find acceptable solution to the county's overcrowded jail, and a Juvenile was fiscally irresponsible.

The council had suggested shipping juveniles to other counties and transforming the Juvenile Services Center into a facility capable of holding adults, easing jail overcrowding and reducing the county's cost to house juvenile offenders.

Bowen disagreed with the council. The Sheriff wanted to keep juvenile offenders in Hamilton County and build

additional jail space capable of housing an additional 240

Thursday Bowen stood before the council during their budget meetings and presented a plan he felt would satisfy Services Center that council members unanimously agreed council members, without having to house juvenile offenders outside Hamilton County.

Bowen's plan is to move juvenile offenders into the former juvenile detention center that now houses high risk prisoners. Female prisoners that are currently in the main jail would then occupy the Juvenile Services Center creating space in the jail for high risk prisoners. The shuffle of Dillon was not in attendance at Thursday's meeting. inmates would also ease overcrowding in the jail.

Bowen told the council his plan would maximize the use of staff and facilities, provide a more secure facility for juveniles, provide an opportunity to generate revenue by housing juveniles from other counties, allow juvenile offenders to continue with educational services through local schools and would continue to allow juveniles local access to attorneys and probation officers.

Council members voted 5-1 to accept Bowen's plan. Councilman Steve Schwartz voted no, stating he wanted more time to review the plan. Council member Dr. James

Bowen will return to the council in December to seek funding for the proposed expansion of the adult jail.

### **Several West** Nile reports in **Hamilton County**

The Hamilton County Health Department has reported several positive tests for West Nile virus this summer

The most recent test came last Tuesday, Sept. 6, when a sample taken at State Road 32 and Hazel Dell Road tested positive, according to the Hamilton County Health Department's website. The area was subsequently sprayed a day later. The first positive tests of the summer were at Dillon Park, located at 146th Street and Hazel Dell, and at 116th Street and Keystone Parkway; both had positive tests on July 15.

Two locations have each had two positive tests for West Nile: Meadowlark Park, which is located north of Main Street and just west of the Monon Trail in Carmel, and in the area of 103rd and New Jersey streets, in unincorporated Clay Township. Carmel has seen other samples tests positive this summer at 98th Street and Chambray Drive between Westfield Boulevard and Keystone) and 116th Street and Shelborne

Other samples have tested positive in the town of Atlanta, and on 5th Street in Sheridan. Most locations were sprayed quickly after the tests were returned.

While most people who get West Nile will not show any signs of the disease, occasionally those infected will get a more severe form, which includes "swelling of the brain or the tissues that cover the braind and spinal cord," according to the Indiana State Department of Health Epidemiology Resource Center. Symptoms include high

## **ITT officially** ends operations today

After 70 years, ITT Technical Institute will officially end all operations

Carmel-based educational services company has been fraught with problems that have snowballed over the last month, but it appears the final blow came Thursday, when the Indianapolis Business Journal reported that its senior lender, Cerebrus Business Finance LLC of New York, seized ITT's bank accounts.

IBJ reported that Cerebrus was demanding an immediate payment of a loan that totaled around \$34.5 million, then also informed ITT that it was taking "control over the company's bank accounts."

A total of 8,000 employees worked for ITT Tech across the country.

ITT Tech had 130 campuses serving over 40,000 students in 38 states. The company granted over \$260 million in scholarships in 2014, according to its now defunct website. It was founded in 1946, and moved to Carmel in 1969.



#### Indianapolis-Carmel ranked No. 9 swim city

The Indianapolis-Carmel community is the No. 9 swim city in America according to a third-annual study commissioned by USA Swimming and leading swimwear company Speedo USA. The city moved up 10 spots to place in the top 10 for the second time since the study's debut in 2014. The San Jose-Santa Clara area claimed the No. 1 spot this year.

Rounding out the top 10 of the 50 Top Swim Cities, Presented by Speedo USA, were Ann Arbor, Mich.; Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk, Conn.; Austin, Texas; Madison, Wisc.; Washington, D.C.; Raleigh-Cary, N.C.; Fort Collins-Loveland, Colo.; and the San Francisco-Oakland, Calif., Bay Area.

"I believe there is a rich history of swimming in central Indiana; the number of great facilities and coaches make us a successful swimming area," said Chris Plumb, Head Coach of Carmel Swim Club. "Being one of the top swim cities means we are doing a fantastic job of teaching young people how to be successful in and out of the pool.'

The Indianapolis-Carmel area has hosted multiple USA Swimming national and international meets including the 2015 Duel in the Pool at the Indiana University Natatorium, the largest indoor pool in the United States. The area also boasts the most USA Swimming clubs for areas with a population under two-million. The popularity of the sport is reflected in local Carmel High School, which has won 30 straight state girls swimming titles.

Indianapolis moved up 10 places from 2015 to take the No. 9 spot this year and numerous other cities made their debut into the top 50. Roanoke, Va., had the biggest jump, moving up 49 spots to No. 45 on the list. Louisville, Ky., gained 42 spots to crack the top 50 at No. 48 for 2016, and Atlantic City, N.J., jumped 41 spots from 88 to 47. Omaha, Neb., host city of the 2016 U.S. Olympic Team Trials – Swimming, also had a notable jump within the top 50, advancing 33 spots from 50 in 2015 to 17 this year.
