# Most county GOP leaders attend Fall Dinner

In an obvious move to create party unity Hamilton County Republicans rallied Thursday night for their annual Fall Dinner. Despite infighting earlier in the year, most of the county leadership including virtually all elected officials were present with a crowd of 300 to 400 at the Ritz Charles in Carmel.

It was a victory for County GOP Chairwoman Laura Campbell who is still involved in a competition of sorts with her party treasurer Pete Peterson

The latest chapter involves two political events being scheduled at the same time Thursday night.

Mrs. Campbell and party regulars set the 15th date for the annual Fall Dinner. Other Republicans set a fundraiser Thursday night for Curtis Hill, candidate for attorney general in this fall's election.

Was the conflict in dates a coincidence? Not entirely likely, and some party leaders were not happy about it. Sponsors of the Hill event claim it was the only night he could schedule the fundraiser which was held at the Forrest Lucas mansion.

Peterson, not present at the official party function, was Campbell's opponent in the contest for party chair last

January. He won Round 1 of their competition when he was elected chairman to fill a vacancy in the party's top spot.

The now chairwoman, Mrs. Campbell, won Round 2 when the state Republican Central Committee stepped in a few weeks later and declared her the rightful winner. She contested Peterson's victory, claiming he won with 11th hour precinct committee appointments that were not properly reported.

Some Peterson supporters boycotted the party's Lincoln Day Dinner this spring. But, Campbell claimed a successful event with a near-record crowd.

Now it appears that some of the same folks involved in that boycott have participated in the Curtis Hill appearance on the night of the Fall Dinner and reportedly encouraged major party donors to attend their event.

These donors are often vendors doing business with local government. Several mayors and county commissioners who control local government endorsed Peterson for county chairman, but all except Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness and Westfield Mayor Andy Cook showed up at Ritz Charles in a show of party unity.

It all has the appearance of a melodrama with Round 3 set for March of next year when the party has its quadrennial reorganization. Peterson may run again for chairman although he has not announced that, and he won't be participating because he lost his precinct committeeman race in May.

The reorganization caucus provides only committeemen and their vice committeeman may vote for new officers.

How does all this affect the average citizen? On the surface, probably not a

whole lot, but indirectly the party leadership has some influence with the state administration which makes certain appointments and can sometimes channel funds for public projects to the county.

Therefore, a chairman of the same party as the governor can considerably help his or her locality. And, in a county like Hamilton with a lot of votes, that's not an insignificant matter.

A big plurality of those votes may become critical to the success of the statewide Republican ticket. So, the message Thursday night was all geared toward to a simple plea to unite and get the vote out on Nov. 8.

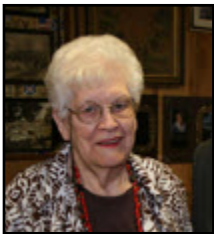

The Class 5A No. 8 Eagles scored the first touchdown of the game, but the Millers were in control after that, running and passing effectively and making big plays on defense. Noblesville coach Jason Simmons said he felt like his team executed its game plan "in all three phases of the game fairly well."

Simmons also said his team "played with a lot of energy and a lot of passion. They played for each other."

After Zionsville scored, the Millers got right on the board. Alex Foster made a big run to get the ball into the end zone, and Chandler Hurst carried it in from the 2 yard line. That was the first of three rushing touchdowns for Noblesville.

Noblesville got back on the ground in the third quarter, with Barnes carrying the ball in from the 4 for the first score of the second half. Jack Knight added a 40-yard field goal with 1:44 left in the third, and a minute later, Tyler Gonzalez charged ahead 24 yards to get in the end zone.

The Millers' final touchdown of the game came from another pass, a 22-yarder from Barnes to Nolan Ginther. Knight successfully kicked all six extra points.

Simmons was quick to credit Noblesville's linemen - Seth Pope, Daric Gordon, Ben Collins, Drew Hartmann, Alex Holtz, as well as Drew Scheib and Ginther - for playing well. Hurst, Gonzalez and Foster had solid running games, taking the pressure off of Barnes, who had been making many a carry for the Millers.

The Millers are presently 2-1 in the HCC, part of a three-way tie for second with Hamilton Southeastern and Westfield. Brownsburg leads the conference with a 2-0 mark.

Noblesville takes a break from the HCC next week to host 3A No. 7 Hamilton Heights. It will be the Millers' Homecoming game, and will kick off at 7:30 p.m.
