"Guests get to play golf like they have never played it before," Parks Director Brandon


Bennett said. "This is going to be an awesome family event. The glow in the dark adds a whole new element of fun to golf."

Two-minute drill drives it home for Royals

At each of its Thursday practices, the Hamilton Southeastern football team goes through two-minute offensive drills.

"Every day before our games we go through scenarios just like that," said Royals quarterback Adam Mullett.

That practice made perfect for HSE on Friday in its game at Westfield. Mullett and his receiving corps put together a sensational two-minute drive in the waning minutes of the fourth quarter that culminated in a 21-yard touchdown pass from Mullett to Max Brooks.

That touchdown tied the game at 20-all with 34 seconds left. Tyler Melser then kicked an extra point to get the Royals ahead 21-20. Southeastern then held off a final push by the Shamrocks, and won the game.

"There's nothing easy," said HSE coach Scott May. "I knew it was going to be a battle. I knew it was going to come down to the end of the game. I'm not sure I could've drawn it up like that, but I'm happy with the outcome.'

The win moves the Class 6A No. 9 Royals to 4-1 for the season, while it was the first loss of the year for the 5A No. 2 Shamrocks. Both teams are 2-1 in Hoosier Crossroads Conference play, and are part of a three-way tie for second place in the league, with Noblesville. Brownsburg leads the HCC at 2-0.

After a back-and-forth game, Westfield had the ball on the Royals' 29-yard line with 2:57 left. Southeastern held the 'Rocks to three yards on that drive, and used all of its timeouts, putting Westfield at fourth-and-7 at the HSE 26.

Will Harrison then stepped up and blasted a 43-yard field goal, to move the Shamrocks ahead 20-14. But, thanks to the Royals' time-out strategy, they still had 2:30


