TopGolf coming to Fishers

One of the most innovative sports entertainment venues in the United States will be coming soon to Hamilton County. TopGolf announced that it will be opening a location in Fishers during the Winter of 2017. As its name suggests, golf is the central focus of TopGolf - think of it as a 21st century driving range with a new twist on the traditional aim of hitting a golf ball as far as you can to the hole.

The signature game, according to TopGolf's website (<http://topgolf.com/us/play/games/>) involves hitting a ball

into one of the targets on the range. "The more accurate your shot and the farther the distance, the more points you earn," according to the game's website description. Unlike regular golf, players want their score to be high. There are several different variations on the TopGolf game, including TopChip, TopDrive and TopScramble.

TopGolf has a full menu, including drinks, appetizers, hamburgers and sliders, salads and dessert. In addition, there are late-night entertainment options, golf lessons and

leagues, and plenty of TVs as well for viewing every kind of sport.

TopGolf has 26 locations in the United States, and three in the United Kingdom. The closest locations to Hamilton County are two in the Chicagoland area, and another in West Chester, Ohio. Eight other American locations are due to open soon, including the one in Fishers.

100,000 coming to town ...

Atlanta Earth Festival

What community with a population under 800 can pull off a two-day festival which is predicted to draw a crowd of more than 100,000?

Simple answer.

Atlanta, Indiana and the Atlanta New Earth Festival.

The free admission event, first held in 1974 and held every fourth weekend in September, is set for this Saturday and Sunday. It will be open on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sundays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

It's such a huge event that the Hamilton County Sheriff Department has announced that some streets in Atlanta will be closed.

"Streets will be affected beginning today due to set up and will be closed on Saturday and Sunday," announced Hamilton County Sheriff Deputy Bryan Oren "Hamilton County Sheriff deputies will be in the area assisting with traffic, parking and security throughout the festival."

The New Earth Festival will attract approximately 600 vendors of fine art crafts, antiques, and food.

"We expect heavy traffic on State Road 19 throughout the weekend," Orem added.

For murder of Hannah Wilson...

Messel sentenced to 80 years in prison

The man convicted of the murder of Hamilton Southeastern graduate Hannah Wilson will likely spend the rest of his life in prison.

A Brown County judge sentenced Daniel Messel to 80 years behind bars Thursday. Messel, 51, had been found guilty of killing Wilson in April 2015. Her body was found near Plum Creek in rural Brown County; the 22-year-old Wilson was only a few weeks away from graduating from Indiana University in Bloomington.

Wilson's parents and younger sister all spoke at the sentencing hearing. Brown County Circuit Court Judge Judith Stewart then sentenced Messel to 60 years for the murder charge and 20 years for a habitual offender charge. Messel had a previous conviction, which allowed him to be designated a habitual offender. Messel plans to appeal.

That's a boy, Jason....

Coach fights for his team

Lots of people will say I'm wrong in writing this. So, what's new? Folks have said as much on other occasions for more than 50 years.

Here are my thoughts on Noblesville football coach Jason Simmons sitting out tonight's homecoming game with Hamilton Heights, the results of Simmons being ejected from a game last Friday because of an unsportsmanlike penalty.

Good for you, Mr. Simmons. Good for you, Coach.

Right or wrong, Jason, as I understand the situation, thought his Millers were getting dumped on, and that brought on the incident.

Coach was fighting for his kids. Fighting, just as each Friday he asks his Millers to do the same.

This isn't going to happen to Simmons often. Maybe never again. But, from my corner, I like a coach who stands up for his players. That's what Jason did.

I have no problem with the IHSAA coming down with the one game suspension. That's the rule, as I've always been told. Player or coach, ejection means a one game penalty.

Whatever, here we are tonight with Hamilton Heights coming to Hare Chevrolet Field for Noblesville's 68th annual Homecoming. That's what assistant athletic director Tony Oiler is pointing out in a very well done game report. The first Homecoming, according to Tony, was in 1949 when the Millers defeated Tipton, 26-14.

I don't remember that one, but it was only a few years later that I became a student at NHS and I do remember how exciting Homecoming was each year. Tony reports that the Millers have a 44-22-1 Homecoming record. They won last year, beating Zionsville 23-21.

Noblesville's longest win streak of Homecoming victories is eight, coming from 1973 through 1980. The opponents in

those days were Lebanon, Crawfordsville and Tipton.

The Millers (remember, they won last year) haven't put together back-to-back Homecoming wins since beating Hamilton Southeastern in 2005 and Westfield in 2006.

Tonight will be the first time for Hamilton Heights to serve as the opponent. Only three Hamilton County schools have ... Westfield, Southeastern and Sheridan.

Tonight will be the third game in the current series between the Huskies and the Millers. Noblesville won 35-9 last year and 34-0 the previous year.

That's not a surprise and it isn't because Hamilton Heights has had bad teams or

Noblesville has had great teams. The difference is in enrollment, Heights at 737 students and Noblesville at nearly 3,000. Football is a game of numbers, and Heights isn't, often if ever, going to win this kind of numbers game.

The series started in 1968 with a 27-6 Noblesville victory. Noblesville leads the series 7-0.

If you want to go back to the days when Hamilton Heights was Jackson Central, the Eagles defeated the Millers 26-20 in 1949 and 18-6 in 1948. The first game in that series was played in 1945, Noblesville winning 33-9. The last game was 1953,

Noblesville winning 41-0. Noblesville won that series 6-2.

Heights and Noblesville will play one more time, next year, in the current series.

"Heights informed us last week due to a change in their conference schedule they will not be able to renew the contract for Week 6 after 2017," said Noblesville AD Mike Hasch. "Last year we asked Heights to move from Week 2 to Week 6 to allow the renewal of the Noblesville-Carmel series. As we appreciate their willingness to do so, it has put us in this situation with the series. It's unfortunate, but we understand how important conference games are to the whole."

"Unfortunately," said Heights AD Kurt Ogden, "we will not be able to renew the contract because in 2018-19 we will be playing only conference games Week 3 through Week 8, followed by a Week 9 playoff."


