People in Fishers may say "Tell us something we don't know," but Money Magazine has placed Fishers on its annual "Best Places to Live 2016" list.

Fishers is ranked 30th on the list (the full list can be found here), and is the only city that represents Indiana. Money Magazine touts Fishers' low unemployment rate (3.4 percent) and its affordable nature, with a median home price of \$220,577 and property taxes of around \$2,614.

"The city is home to major employers like student loan provider Navient and security company ADT, and job growth is expected to skyrocket by 15.5% in the next five years," said the article.

Money Magazine also noted the "slew of cultural and recreational activities" available in Fishers, such as "the Conner Prairie Interactive History Park, the Ritchey Woods Nature Preserve, and the Nickel Pate District Amphitheater," which of course are only a few of the offerings available in Fishers.

Noblesville Elementary Football history...

Values learned by Grinders last a lifetime

Note: This is the beginning of a series of articles, celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Noblesville Elementary Football League and the Noblesville Grinders. Steve Dillinger is a Hamilton County Commissioner.

Some 50 years ago the youth in Noblesville, who wanted to play football, had no choice but to play in the school sponsored flag football program. It was ran by a very dedicated teacher who I believe was Mr. Forkner if I'm not



There was a group of us old Noblesville football people, who believed we needed something better for our young athletes. Joe Sparlin, Garrick Mallery, Jim Bright, Skip Schafer, Don Jellison, Dale Snelling and myself, decided to do something about it. There may have been one or two others that I cannot think of right now.

Snelling had just retired from being the head line Coach for Noblesville High School with Head Coach Bill Nevitt. I had played for him and I had the upmost respect and admiration for him.

We discovered an organization called the Indiana Elementary Football Association. It was a very well respected Youth Football organization that had teams from Carmel, Lawrence Central, Warren Central, Arlington, Fortville, Christian Park, Green Castle, Tabernacle and the Deaf School. We were invited to join their

We quickly put together our traveling team and named them the Noblesville Grinders, since Noblesville use to be a grain milling and grinding town, years back. That's how our varsity teams became the Millers. I recall it was Don Jellison, then the Sports Editor for the Noblesville Daily Ledger, that suggested the name.

That was the beginning of what has turned out to be one of the most magical and outstanding youth sports teams in the history of the State. It united families and thought young men how to be, not only football players, but how to become men. Love, commitment, determination, teamwork and always, always giving 100% effort of yourself. We maintained, by living and playing by these principles, they would always be winners, no matter the score on the scoreboard.

Dale Snelling was the first head coach. I was his head assistant along with Skip Schafer. Rex Dillinger (my brother), Steve Coverdale and Bill Evans were a few of our first team. These boys are now 61 years old.

We quickly realized that we would have many more boys who wanted to play than we could keep on the Grinders 33 roster. We took care of that problem by forming our (in house league) for the boys who tried out for the Grinders, but didn't make it. I think we had 5 teams in house that very first year.

It was not all a bed of roses that first few years. We had our critics. Some folks felt like these 11 and 12 year olds were not physically or mentally mature enough for such a

After the first few years, when the critics discovered the magic we were creating in their young men and their families, pretty much everybody jumped on board and they become Noblesville's young dream team.

We required very strong mental and physical discipline in order to be able to compete against the much larger schools. The boys were only allowed to answer either "Yes Sir or No Sir". We came on the field a certain way, we lined up a certain way and we broke the huddle a certain way. Many of these idea's came from our then knew High School Football Coach Jim Belden.

It produced winners, both on and off the field.

Much of the respect and discipline stuck. Today 40, 50. 60 years later, many of these ex-Grinders still address me with a "Yes Sir or No Sir". Always makes me feel so proud to have helped carve these young lives and hopefully have made a positive difference.

History of Hamilton County ...

Interurbans big part of history

Editor's Note: In keeping with the Bicentennial spirit which is flooding the state, the Hamilton County Reporter today publishes a story on the interurbans and their role in Hamilton County transportation. The article appeared in the 1988 100th anniversary edition of the Noblesville Daily Ledger.

The word "interurban" was coined in 1893 by Anderson lawyer Charles L. Henry to describe a system of electric railways unique to Indiana.

Although this system was the shortest-lived in history, spanning a period of only 48 years, it provided fast and safe rides for Indiana commuters.

The Indiana Union Traction Railroad spearheaded the installation of an interurban system of electric trains in the latter part of the 19th century. The first section of the interurban track, an 11-mile line between Anderson and Alexandria, was completed in 1898, and the remainder of the interurban tracks was laid by 1903.

The interurban in its peak years had 2,300 miles of track and 200 affiliated companies and it extended into 67 of 92 Indiana counties. Its terminal constructed in Indianapolis in 1904 and now a part of the Indiana Transportation Museum in Forest Park, saw nearly seven million passengers in 1914 at the peak of its popularity.

Hamilton County was crossed by a part of the Indiana-Elkhart line which ran from 96th and College to Home Place, northeast to Carmel and then northeast to Noblesville. The Hoosier Flyer and Dixie Flyer were the major north-south interurbans on this 117-mile track.

Interurbans provided a fast mode of transportation each hour daily from 5:30 a.m. to 12:30 a.m. and had Hamilton County stops in Carmel, Noblesville, Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta. Overnight sleepers were available and dining cars provided filet mignon for only \$1.25. The interurban also offered freight hauling and livestock pick up.

In 1941, after eight years of nominal financial gains, the interurban was forced to close. The automobile, well-paved roads and the Great Depression worked to bring its demise – the end to a brief but interesting period in the history of Hoosier and Hamilton County transportation.

We all dread the thought of losing mobility, which equals losing independence. Routine stretching and flexibility are critical to staying fit and independent.

> Strength training – if you are over 50 can you honestly say that you are as strong as you were when you were younger; is it more difficult to pick up a bag of groceries (paper, not plastic!) or a bag of potting soil, etc.? As most of us know, muscles will atrophy from non-use. Routine strength training will help you to keep your muscle mass and bone strength. Although our spines naturally compress throughout the years and most of us will lose some of our height, it is critical that we keep our bone structure as strong as possible, and this is true particularly for women.

> Cardio - do you consistently breathe deeply and regularly, slowly inhaling oxygen and expelling the carbon dioxide? Most of us practice shallow breathing on a regular basis. A good cardio workout, whether that is running, walking, dancing, or playing ball, will force you to breathe deeply and strongly. 

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
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

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Caitie finally makes it, Cailyn lights up Smock...

'Rocks win regional, four teams head to state

Four Hamilton County girls golf team, and one individual are going to state next week after their performances at Saturday's regional round.

There is a different storyline attached to each team. Two are continuing new traditions, two were looking for redemption after missing state last year. And the one individual? She achieved a long-sought goal - or, let's her say it in her own words.

"It feels like a weight has been lifted off my shoulders," said Caitie Gehlhausen, Hamilton Heights senior and state qualifier. "I was almost there all the other years, and so this year's my year. I'm excited."

Gehlhausen wasn't about to let this year be another "almost." She fired a 74 at the Lapel regional, which took place at Edgewood Golf Course. Gehlhausen's score not only made her the top advancing individual, but the overall runner-up. Gehlhausen finished behind only Holly Anderson of Columbus North, who carded

"I think I played really well," said Gehlhausen. "The course played a lot harder than it did last year, and I scored a lot better than I did last year."

The state meet, a two-day and 36-hole event, will take place this coming Friday and Saturday at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel. Gehlhausen will be joined by the teams from Hamilton Southeastern and Fishers, which placed second and third respectively at Edgewood. The top three teams advance from regional to state.

The Royals carded a 322, behind only Columbus North's 311. Southeastern missed out on state last year, ending a streak of 10 consecutive years of making it to the big tournament. This year, HSE made it back, and will mark its 13th appearance at state.


