Indiana Transportation Museum awaiting report...

No timetable for trains

Officials of the Indiana Transportation Museum (ITM) still do not know when they may be free to put trains back on the tracks of the Nickel Plate through Noblesville. Jeff Kehler, president of the ITM board, says his organization must await the report of an inspection commissioned by the Heritage Port Authority, owner of the rail line.

Presumably that inspection will be done next month. The ITM will then be responsible for making any repairs that the inspection shows to be necessary for safe operations. The Nickel Plate runs from downtown Indianapolis to Tipton. The transportation museum, headquartered at Forest Park, has been the sole user of the tracks and responsible for its maintenance under an agreement with the port authority.

Problems began early this year when disgruntled volunteers at the museum claimed the rails were not safe. The

volunteers were discharged after the claims plus allegations of poor business practices. The Indiana Attorney General's office is reportedly looking into the business records, but have thus far reported nothing that the ITM is aware of, Kehler said.

The Federal Railroad Administration looked into the safety concerns, and reported finding no problems to the museum officials. But, the port authority, wanting to insure safety, suspended ITM's use of the rails until further inspection is done. As a result there was no FairTrain this year. ITM was hoping to get back on track after Labor Day, but that has not happened.

Running excursion trains both north and south provides a big part of the museum's revenue. Trains taking riders to dinner at Cicero and Atlanta, along with youngsters to a Pumpkin Patch, and later a Polar Bear Express are among the popular rides offered for many years. The trains are considered a tourist attraction for the county.

Still unknown is whether any trains will be able to run yet this year. That will depend on the release of the inspection report and amount of time it takes to make any repairs found to be needed.



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
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Wanda A. Sigler



Westfield hosts Avon

Just how much will an old heart take? Or, a young heart.

"We have lost two games in a row by a point, but we are staying positive," said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert looking to this week's home Hoosier Crossroads Conference game with Avon."

Looking at scores, Westfield could be in for another tight game.

Avon, for example, has defeated Hamilton Southeastern 31-28. Westfield lost to HSE 21-20. Westfield lost 29-28 in overtime to Brownsburg. Avon has lost to Brownsburg

Avon is 3-3. The Orioles also have lost to Ben Davis 38-7 and to Whiteland 22-21. They have defeated Plainfield 35-31 and Fishers 38-3.

Westfield this week is ranked No. 5 in Class 5A behind Fort Wayne Snider, New Palestine, Bloomington South and Columbus East.

We have lots of work to do to get better and we have to find ways to win the close one," Gilbert talked about his 4-2 Shamrocks. "We still believe we can be a very good football team. We've just lost to a couple of good football teams."

Westfield's offense in six games has proven they can move the ball through the air and on the ground.

In five games (he missed one game by injury), senior quarterback Andy Sweet has hit on 42-of-78 passes for 679 yards. He has thrown for six touchdowns and has not been intercepted.

Sweet's top receiver has been Evan Manley with 17 receptions for 362 yards and five of the Shamrocks' seven aerial touchdowns. Jonathan Swidan has 10 catches for 146 yards.

Nate Froelich and Swidan have pounded the way on the ground. Froelich has carried 106 times for 628 yards and seven touchdowns and Swidan has carried 73 times for 379 yards and six scores.

Westfield has scored 16 times on the ground and seven times through the air.

Gilbert said Westfield will have to play well on defense.

"Avon has one of the best players in the state in Bryant Fitzpatrick," pointed out the Westfield coach. "He's explosive and dangerous. He plays running back and offensive linebacker and returns kicks."

In 37 carries, Fitzpatrick has run for 288 yards and five touchdowns. Sampson James is Avon's leading rusher with 343 yards in 84 carries.

The Orioles can sling the football. Quarterback Cameron Misner has connected on 65 passes in 146 attempts for 880 yards. He has tossed for 10 touchdowns and has been intercepted just two times. His leading receiver is Luke Shayotovich with 27 catches for

Avon has defeated Westfield two consecutive times, 35-20 last year and 23-6 two seasons ago. Westfield won 17-15 three years ago.

"Avon is a much younger team than usual, but they are still big, strong and fast, like ays," Gilbert added.

The Giants are coming

Carmel's football program is a little different than many. For example, while many will select "cupcakes" homecoming games, Carmel this Friday will celebrate homecoming by host long-time MIC Conference rival Ben Davis, which this week is tied for sixth in the Indiana Coaches Association's 6A poll.

Of course, there are few cupcakes on Carmel's schedule.

Another thing different about Carmel football. The Greyhounds are tied for No. 10 in the same poll. Despite only a 3-3 record.

Ben Davis is 4-2 but only 1-2 in the Giants' last three games. In comparing scores. Ben Davis has defeated Pike 48-14 and beaten Lawrence North 41-14 while losing to Center Grove 20-7. Carmel has beaten Pike 65-27 and lost to Center Grove 19-6 and to Lawrence North 27-20.

'Ben Davis is extremely talented and well-coached," Carmel coach John Hebert talked about the Giants. "Even in the games they lost, they played with great physicality and energy. They are certainly one of the top five teams in the state, in my opinion.

"Stopping their quarterback, Reece Taylor, will be a major challenge. The front seven of the Gants' defense is as good as anyone in the state," Hebert added.

Taylor is outstanding. He has completed 89-of-143 passes for 1,023 yards and seven touchdowns. He has carried the pigskin 64 times for 608 yards. His leading receiving

is Noah Thomas with 20 catches for 195

Carmel is coming off a victory over North Central.

"Again, we did not get off to the fast start we sought," Hebert said. "Offensively, it took us several series before we established our game plan. Once we did that, our running game got going and we were able to establish a rhythm.

That running game is led by Jerome Halsell with 503 yards in 86 carries for a 5.8 yard average per trip. Camari Hunt has averaged 6.5 with 274 yards in 42 carries.

"Jalen Walker, Ethan Merriweather, Camari Hunt and Jerome Halsell made plays contributing to a 48-point production," said

'Defensively, after a strong start, North Central's offense proved to be a challenge to stop. Jacob Abrams had a strong game, including a pass interception which led to a field goal and put us up 17-6 as the first half expired," said Hebert.

Carmel's passing game also has been outstanding. Ben McDonald is 73-for-110 for 939 yards and 14 touchdowns. He has been intercepted just two times.

Walker has 27 catches for 310 yards and seven touchdowns and Merriweather 19 receptions for 306 yards and five TDs.

Carmel has defeated Ben Davis two consecutive times, 35-21 last year and 37-14 two years ago. The Giants won 28-24 three seasons ago.
