Jim Neal, one of the best that Noblesville ever produced, died on Tuesday after living a full life 95 years in duration. I knew Jim for 52 years. He was my boss, my inspiration and my friend. An outstanding journalist, community leader and family man, Jim also took on politics as his "hobby," as he called it.

## Hamilton County honored with cooperation award

The Association of Indiana Counties' (AIC) has awarded Hamilton County the 2016 *Local Government Cooperation Award* for the State Road 37 improvement project. Hamilton County, the City of Fishers, the City of Noblesville and the State of Indiana are each contributing funds to improve traffic congestion through the addition of roundabouts. The project will improve safety and travel times for commuters. Estimates project a 41 percent reduction in travel times for motorists who travel the entire corridor. This project is unique in that construction will be managed entirely by local units of government, leading to improved communication for residents and businesses impacted by construction.

Counties that win this prestigious award must demonstrate that the project meets the following criteria:

The improvement required substantial leadership and perseverance on the part of county elected officials

Recommended that it can be utilized by other counties but in some cases the project cannot be duplicated. It resulted in cost savings or increased efficiency and effectiveness of county government

It required cooperation with other county offices, departments or other units of government

It was a creative approach to solving a difficult problem

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# IKEA hires contractors for construction of Fishers store

The highly-anticipated IKEA store in Fishers marked a big milestone earlier this week.

IKEA announced that contractors have been hired to begin construction on the building. A press release on the company's website said this "allows the project to continue on track for site work to commence, with groundbreaking next month and a store opening in Fall 2017, increasing the Swedish retailer's presence in the Midwestern United States."

IKEA currently has stores in West Chester, Ohio (in the Cincinnati area) and two Chicagoland stores in Bolingbrook and Schaumburg, both Illinois.

The press release goes on to say:

"IKEA has chosen Pepper Construction to serve as Construction Manager for the IKEA Fishers site work and store development project. Having a strong Midwestern presence, Pepper is a full-service construction management, design/build and general contracting firm that has constructed several IKEA stores throughout the years, including one underway in Columbus, OH. Other firms assisting with this project are: real estate brokerage CBRE for site selection support; Faegre Baker Daniels for local land use counsel; Kimley-Horn for civil engineering; KJWW Engineering Consultants for structural; ACIES Engineering for mechanical, electrical and plumbing design; Earth Source for environmental services; and GreenbergFarrow as project architect.

"With contractors onboard, plans can proceed towards opening the future IKEA

Fishers," said Lars Petersson, IKEA U.S. president. "This store will provide a more convenient IKEA shopping experience for current and potential customers throughout Indiana, complementing our growing Midwestern U.S. presence."

"IKEA Fishers will feature nearly 10,000 exclusively designed items, 50 inspirational room-settings, three model home interiors, a supervised children's play area, and a 325-seat restaurant serving Swedish specialties such as meatballs with lingonberries and salmon plates, as well as American dishes. Other family-friendly features include a 'Children's IKEA' area in the Showroom, baby care rooms, play areas throughout the store, and preferred parking. In addition to the more than 500 jobs that are expected to be created during the construction phase, approximately 250 coworkers will join the IKEA family when the new store opens. IKEA Fishers also will provide significant annual sales and property tax revenue for state and local governments and schools.

"Located approximately 15 miles northeast of downtown Indianapolis, the 289,000-square-foot future IKEA store and its 1,000 parking spaces will be built on 35 acres along the eastern side of Interstate 69, just south of the E. 116th Street exit. Store plans reflect the same unique architectural design for which IKEA stores are known worldwide. IKEA also is evaluating potential on-site power generation to complement its current U.S. renewable energy presence at nearly 90% of its U.S. locations."

Jim was executive editor and owner, with his brother, of the Noblesville Daily Ledger. He gave me my first job as a reporter right out of college in 1964. I remained there for 21 years learning the newspaper business from the best of newsmen.

The focus of a small newspaper is on local news, and Jim knew what it was, where to find it and how to write it. I like to think I got fairly good at it thanks to him. During my years with Jim the Ledger had some major stories that one might not expect to find in a small daily.

It isn't every day that the sheriff walks into a newsroom to arrest the editor for opinions he has expressed in his daily column. It happened at the Ledger in July 1965 and it hit the news all over the country. Jim was cited for contempt of court by an angered judge. Other newspapers and TV networks said it was a violation of freedom of the press. In Noblesville a group of American Legionnaires marched around the courthouse wearing black armbands. The charge was eventually thrown out by an impartial judge.

As mentioned earlier this year in this column the national media returned to the Ledger in 1974 to see what Middle America had to say about President Nixon's involvement in the Watergate scandal. In fact, CBS newsman Morley Safer liked what he found so well he came back a second time for a follow-up story.

In 1980 the Ledger ran a story that made big news again when some mentally deficient people were found frozen in a locked and unheated house trailer at Sheridan. Some media called the victims slave laborers and the people in whose care the victims had been placed were charged in the death of one man. The Ledger issue in which that story appeared won the Hoosier State Press Association's Blue Ribbon award for best paper in the state.

There were other events large and small, some tragic, some humorous, that kept us busy and readers interested. Through it all Jim's steady hand guided the Ledger

operation with professionalism and class. Most astounding to me was that Jim found time to write his County Line column most every day. That's not easy. I know, I can't always find interesting material about which to write even once a week.

Jim let me have a trial run as news editor in 1972 when he accepted the tough job of Republican state chairman. Within a year he pulled warring factions of the party together and headed an election campaign that swept all state GOP candidates into office. Then he resigned and returned to the Ledger.

Jim eventually retired, but then agreed to serve for a year as interim chairman of the Butler Journalism Department before real retirement in Florida. In recent years Jim and his wife, Georgianne, returned to settle in north Indianapolis not far from their daughter Andrea. It was there he died on Tuesday night.

There will never be another Jim Neal, but I like to think he made those of us he guided better people who will always try a little harder thanks to the example he set.

The memorial services will be Saturday at 2 p.m. in the chapel at Meridian Street United Methodist Church in Indianapolis. Visitation will begin at 1 p.m.

**James T. Neal**

January 5, 1921 - September 27, 2016

James T. Neal, 95, who died September 27 in Indianapolis, was the third generation in his family to own, edit, and publish the *Noblesville Daily Ledger*. He began his 36-year newspaper career as a paper carrier and eventually, as editor, guided the newspaper in 1980 to the title of Blue Ribbon Newspaper in the annual contest of the Hoosier State Press Association. Neal wrote a daily column six days a week for 25 years.

His commitment to freedom of the press and honest and open government prompted his induction in 1990 to the Indiana Journalism Hall of Fame. He had previously received the Ball State University Honors Award for Distinguished Service in Journalism.

Neal was born Jan. 5, 1921 in Lebanon, Ind., the son of Ralph Bowman and Mary Honan Neal. The family moved in 1924 to Noblesville where Ralph joined the staff of the *Noblesville Daily Ledger*, a county-seat daily newspaper published by his father, Charles S. Neal. A graduate of Butler University with a degree in journalism, Neal also was a graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point and served during World War II in Germany for three years as armored artillery lieutenant. Prior to resuming his newspaper career, Neal was sent to Fifth Army Headquarters in Chicago where he served as an aide to General James M. Gavin, chief of staff. The General reciprocated years later when he came to Indianapolis to address the Indiana Republican Editorial Association of which Neal was president.

Neal's defense of the First Amendment generated national headlines in July 1965. A Hamilton County judge had ordered his arrest for contempt of court after Neal criticized a court plan to crack down on moving traffic violators. At a preliminary hearing in the case, the courtroom was jammed to capacity, and some spectators wore black armbands to protest the denial of freedom of the press. The case was later dismissed on procedural grounds. A newspaper column Neal wrote on the death of his German Shepherd Beowulf also drew national readership.

In the 1970s, Neal organized and developed Noblesville Cablevision and served as its president until he and his brother John sold the company in 1984. He also was one of the developers of Indiana television station WHMB (Channel 40) in Indiana.

Neal was active civically and politically on both the local and state scenes. He was a founding member of the Noblesville Boys & Girls Club and received the national Boys Club Medallion in 1965. He was one of the founders of the Hamilton County Community Fund, now the United Way.

Neal was secretary of the Indiana Republican Party for 11 years (1957-68) and served as its chairman in 1972-73. Edward Ziegner, political editor of *The Indianapolis News*, in his 1995 book *View from the Press Shack*, credited Neal with playing a major role in the 1972 election of Governor Otis Bowen by over 300,000 votes, a record at the time. Neal was named a Sagamore of the Wabash by both Governors Bowen and Robert D. Orr.

He was a three-time delegate to the Republican National Convention, served on the Republican National Committee, and was a Republican member of the Indiana Election Board and Indiana Judicial Nominating Committee. He served on the Board of Trustees of Butler University and, after the *Ledger's* sale in 1985, headed the university's journalism department until his retirement in 1987.

Neal served on the boards of the Indianapolis Children's Museum, the Community Service Council of Indianapolis, and the advisory board of Conner Prairie Pioneer Settlement. In 1991, he and his wife, longtime collectors of Native American art, were among the founders of the Institute of American Indian Arts Museum in Santa Fe.

He was a member of Sigma Chi Fraternity, the Indianapolis Dramatic Club, the Players Club, the Society of Indiana Pioneers, and Meridian Street United Methodist Church. Named a Hamilton County torchbearer for the Indiana Bicentennial Torch Relay, he will be represented posthumously by his grandson on October 13.

Neal was preceded in death by his sister, Sally Cina, and brother, John R. Neal. He is survived by his wife of 63 years, Georgianne Davis Neal; daughters Anne (Thomas) Petri and Andrea Neal; grandchildren, Alexandra Petri, Andrew and Scott Schmelzer; and sister, Mary Ann Zore (Dr. Joseph) of Englewood, Fla.

Services will be at 2 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 1, in the chapel at Meridian Street United Methodist Church with calling an hour prior to services. Memorial contributions may be made to the James T. Neal Journalism Scholarship at Butler University or the Boys & Girls Club of Noblesville.

## Two county schools receive National Blue Ribbon honor

Two Hamilton County schools were designated as National Blue Ribbon Schools for 2016.

The schools are Geist Elementary in Fishers (a Hamilton Southeastern school) and West Clay Elementary, part of Carmel Clay Schools. Only nine schools in Indiana received the National Blue Ribbon honor.

Public schools must meet one of two eligibility criteria: It must be either an Exemplary High Performing School, which means it meets a threshold of performance based on state assessments, or be an Exemplary Achievement Gap Closing School, which means the school is making progress in closing the gap between the performance of the school's subgroup and the state's all-students group over the past five years.



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
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



# Nothing new about coach

There is lots of unfamiliarity as Hamilton Heights has moved to the Hoosier Conference. Several new opponents on the schedule.

For example, Heights on Saturday (12 noon) will play Twin Lakes at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. Those two Hoosier Conference teams met for the first time last year, Twin Lakes winning 17-14. In comparing scores of this year's opponents, Heights lost to Northwestern 35-20 and Twin Lakes fell to Northwestern 34-7.

Not much to go on for Coach Mitch Street and his Heights staff as the Huskies prepare to meet Twin Lakes.

Except for, except for the fact that Scott Mannering is Twin Lakes' new coach his year.

"I have on several occasions called Twin Lakes Lewis Cass over the last week or so," said Street. "Coach Mannering made the move this spring over to Twin Lakes, but you see a lot of the same characteristics in his Twin Lakes team that you did in his Cass teams."

Twin Lakes is 2-4. Heights will take a 3-2 record to Lucas.

The Indians lost to Class 1A powerhouse Lafayette Central Catholic 48-0 last week. They also have fallen to Lafayette Jeff 33-28, Rensselaer 38-6 and Northwestern. They have beaten Delphi 57-14 and Benton Central 54-27.

While Heights and Twin Lakes both are Hoosier Conference teams, they play in different divisions. Heights is in the East and Twin Lakes in the West.

Heights still is battling for first place in the East. The Huskies are 2-1. Northwestern and Tipton also are 2-1. Heights lost the game to Northwestern and defeated Tipton and Lewis Cass. Heights and Northwestern both still have to play a Western team which is 2-4. Tipton's final conference game will be against Lewis Cass.

This Saturday at Lucas, Heights' defense will need to key in on a couple of brothers. Blake Bennington is the quarterback. Bryce Bennington leads the team in receiving with seven receptions for 146 yards. Blake Bennington has completed 20-of-45 passes

for 309 yards. He also leads the Indians in rushing with 53 carries for 466 yards.

"Twin Lakes really plays hard, physical football," Street talked about his opponent. "They have several high class athletes who play on both sides of the ball.

"Despite their record, I think they are a very good football team. They have a challenging schedule and they are doing some good things on the football field. It will definitely be a test for us," Street added.

Hamilton Heights will throw both a passing game and running game at the Twin Lakes defense.

Quarterback Josh Feltz is 58-for-109 slinging the ball, good for 934 yards and 10 touchdowns. His leading receivers are Riley

White with 13 catches for 205 yards, Jesse Brown with 12 for 211, Caymn Lutz 12 for 190 and Sterling Weatherford 10 for 208. White leads in touchdown receptions with four, followed by Weatherford with three.

On the ground, Clayton Cowan leads the way with 60 carries for 388 yards.

Weatherford and Brown are dangerous, too, returning the football. Weatherford has a 42.2 average and Brown a 28.8 average in returning kickoffs. Brown is averaging 19.5

yards and Weatherford 13.3 yards when returning punts.

On the defensive side of the football, Cowan leads in solo tackles with 37, closely followed by Zach Stevens with 35. Cowan also has 38 assists and leads in total tackles with 75.

Lutz has three pass interceptions and White has two.

All tickets at the gate at Lucas on Saturday will sell for \$15.

## IHSAA sectional pairings to be revealed Sunday

First round sectional matchups in the 44th Annual IHSAA Football State Tournament presented by the Indianapolis Colts will be announced Sunday, Oct. 2, via television, radio and webstream.

This year's drawing is being conducted one week earlier than normal due to the Colts playing a home game on the previously scheduled date (Oct. 9).

The 90-minute television show will be carried exclusively on Fox Sports Indiana (FSI), the home of
