Bicentennial Torch coming to Hamilton County Oct. 13

The Bicentennial Torch is coming to Hamilton County on Oct. 13, and will be making stops at Celebration Stations in Carmel, Westfield, Fishers and Noblesville.

Hamilton County communities are gearing up to host celebrations 200 years in the making. As the Bicentennial torch makes its way from Boone County to Hamilton County, the community is invited to attend celebration stations along the torch route to show city pride and cheer on local Hoosiers making history.

Here are a list of the Celebration Stations and times that the torch will be arriving:

3:30 – 4:15 p.m. - Center Green at the Palladium, 1 Center Green, Carmel

Torch arrives: 4:05 – 4:15 p.m.

Michelle Corrao, assistant director of Prevail and sexual assault awareness advocate will run the torch to the first Celebration Station along the route. Carmel's

Bicentennial celebration will include music by the Indiana Wind Symphony, fun and interactive booths, ticket giveaways by resident companies of the Center for the Performing Arts, food and drinks from Matt the Miller and other fun activities for all ages. Mayor Jim Brainard and other city officials will be on-site to welcome the torch passing through. Kyle Condra, a Medal of Valor recipient from the Carmel Fire Department, will carry on the torch.

4:45 – 5:10 p.m. – Union Bible College, 434 S. Union St., Westfield

Torch arrives: 5 – 5:10 p.m.

Bob Beauchamp, owner of Beauchamp Antiques, will arrive at Union Bible College in a tractor and wagon. Mayor Andy Cook will address the crowd upon torch arrival. All citizens are encouraged to wear green to show their Shamrock pride. The Westfield Welcome Wagon will be on-site as well as children's activities and other

festivities. Sabrina Richard, a 10-year-old Food Network featured chef, will carry on the torch.

5:30 p.m. – Conner Prairie, 13400 Allisonville Road, Fishers

Torch arrives: 6-6:20 p.m.

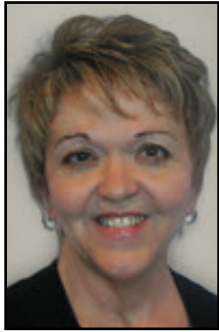

Elwood man killed in Friday night crash

A Friday night crash on the Hamilton-Tipton county line claimed the life of an Elwood man.

At approximately 10:33 p.m., the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office responded to the report of an inverted vehicle crash on 296th Street east of the intersection with Carpenter Road in the northeast section of Hamilton County. A passing motorist spotted a vehicle in a field south of the road that serves as the county line between Hamilton County and Tipton County.

Responding police and fire units found a single occupant trapped inside the vehicle. Deputies determined a blue 2001 Chevrolet Cavalier was traveling eastbound on 296th Street when the driver ran off the roadway striking a utility pole and overturning. The driver of the vehicle, Steven E. O'Neal, 29, Elwood, was pronounced deceased by medics at the scene of the crash.

The cause of the crash is under investigation by the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Crash Investigation Team but high water from recent rains may have been a contributing factor in the incident. Anyone with additional information should contact the Sheriff's Office at 317-773-1282.

Disabled motorist stop on I-69 leads to foot pursuit, arrest

A trooper who stopped to offer assistance to a disabled motorists found himself in a foot pursuit and the subsequent arrest of that individual Friday morning.

At approximately 10:15 a.m., Trooper Troy Sunier of the Indianapolis District, was patrolling I-69 southbound in the area of 96th Street and observed a 2005 Toyota Corolla disabled vehicle partially in the roadway with a male sitting inside. Traffic was being hampered and vehicles were forced to swerve to avoid a collision.

Trooper Sunier approached the vehicle and a white male wearing no shoes exited the vehicle and began to walk back towards Sunier. Trooper Sunier recognized the male subject matching an earlier dispatch of a male subject near Methodist Hospital driving in the grass and the wrong way on the ramp. He was also reportedly outside his car without shoes taking photographs.

Trooper Sunier explained to the man he wanted to help. The man began to walk in circles stating someone was looking for him and clinching his fists. Trooper Sunier attempted to speak to the man but he became more aggressive, pushing Sunier and running to the front of his vehicle. Sunier deployed his Taser and the subject pulled out the barbs and ran northbound on the exit ramp to 96th Street.

Sunier gave chase and halfway up the ramp a Good Samaritan picked up the trooper offering him a ride to get in front of the fleeing suspect. The Good Samaritan stopped his vehicle beside the suspect. The suspect approached the vehicle, opened the driver's door, and attempted to pull the driver out of the vehicle. The Good Samaritan sped off and stopped again once he was in front of the fleeing suspect.

Trooper Sunier exited the vehicle and again gave chase WB on 96th Street. The suspect then ran into the Taco Bell restaurant, through the lobby and back out across 96th Street where he was met by arriving Fishers Police Officer Robert Gaines, who also became involved in a physical altercation with the suspect. The suspect continued to resist and was

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Girls golf state finals

‘Rocks finish second, Hecht makes top 10

Down by a seemingly insurmountable number of shots with nine holes left at the IHSAA state girls golf finals Saturday at Prairie View Golf Course in Carmel, Westfield nearly came all the way back.

The Shamrocks trailed two-time defending champion Evansville North by 10 shots, but fought their way back to within one with three holes remaining. But the Wildcats held on and won their third consecutive state championship, with Westfield the runner-up for the second year in a row.

Evansville North finished with a team score of 618, while the Shamrocks carded 620. Westfield had to fight off Columbus North for the runner-up trophy; the Bull Dogs finished third with 623.

With the 10-shot deficit and the number of holes left running out," Shamrocks coach Trevor Neu gave his team an update after the front nine.

"I talked to a couple of the kids individually, let them know where we were at, and told them that we needed to start being a little bit more aggressive, with shots we were comfortable with," said Neu. "I couldn't be more proud of this group of kids and how they fought yesterday, and how they thought today."

Westfield carded a 302 in its Saturday second round, an improvement of 16 shots from its first round score of 318. The Shamrocks and a few other teams had to finish some of their first-round play Saturday after rains interrupted Friday's first round.

Westfield's consistency helped bring it into contention. Cailyn Henderson scored 152 for her two rounds, with Jocelyn Bruch right behind by shooting 153. Both girls were also named to the All-State team after the conclusion of the meet.

"We definitely did not play our best as a team, but we tried to persevere out there on the last nine, and made up some strokes," said Henderson. "We were in it 'til the very last hole, and they ended up winning by two. But we still played pretty well at the last nine."

The Westfield girls golf team finished as state runner-up for the second year in a row. The Shamrocks carded a team score of 620, just two shots behind Evansville North, which won state for the third consecutive year.

"I just took it one shot at a time," said the freshman Bruch. "I struggled a little yesterday, but I just tried to play for myself and my team, do the best that I could."

Margaret Wentz shot 155, senior Morgan Baechle scored 156 and Adrienne Montalone had 161 for the Shamrocks.

Carmel placed fifth as a team with a 655. Nina Hecht earned a medal, finishing as part of a four-way tie for seventh place with a 151. That earned her a spot on the All-State team as well.

"It feels really good and awesome - considering how I played at sectionals and regionals - to bounce back," said Hecht. "I thought my season went pretty good, and it was fun sharing it with my sister."

Nina's sister Rani Hecht carded a 157, playing well in her senior appearance at state.

"We did have a better day today," said Carmel coach Kelly Kluesner. "Nina and Rani are the two that made a big difference today. They just kept on fighting. For Nina to be even par, she shot 38 on the front and turned around and shot 34 on the back. We're very proud."

Hamilton Heights' Caitie Gehlhausen was the fourth county player to earn All-State honors. Gehlhausen played as an individual at state, finishing with a two-day score of 154.

"I definitely had a lot of fun, and I played a lot better than what my scores had shown, so I'm still happy with my game," said Gehlhausen, who has committed to play Division I golf at High Point University in High Point, N.C.

"It was definitely some tough conditions, so props to Holly Anderson for shooting what she did," said Gehlhausen. Anderson, from Columbus North, was the individual medalist with a score of 146, two over par.


Fishers placed seventh as a team. The Tigers carded a 669, which is a 42-shot improvement from their score last year, which coach Danny Smith called a "remarkable improvement." Morgan Lewis and Kennedy Brooker both had 158s.

"We played a lot better the second day than yesterday," said Smith. "Yesterday was tough. Ten hours out on the golf course, it's hard to get to play 18 holes in 10 hours."

Hamilton Southeastern finished tied for 11th with a score of 697. Julia Eaton led the Royals with a score of 168.

Huskies win on 2-pointer...

Street goes for the win

There was no question in the mind of Hamilton Heights coach Mitch Street that once his Huskies got into the end zone he would go for the victory.

That’s exactly what happened Saturday afternoon at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis as the Huskies defeated Twin Lakes, 14-13.

Twin Lakes had just taken the lead with 7:37 remaining on an 11-yard touchdown run and a PAT kick. That gave the Indians a 13-6 edge. They had scored in the first quarter on a 37-yard field goal and in the second quarter on a 35-yard field goal with just eight seconds before halftime.

Heights got the ball setting up its final touchdown on an intercepted pass by Sterling Weatherford.

The touchdown came on a four-yard pass from Riley White to Jesse Brown.

“I didn’t want to play them in overtime,” Street said after the game, concerning his decision to go for the two-pointer.

White passed to Weatherford for the winning points.

The IHSAA’s soccer sectional tournament begins Monday, and it is usually a wild event here in Hamilton County. Both the boys teams and girls teams will play at four different sites in two classes - the big schools in 2A, the small schools in 1A. Here’s a site-by-site look at each sectional.
BOYS
AT HAMILTON SOUTHEASTERN
Action in this sectional starts right away, with the Class 2A No. 12 host Royals taking on Pendleton Heights in the first round on Monday. The two teams met early in the season, back on Aug. 16, with HSE winning 5-0. Matt Kuster has totaled 10 goals for the Royals to lead the team. With the draw, we will have to win 3 games in order to repeat as sectional champions," said Southeastern coach Chris White. "If we are victorious in the opener, we will face a much improved and under the radar opponent in Anderson, followed by a possible match up with rival Fishers, or other top 20 team Noblesville. Our sectional is always very competitive and it will be no different this year. We have

the capability, but are still working on putting it all together after going through most of the season without our full roster of players due to injury." Fishers and Noblesville play each other in the first semi-final on Wednesday. The two teams just recently met, last Saturday, Sept. 24, with the Tigers winning 2-1. "Noblesville is always a quality team and it seems we have tough battles every time we play," said Tigers coach Rob Pels. Millers coach Brian Prange agreed, saying that a playing a Hoosier Crossroads Conference team "is always tough, and it becomes just as challenging when you play them twice and less than 2 weeks apart." "I know Fishers has a good team and well coached," said Prange.

AT ZIONSVILLE
This four-team sectional might be tougher than any other in the state. The first Wednesday semi-final features No. 18 Guerin Catholic against Westfield, which can hold its own with any team in the state. The two teams did not meet in the regular season. KJ Clardy has scored nine goals for the Shamrocks, with Andrew Garvey also netting nine for the Golden Eagles.

"I think all of the teams in our sectional are evenly matched," said GC coach John Cech. "All 4 teams have an excellent opportunity to move on to regionals. It will surprise me if the goal spread in any of the games is more than 1. Westfield is a talented team that is very well coached. Coach Vaughn gets the most out of his kids year after year, and meeting him and his team in a one and done situation will be a big challenge for us." The second semi-final will be a big one - No. 8 Carmel vs. No. 9 Zionsville. The two teams played on Aug. 27, and it was a fittingly close game, with the Greyhounds winning 1-0. "I truly feel that our sectional is one of the toughest, if not the toughest sectional in the entire state. It doesn't matter who we draw," said Carmel coach Shane Schmidt, who called the other teams in Sectional 17 "top-notch, quality teams." That would include a good Liberty Christian team in the semi-finals and No. 11-ranked Muncie Burris on the other side of the draw.

University gets a Heritage Christian team that is receiving votes in the 1A poll. The two teams did not meet this season. Ryan Williams is leading the Trailblazers in goals with 13.

AT NOBLESVILLE
Class 2A, Sectional 16 is arguably the toughest girls soccer sectional in the state. If one has any doubts, look no further than
