Dan Howell: Nickel Plate Arts October Showcase Artist

A sculptor who has spent more than 40 years creating and teaching art is Nickel Plate Arts’ showcase artist for October. Dan Howell’s work in pottery and ceramics will be on display through Oct. 29 at the Stephenson House on its Noblesville campus. The opening reception will be from 6-9 p.m. tonight.

Howell began working with clay as a child on his father’s central Indiana farm, and pursued his artistic dream thanks to inspiration from a high school art

teacher. He turned a bachelor’s degree in education and a master’s degree in sculpture and ceramics from Ball State University into a 45-year high school teaching career, during which he passed along his knowledge and passion to the next generation of Indiana artists.

Howell’s body of work in this October exhibit spans four decades and a wide variety of media and

Screening process begins Nov. 12...

Noblesville Police accepting applications

The Noblesville Police Department will commence its 2017 Applicant Screening Process on Nov. 12. Citizens interested in applying may do so by submitting a pre-application prior to the posted deadline of 11:59 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 11, 2016. Citizens can apply by visiting the City of Noblesville's website (www.cityofnoblesville.org) and clicking on the Human Resources' tab (<http://agency.governmentjobs.com/noblesvillein/default.cfm>). The process is scheduled to take approximately five months to complete and will include the following components:

1. Pre-Application Screening
2. Physical Fitness Assessment
3. Written Examination
4. Oral Interview & Writing Exercise
5. Complete Personal History Statement
6. Polygraph Examination
7. Background Investigation
8. Psychological Examination
9. Complete Physical Examination / Drug Test
10. Approval of Police Merit Commission

Military members (currently stationed outside of Indiana) and out-of-state residents may be eligible for special scheduling that would allow for consolidation of several components of the process over a 3-day period. Eligible applicants do not incur any advantage in the overall process and a limited number of slots are available. Interested applicants may inquire within for additional information and eligibility confirmation.

Basic minimum requirements include:

1. Must be a U.S. Citizen.
2. Must have successfully received a high school diploma or GED equivalent.
3. Must be at least 21 years of age, and have not reached 36 years of age by date of hire.
4. Must possess a valid driver's license to operate a motor vehicle.

Bud goes for No. 400...

Huskies, ‘Hawks position for conference battles

Tonight could be a big moment in the career of Sheridan football coach Bud Wright, as he goes for his 400th victory when the Blackhawks travel up to Taylor.

But Wright is not letting his team, or himself, get caught up in the moment. Sheridan has other important things riding on this clash with the Titans: An undefeated record in the Hoosier Heartland Conference East Division, as well as some momentum going into the Blackhawks' game with Carroll - which will decide the overall conference champion.

And of course, there is the sectional, which begins in two weeks.

"We're getting better," said Wright. "Hopefully we can continue to improve. We'll find out."

Taylor is winless in its seven games this season, but Sheridan won't be taking the Titans lightly. The two teams hadn't played each other in recent history until last year, when they became East Division rivals after Taylor joined the HHC. And last year's game was close, with the Blackhawks winning 42-41.

As for this season, Wright said that Taylor has "played a couple good ball games." The Titans had a close game with Tri-Central, to whom they fell 20-14 in Week 2, and were even closer against Frontier in Week 3, losing 14-12.

Sheridan is on a three-game win streak, and currently sits at 4-3. The Blackhawks' famed running game has been led by junior Joe Callahan, who has gained 1272 yards in 215 carries, along with 12 touchdowns. Sophomore quarterback Drake Delph has thrown for 346 yards, including a touchdown. Gunnar Williams leads in receptions with 13.

Hamilton Heights will also be on the road tonight, traveling to Western for a Hoosier Conference game.

The Panthers are 1-2 in conference play and 2-5 overall. Their lone HC win came over Lewis Cass in Week 6. The Huskies, meanwhile, could wind up in a tie for first in the conference's East division.

Northwestern finished its conference play at 3-1. Heights and Tipton are at 2-1, so a Huskies win over Western and a Blue Devil win over Cass would create a three-way tie for the East's top spot.

Heights is 4-2 overall, coming off a dramatic win 14-13 over Twin Lakes at Lucas Oil Stadium on Saturday. Josh Feltz is having a nice season at quarterback, with a 58-of-109 pass completion mark, and 934 yards and seven touchdowns. Jesse Brown has caught 16 passes for 258 yards, including three touchdowns. Riley White has made four touchdown catches, and Sterling Weatherford has caught three TDs as well.

Clayton Cowan is leading the Huskies' rushing, with 447 yards and one touchdown on 74 carries. Cowan also is on top of the Heights defense list with 93 tackles.

Guerin Catholic will play Bishop Chatard this evening at the Indianapolis Tech field.

The Trojans, last year's Class 3A state champions, are 3-4, with wins over Brebeuf Jesuit, Cardinal Ritter and Cincinnati Winton Woods. Gabe Coleman is the offensive leader for Chatard; he has 573 yards in 103 carries, with five touchdowns.

The Trojans' quarterback is a senior, Billy Dury. He has thrown for 492 yards and four touchdowns. Max McGinnis leads the receivers with 10 catches.

As for the Golden Eagles, Carter McGinnis has been a rushing force, with 1069 yards and 15 touchdowns on 129 carries. Junior quarterback Luke Keller is having an efficient season, with 718 yards on 37-of-66 pass completions. That includes eight touchdowns. Grant Fremion has three of those TDs, part of his season-leading eight catches. Charlie Bock has 70 tackles on GC's defense.
