News briefs: Mayor Ditslear back in office after fall

Falling from a ladder can be dangerous. Fortunately, Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear has recovered from such a fall he suffered last week at his home. No broken bones and no serious injury reported. He has been back to his office in City Hall this week.

Flu shots will be offered to the general public at the Hamilton County Health Department on Mondays starting Oct. 10 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Cost is \$20. The health department is located at 18030 Foundation Drive which is east of Ind. 37 and north from Ind. 32.

Robert Swanay of Johnson City, TN, has been hired as the new director of the Carmel Clay Public Library. He has

been with the Johnson City library about 20 years. His start date has not been announced. Nancy Newport has been serving as Carmel's interim director since the position became vacant this summer.

On Monday County Commissioners will consider requests from Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) for \$300,000 to renovate the old Sheridan High School gym for a community center, part of the Blackhawk Commons project. HAND will also ask that \$225,000 in federal block grant funds be provided for the Granary project in Noblesville, a proposed housing complex on the site of the former Noblesville Farm Bureau Co-op.

The new Carmel Fire Station 44 will be dedicated Sunday at 2 p.m. Located on East Main Street east of Gray Road, the station replaces an older station that was located on the same site. The public is welcome to attend and tour the new facility.

The Hamilton County Council has hired a new attorney, Mario Massillamany, who succeeds Jeanette Kassebaum. The announcement came at last night's council meeting. The council also heard a request from the Central Indiana Regional Transportation Administration (CIRTA) that the council provide \$59,000 next year for CIRTA which provides transportation assistance to county residents. No action was taken on the request.

Some folks have asked about the significance of the fiber glass blue bison on the lawn of the County Museum on the Courthouse Square. Real bison were actually native to Indiana 200 years ago or more and its image is found on the official state seal. The blue bison, commemorating the state's Bicentennial (or Bison-tennial), will be moving to the new Federal Hill Commons next week.

Voter fraud allegations...

Investigation expands to 57 counties

The investigation that began in late August of 2016 alleging the filing of fraudulent voter application information has expanded from the nine counties listed in an Oct. 4, 2016 news release, to a total of 57 Indiana counties as of Thursday. Hamilton County is included in the list.

While it is the normal practice of the Indiana State Police to refrain from providing detailed updates of an active investigation, this exception is being made due to the deadline for Indiana voters to register or update their voter registration information by 11:59 p.m. on Tuesday, October 11, 2016.

Indiana voters may check the accuracy of their voter information by visiting this site: <https://indianavoters.in.gov>. Updates to voter registration information can also be made from the same site, up to the date of the deadline. The Secretary of State Office is also available to assist voters on regular business days, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. EST, by calling 866-461-8683.

While it is recommended all Indiana voters should confirm the accuracy of their voter registration information, it is especially prudent for voters who live in the listed counties to verify their voter information. At this point of the on-going investigation it is not possible to determine the number of registered voters that may have been negatively impacted by recent voter registration drive efforts.

# More Light:Douglass Returns

Roberts Settlement and other local organization will produce the show "More Light: Douglass Returns" during the first weekend in November at Logan Street Sanctuary, 1274 Logan St., Noblesville.

The show explores the second trip Frederick Douglass made to Indiana. Seeking more freedom, people of color settled in Indiana in the early Nineteenth Century. Frederick Douglass, an escaped slave, was beaten into silence when he visited Indiana in 1843. When Douglass returned to Indiana in 1880, enthusiastic crowds gathered to hear him

speaking, including descendants of those early settlers. How much had changed — for Douglass, and for the people? How do their lives resonate, even today?

“...I believed then as I do now that all the American people need is more light. I believed then if I could impress them with the idea of wrongs and cruelties suffered by the black man; if I could unfold all the evils of the hideous monster — slavery — that the American people would crush and destroy it. ...” — Frederick Douglass

The show will be presented at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 4 and Saturday, Nov. 5; then again at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 6. The Sunday performance will be followed by a question-and-answer session.

Admission is \$10 for students and senior citizens, and \$15 for adults. Tickets can be purchased at <https://squareup.com/store/nickel-plate-arts/item/more-light>. The show is best suited for an audience aged 13 and up.

## Two intersections to close Monday

NEW  
City Center Drive and Pennsylvania Street

Closure to take place on or after: Monday, October 10

This intersection will be closed 45 days for construction of a roundabout. Detour routes will be posted, using Carmel Drive, Guilford Road, and 116th Street. The existing T-intersection will be fully reconstructed to a multi-lane roundabout. The reconstruction will include new full-depth pavement, curb and gutter, an enclosed storm water system, shared-use path and sidewalk with new curb ramps. The private drive for the hotel, on the west side of the roundabout, will be reconstructed. Along with the drive reconstruction, a portion of the hotel parking lot will be reconfigured to operate effectively with the new roundabout. Access to the businesses within the project limits will be maintained at all times. Access to the Hotels will be maintained from both the north (through a temporary drive), and from the existing drive to the south.

NEW  
Carey Road and 136th Street  
Closure expected to happen on or after: Monday, October 10

This intersection has been prepped and construction will begin on this new single lane roundabout. The posted detour route will use Gray Road and Keystone Parkway to accommodate northbound and southbound traffic. Eastbound and westbound traffic will use Main Street and 146th street. The intersection of Keystone Parkway and 136th street will remain open throughout this project.

UPDATED  
Spring Mill Road Improvements  
Closure took place: Tuesday, October 4  
Construction has begun on Spring Mill Road from Main Street to Williams Creek, south of Dorset Road. This will be a full

closure until mid-December, weather permitting. The posted detour route follows Illinois Street for all north-south traffic. Dorset Road will maintain east west connectivity throughout the scheduled construction. This is the first phase of an \$8.3 million project that will add multi-purpose paths to complete pedestrian connectivity; a new median in the center of the roadway and pedestrian railings to bridges. Future phases will include work in 2017 further south on Spring Mill Road to just south of 106th Street, including a roundabout at 111th street, and a culvert lining project south of 106th street. Reith Riley is the contractor on this project.

UPDATED  
Carey Road and Hawthorne Drive  
Closure took place: Monday, September 26

This intersection was closed on Monday, September 26th for the construction of a new single lane roundabout. The closure is scheduled to last 45 days. This project will increase vehicular and alternative (pedestrian/bike) transportation connectivity. The posted detour will utilize Gray Road and Keystone Parkway to accommodate northbound and southbound traffic. Eastbound and westbound traffic should use Main Street and 146th street.

Emerson Road storm water improvement  
Lane Restrictions will continue: On or After Monday, October 10

The City of Carmel has been working on storm water improvements in the Emerson Road area. The storm sewer installation will continue along the southern portion of Emerson as well as 350 feet of York Drive from Emerson, and the length of Park Lane. Local traffic will be maintained. Weather permitting, this project should be completed by Thanksgiving.

Indiana’s All-Time high school football winningest coach...

# Bud gets 400th win

Sheridan football coach Larry "Bud" Wright joined one of the most exclusive clubs in football Friday night after his Blackhawks won at Taylor.

Sheridan's 49-6 victory over the Titans gave Wright his 400th career win. Already Indiana's winningest high school football coach, Wright is the state's first coach to reach that number. After winning one game at Mt. Ayr High School back in 1965, Wright began his Blackhawks’ coaching career with the 1966 season and the rest is history - his teams have been victorious in 399 games, and won nine state championships.

"It feels good," said Wright. He had talked openly of getting to that number, but now that's he reached No. 400, he doesn't want to celebrate just yet. Sheridan does have a few more goals in mind for the season.

Instead, Wright said he would celebrate after the season's over.

"We got some other things we got to take care of now," said Wright. The Blackhawks travel to Carroll next week to play for the Hoosier Heartland Conference championship, and then of course there's the post-season.

Wright is one of 13 active high school coaches from across the country to break the 400-win barrier. Remarkably, another coach got his 400th victory Friday, the same night as Wright: Jerry Pezzetti of Ankeny Centennial (Iowa) won its game in overwhelming fashion, 55-0, to join the 400-victory club. Another coach, Bob Milloy of Our Lady of Good Counsel in Olney, Md., reached the 400-win mark earlier this season.

The all-time winningest coach nationally? John McKissick, who won 621 games at Summerville (S.C.) between 1952 and 2014.

# 'Hawks overwhelm Taylor

If the Sheridan football team thought a victory over winless Taylor would be easy Friday night, the Blackhawks were jolted out of that assumption rather quickly. Sheridan gave up an early touchdown - " we let them score off the bat," said Coach Bud Wright. But that would be the only score, as the 'Hawks got going after that, and overwhelmed the Titans 49-6.

"We decided to wake up and play after that," said Wright.

The win improved Sheridan's record to 5-3, gave the Blackhawks their fourth straight victory and clinched an undefeated record in the Hoosier Heartland Conference East Division at 3-0.

And yes, it was the 400th coaching victory for Wright (see related story, Page 5).

After Taylor got its touchdown, Sheridan answered with two touchdowns in the first quarter, and two more in the second to take a 28-6 halftime lead. The 'Hawks then scored three more times in the third period.

Sheridan's famed running attack was potent as usual, but the Blackhawks also took to the air with some good results. In fact, both of Sheridan's first-quarter touchdowns were by passes from quarterback Drake Delph. Rhett Williams caught the first one, 19-yarder; then Gunnar Williams scored on a 16-yard catch.

Gunnar Williams also found the end zone from the ground, rushing in from 26 yards with 4:59 left in the second period. He had a spectacular game, not only scoring a pair of touchdowns, but also going 7-for-7 kicking extra points.

"He had a good game for us," said Wright. "He's one of the team leaders, he did a nice job."

Joe Callahan added three touchdowns for Sheridan. His first was a long one, 42 yards late in the second quarter. The other two came in the third period, both on short runs. In between, Brody Perry caught a 35-yard scoring pass from Delph, giving the sophomore QB three touchdowns on the night.

Delph was 5-of-8 passing, which meant he completed 62.5 percent of his passes, and 60 percent of his completions were for touchdowns. He totaled 95 yards. Callahan ate up 204 yards in 27 carries.

Sheridan travels to Carroll next Friday to play in the Hoosier Heartland Conference championship game against the Comets.

Westfield jumped ahead 16-10 in the third quarter after a 16-yard touchdown run by Kaleb Pettijohn. The Tigers yanked the lead back with under two minutes to go in the period, when R.J. Potts combined with Vore for a 76-yard touchdown pass play.

The Shamrocks then got the lead in the fourth quarter. Fishers kept fighting, with Michael Noble scoring a 15-yard rushing touchdown with 4:58 left. But Westfield held on for the victory.

Vore had another big game for Fishers. He completed 15-of-26 passes for 229 yards. Potts had five catches for 118 yards, while

Adams caught three receptions for 76 yards - and both had a touchdown, of course.

Sweet was also efficient, going 13-of-20 through the air for 169 yards. Manley and Pettijohn both caught three passes, with Manley totaling 79 yards and Pettijohn getting 44 yards.

On the rushing front, Swidan led Westfield with 20 carries and 92 yards. Noble ran for 46 yards in seven carries.

This game completed HCC play for the Shamrocks, who host Brebeuf Jesuit next Friday. Fishers travels to Zionsville for an HCC game.

It was truly a back and forth game for Heights. The Huskies scored 21 seconds into the game on a one-yard run by Clayton


