

City budget proposes 11 new employees, lower tax rate

A proposed budget for the City of Noblesville's 2017 operations has been submitted to the city council by Mayor John Ditslear's administration. It calls for 11 new city employees, a two percent raise for most employees and a slight decrease in the property tax rate.

Weekend ramp closures at I-465, Keystone

Construction contractors plan to close the southbound U.S. 31 ramp to eastbound I-465 this weekend to pave the final surface layer. Work is scheduled to begin Friday, Oct. 14 at 9 p.m., and the closure is expected to end before 6 a.m. on Monday,

During the closure, motorists will be directed west on I-465 and use the U.S. 421/Michigan Road (Exit 27) interchange to return eastbound on I-465. Drivers with local destinations should seek their best alternate route.

Crews will also close the northbound Keystone Avenue ramp to northbound U.S. 31 for paving. Work is scheduled to begin Friday, Oct. 14 at 8 p.m., and the ramp is expected to open before 6 a.m. on Monday, Oct. 17. During the closure, motorists will be directed to exit to 146th Street and use the northbound parallel ramp lanes to access northbound U.S. 31 at 151st

The southbound U.S. 31 exit ramp to Rangeline Road and Clay Terrace Boulevard will be closed at the same time to pour a small section of concrete pavement. Dynamic message signs will advise motorists to exit early at 151st Street and use the southbound parallel ramp lanes to access Rangeline Road and Clay Terrace Boulevard.

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



ORDINANCE NO. 58-09-16 AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING CERTAIN TERRITORY TO THE CITY OF NOBLESVILLE HAMILTON COUNTY, INDIANA

WHEREAS, the Common Council of the City of Noblesville has conducted a public hearing as required by law in regard to the annexation of

certain territory which is contiguous to the corporate boundaries of the City of Noblesville; and,

WHEREAS, the Common Council now finds that the statutory criteria for annexation have been met and satisfied all as demonstrated by the

fiscal study adopted hereby and made a part of the record of these proceedings;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana, meeting in regular session as follows:

SECTION 1. That the common location of the subject real estate is as follows: at the intersection of Union Chapel Road and Pleasant Street in Noblesville Township and said real estate is more particularly described as follows:

Carmel Clay Parks receives national inclusion award

Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation (CCPR) received the Excellence in Inclusion Award by the National Recreation and Park Association today during the 2016 NRPA Annual Conference in St. Louis, Missouri.

The Excellence in Inclusion Award recognizes and honors an agency or organization that has embraced its mandate to implement inclusive processes and practices and provides well-planned supports for inclusive participation by people with disabilities and diversity in all programs, services, and facilities. Further, the agency or organization provides leadership to other agencies, shares information, and advocates for inclusive services and practices. This is an important part of NRPA's three pillars (conservation, health & wellness, and social equity), all of which fall in line with CCPR's mission and vision.

"CCPR has created a culture of inclusion, striving to ensure all park visitors, program participants, and employees feel valued and welcomed regardless of their abilities or differences," said Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation's Chief Operating Officer Michael Klitzing. "From our formal policies to everyday practices, CCPR is dedicated to serving everyone in the community."

In 2015 alone, CCPR offered 205 programs designed specifically for people with disabilities, serving 2,275 participants. Adaptive offerings range from the innovative and award-winning Roundabout Playback Troupe and Adaptive FlowRider (surfing) programs to fitness and basic skills classes. CCPR offers inclusion services to ensure everyone, regardless of ability, is able to participate in more than 3,200 recreation programs offered annually. Inclusion services and modifications were provided to 73 individuals last year.

CCPR was established in 1991 through the grassroots effort of concerned citizens wishing to preserve disappearing woodlands and open space in the rapidly growing community. 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


