Noblesville City Judge Caldwell dies

Caldwell

It is with great sorrow that Mayor John Ditslear announces that Noblesville City Judge Gregory L. Caldwell passed away Thursday night. He was 74 years old. The Honorable Caldwell has served as the judge of Noblesville City Court since 1992.

“The city has lost a friend and valued colleague. He has been a tremendous public servant and steadfast member of the city court system. Our hearts go out to Judge Caldwell’s family and those in the courts that worked closely with him,” Ditslear said.

Judge Caldwell graduated from Wendell L. Willkie High School in Elwood, Indiana in 1960, Indiana University with an AB in Political Science in 1964 and the Indiana University Law School in Indianapolis with a J.D. in 1968. He began practicing law in Tipton, Indiana in 1968 where he was a deputy prosecutor for three years. Caldwell has been a resident of Hamilton County since 1972 and has maintained a law practice in Noblesville since that year also serving as a Hamilton County Deputy Prosecutor from 1972 to 1977.

Judge Caldwell is a member of the Hamilton County Bar Association and the Indiana City and Town Court Judges Association. During his years of law practice, Caldwell has had professional memberships in the Indiana State Bar Association, Tipton County Bar Association,

Hamilton County Bar Association and Indiana Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers. He also is a charter member and past president of the Noblesville Sunriser’s Kiwanis Club and has been a Kiwanian since 1968. He belongs to the Noblesville Elks Lodge and the Fox Prairie Men's Golf Club.

Caldwell has two sons: Trent, wife Theresa and daughter Taylor, and Travis, wife Rebecca and daughter Lucy and son Dane. He attended First Christian Church, Sunrisers Kiwanis and Elks in Noblesville and is a member of the Hamilton County Bar Association.

The city is awaiting notification of arrangements and funeral plans.

Only one local case of attempted voter fraud in Hamilton County

In a statewide investigation of voter fraud, only one case of attempted fraud has been detected locally by county election officials thus far. It was turned over to State Police, according to Elections Administrator Kathy Richardson. Other cases of tampering with voter registrations are possible, but not reported.

Statewide police have found hundreds of cases of phony names in voter registration files. The investigation is continuing in 57 of the state's 92 counties. Authorities have not revealed who may be responsible for the activity.

Indiana's photo ID law may, according to some, help curb election day voting by improperly registered individuals.

Meanwhile, election preparation is proceeding with a record number of voters expected to participate in the November 8 general election. Richardson said as of Tuesday afternoon her office has received more than 5,700 requests for absentee ballots. Early voting began Wednesday at the Judicial Center for any registered voter who wishes to avoid possible lines at the polls Nov. 8. According to Richardson, 894 people voted Wednesday, as compared to 286 in 2008 and 362 in 2012.

Early voting will be available Oct. 19 at satellite locations in the Carmel Library and the Fishers City Hall.

Teach Plus launches new policy fellowship for teachers in Indiana

Teach Plus, a national non-profit that empowers teachers to lead improvements in policy and practice, is expanding the scope of its Teaching Policy Fellowship for teachers across Indiana. The new Fellowship will engage teachers in the state to help guide policy decision-making and impact key state-level issues, such as the implementation of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and the creation of teacher career pathways. The Fellowship is launching in January 2017 and is continuing into December 2017 to provide teachers with advocacy opportunities in conjunction with the legislative sessions in the state.

“Teacher voice is critical to ensuring meaningful, equity-oriented policy change for Indiana,” said Teach Plus Indiana Director of Policy Patrick McAlister. “We’ve been working to bring educators to the table in Indianapolis since 2009. I’m thrilled we have an opportunity to work with talented Hoosier teachers around the state.”

Applications for the Indiana State Policy Fellowship are now open. Eligibility, selection criteria, and applications are available at teachplus.org/indiana-teaching-policy-fellowship. Applications will be accepted until 11:59 p.m. on Nov. 27, 2016.

“We established the Teaching Policy Fellowship to create much-needed pathways for teachers to influence the direction of education policies that affect them and their students,” said Teach Plus Founder & CEO Celine Coggins. “We look forward to welcoming the new group of Indiana State Policy Fellows and all that they will be able to accomplish.”

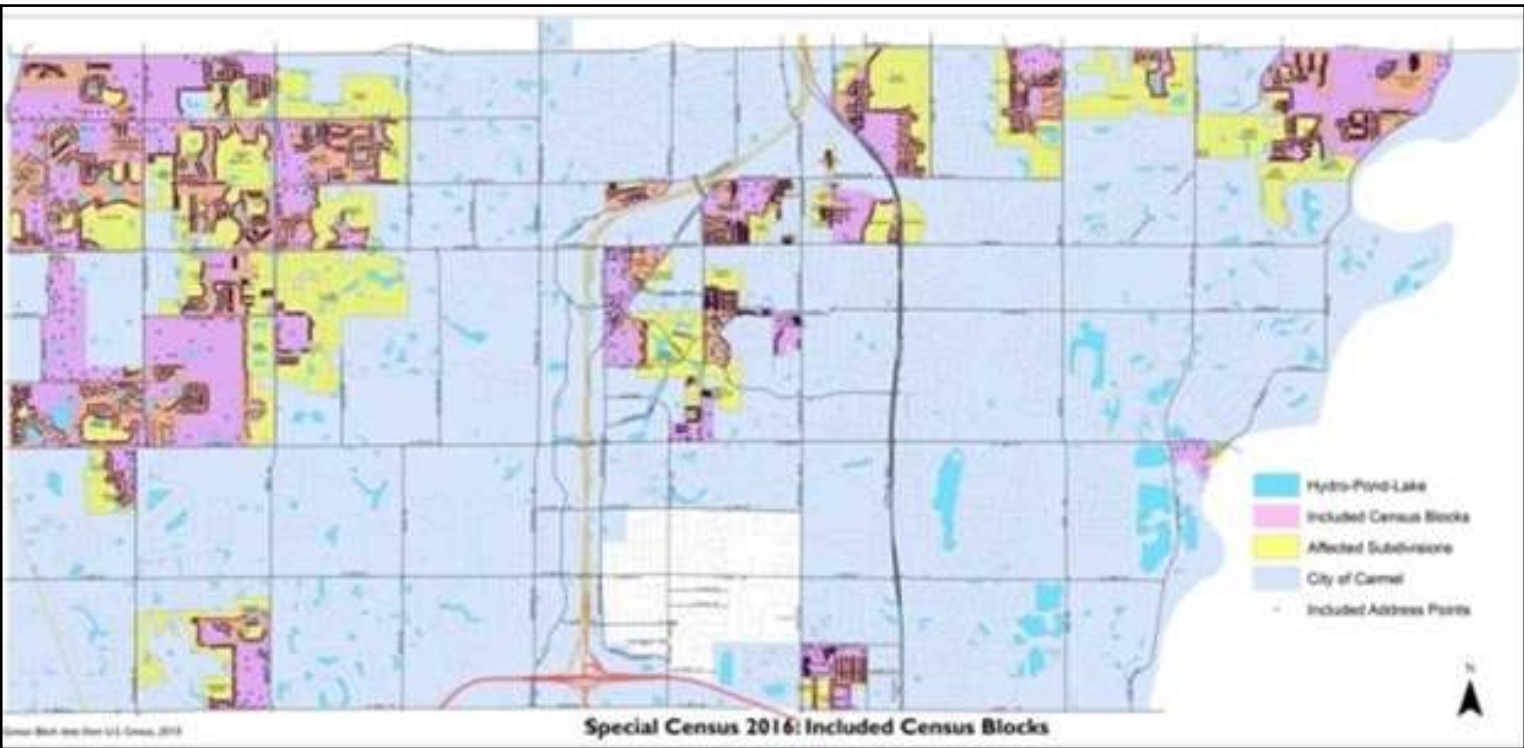

Another HCC battle...

Millers edged by Orioles, 31-28

As the football regular season ends and teams begin preparing for sectionals, one thing is certain: Noblesville is battle-tested.

The Millers played another close Hoosier Crossroads Conference game Friday, hosting Avon at Hare Chevrolet Field. Noblesville made another stirring comeback from 21-7 down in the second quarter to 21-21 at halftime. But ultimately, the Orioles prevailed 31-28.

"I thought our kids played their rear ends off," said Millers coach Jason Simmons. "Our kids competed from start to finish. We didn't start as well as we would've liked, but I still feel like our kids kept playing hard."

Noblesville got on the board late in the first quarter when Drew Scheib ran the ball in from the one-yard line. It was the only yard that Scheib had for the game, but he definitely made it count.

After falling behind 21-7 in the second period, the Millers came right back to tie the game thanks to two big passes by sophomore quarterback Grant Gremel. His first touchdown throw was to McGwire Plummer for a 14-yard scoring play, then with 1.6 seconds left in the half, Gremel found Ben Gruver for a 28-yard touchdowns reception. Jack Knight's kick tied the game.

After a scoreless third quarter, Avon took the lead back with a field goal. Noblesville responded with Gremel's third touchdown throw of the game, a five-yard toss to Nolan Ginther. That put the Millers back up 28-14. But the Orioles scored another touchdown, and held on for the win.

"It was a typical HCC game in the second half," said Simmons. The coach said

it was a physical game, and that there were plays there to be made by both teams.

"At the end, they made a couple more than we did," said Simmons.

Gremel had another tremendous game, completing 21 of 37 passes for 250 yards. He was back under center in place of Ryan Barnes, not only because Simmons wanted to make sure his quarterback was 100 percent, but also because the coaching staff wanted to continue to look at and evaluate Gremel, the junior varsity QB.

Simmons said that Gremel has made the transition from JV to varsity "really well," and credited Noblesville's offensive coordinator Caleb Small with always having the offense ready to go.

"He has our kids prepared for the moment and any kid that we've plugged in offensively, Grant included, has handled the moment really well," said Simmons.

Ginther had the most catches, with seven totaling 100 yards. Tyler Gonzalez was the leading rusher, with 21 yards in eight carries.

Noblesville, along with the other Class 6A schools, will have next week off as the post-season begins. The Millers travel to Fishers on Oct. 28 for a Sectional 4 semi-final game.

‘Rocks cruise past Brebeuf

It took a quarter for the Westfield football team to get going, but after that the Shamrocks cruised to a 37-21 victory over Brebeuf Jesuit Friday at Hare Chevrolet Field.

Westfield leaped out to a 16-7 lead in the second quarter thanks to a pair of touchdown runs: A one-yarder from quarterback Andrew Sweet, then a 20-yard run by Nate Froelich. Will Harrison converted the extra point after the second score, then added three more points with a 50-yard field goal that he kicked with seven seconds remaining in the first half.

Froelich blasted off for a 60-yard touchdown sprint in the third quarter. Johnny Swidan scored twice as well, with a two-yard run late in the third period, and a one-yard run to begin the fourth quarter.

"Nate Froelich made a huge touchdown run that was an awesome play that energized everybody," said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert. "Kind of served as a catalyst for the entire team."

Froelich had 119 yards in 10 carries. Sweet had an efficient game, completing nine of 13 passes for 110 yards.

The Shamrocks ended their regular season 7-2, and will have a week off before they begin sectional play. Westfield plays at Lafayette Jeff in the Sectional 11 semi-finals on Oct. 28.

Guerin falls to Roncalli in Circle City championship game

The showdown at the Eagles Nest for the inaugural Circle City Conference football championship lived up to the hype.

Guerin Catholic hosted Roncalli for the title on Friday, and was playing even with the Rebels through three quarters. But Roncalli, the No. 1 team in Class 4A, got the go-ahead touchdown in the fourth quarter, and edged 3A No. 2 Guerin 28-21 to claim the trophy.

The win gave the Rebels a perfect regular season at 9-0. The Golden Eagles, meanwhile, fell to 7-2. Their only other loss for the year was to another No. 1 team, 1A's Lafayette Central Catholic.

Carter McGinnis scored all three of GC's touchdowns, all on short runs. In addition, he also made a two-point conversion run after scoring his second TD of the second quarter. That came with 21 seconds left, and sent the Golden Eagles into the locker room tied at 14-all.

McGinnis' one-yard touchdown run (and Caleb Quick's extra point kick) kept the Golden Eagles tied at 21 going into the fourth quarter, but Roncalli scored on a 26-yard run and that pushed them ahead.

McGinnis ran 25 times for 113 yards. Luke Keller completed four of seven passes for 63 yards.

Then Walker and McDonald took over in the second quarter.

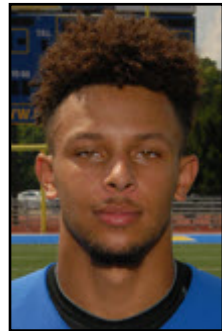


