This includes dialing numbers at the Sheriff's Office, government offices, and the non-emergency dispatch number (317-773-1282). Emergency (911) is not affected by the change. No phone numbers have changed and local calls are still local but you must use the 10 digit number (317-XXX-XXXX) even for local calls.

signs out of rights of way

The Indiana Department of Transportation urges political candidates and their supporters to keep our roads free from encroaching campaign signs for the safety of the motoring public. The signs can block visibility for traffic entering and exiting the roadway at intersections and driveways.

Areas that should remain sign-free include intersections, interchanges and rights of way that run along the roadway. Where the right of way is not clearly marked, boundaries may be estimated as the fence line, the back of the ditch or behind utility poles.

Sign removal

Indiana Code 9-21-4-6 authorizes INDOT and local governments to remove advertising signs from their public highways. INDOT staff removes encroaching signs encountered during normal maintenance activities and that are reported as potential safety hazards.



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

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Boden Road, 156th Street intersection made safer through signs, signal

Recent improvements at the intersection of Boden Road and 156th Street have made the crossing safer for motorists. The Noblesville Engineering Department has added signs indicating an upcoming stop along the east-west sides of 156th Street along with multiple oversized stop signs at the intersection. A flashing light signal has been constructed with a red light for 156th Street and a yellow light on Boden Road.

"These improvements are above normal standards to provide enhanced advanced warning," City Engineer John Beery said.

Because there were a couple of serious accidents at the intersection in 2015, officials said the improvements are a preventative measure taken to ensure drivers come to a complete stop on 156th Street before proceeding.

"Boden Road is seeing higher traffic rates as motorists use it to travel north and south on the east side of the city. Our goal with the heightened safety is to curtail any future serious accidents. Other factors are involved when it comes to accidents, but with these improvements we hope drivers are a little more cognizant of others and yield properly," Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear said.

Sugar consumption may be a fright on Halloween

How to satisfy your kid's sweet tooth without sacrificing good nutrition:

Children will be dressed as ghosts and ghouls, but it may be the amount of sugar they're "gobblin" up that is the scariest part of Halloween.

According to the Center for Disease Control's nutrition survey, U.S. children, on average, consume 124 grams of sugar (about 14 Halloween-sized candies) per day.

About four percent of all candy consumed in the U.S. occurs on Halloween alone. In fact, the average trick-or-treater consumes about three cups of sugar — the equivalent of 220 sugar packets.

"The good news," said Community Health Network registered dietician Erin Coleman, "is we can help our children have a healthier, happier Halloween without sacrificing all the fun."

Coleman recommends:

• Fill up on healthy foods prior to trick-ortreating as a way to prevent children from

filling up on too much candy that evening.
Talk to kids about the plan for Halloween candy consumption before trick-or-treating so they are aware of their limits.

• Allow kids to pick out a certain amount of their favorite treats and give the rest

away to co-workers or a dentist candy swap.

• Allow kids to trade their candy for a small toy from the store.

When it comes to candy, the smaller the size, the better. Because of its antioxidants, Coleman recommends dark chocolate over milk chocolate candies; or opt for low fat choices like Twizzlers. Fun-sized dark chocolate Mounds and Almond Joys are lower in sugar (about 4.5 grams a piece) compared to other candies.



Noblesville girls won first-ever regional

It was a perfect day for cross country, and a perfect day for the Noblesville girls team to make a little history.

Actually, the Millers made some big history

Noblesville won its first ever girls regional cross country championship Saturday at its home course, Chanquapin Ridge at White River Elementary School. The Millers ended the eight-year regional reign of Carmel, by the score of 61-67.

Hamilton County teams dominated the standings, securing all of the top five places and thus qualifying for next Saturday's semi-state in Shelbyville. Fishers placed third, Westfield was fourth and Guerin Catholic finished fifth.

Abi Little led Noblesville by taking fourth in a time of 18:18.49.

In terms of the team places, Little scored three points. The next four runners all finished in the team top 19. Sophie Reichard scored 11 points, Susanna Sharples-Gordon 12, Aubrie Deal 16 and Abbie Klinker 19. That was enough to offset Carmel's monopolization of the top two places.

Sarah Leinheiser won the individual race for the Greyhounds, clocking in at 17:53.31. Christina Geisler was the runner-up, finishing the course in 17:53.31. Izza Khurram had a huge day for Carmel, finishing in 10th place (scoring eight team points). The Greyhounds' next two runners scored 27 and 29 points respectively.

Fishers' Miya Wai placed fifth, while Westfield's Gabby Dilick landed in sixth place. Guerin Catholic's top three runners all finished highly: Megan Slamkowski was seventh, Ellie Schroeder ninth and Paige Schemanske was 11th.

Hamilton Southeastern was in the unique position of not qualifying as a team, but getting all seven of its runners to regional as advanced as individuals. 

Another epic battle with NC

They've had many showdowns in the state tournament over the years, but Saturday's state championship clash between Carmel and North Central at the Barbara Wynne Tennis Center might have been the closest.

True, the final score was 4-1 in favor of the Greyhounds, who clinched their first state title since 2012, and ninth overall. But look at the individual scores, and you'll see that this showdown was easily a few points away from going in favor of the Panthers.

North Central and Carmel hook up and play amazing tennis matches," said Carmel coach Spencer Fields. This is his first win as the coach of the Greyhounds; ironically, he won two state titles as the Panthers' head coach back in 2000 and 2007.

Carmel came from behind in three of the matches to win.

> But the tide began to turn when Fletchall, who had dropped the first set at No. 1 singles to NC's Ian Brady 6-4, cruised through the second set 6-1. Moments later, Michael won the second set of his match 6-2, thus grabbing the first team point for Carmel.

> North Central soon took the first set in the other two matches, but Carmel's No. 2 doubles team of Timmy Dixon and Rohit Nagaraj won the second set 6-4 after dropping the first set 6-4. Dixon and Nagaraj soon secured the third and deciding set - also 6-4 - putting the 'Hounds up 2-0 in the team standings.

In the morning semi-finals, Carmel took care of Bloomington North 5-0. The Greyhounds won all the matches in straight sets, dropping just 15 games. Nishanth Basavareddy won at No. 3 singles, joining his afore-mentioned teammates in getting victories.

The victory was important, as McAndrews and Natarajan qualified for the IHSAA's doubles tournament due to their undefeated record in the post-season. Fletchall, undefeated in both the regular and postseasons, will play in the singles tournament.

"I think the best part about winning state is knowing that all our hard work has paid off," said Natarajan.

"It always surprises me how intense it is here," said McAndrews. "It's unlike any other environment in tennis, honestly. North Central-Carmel's probably the biggest rivalry in high school tennis, if not high school sports, and so it's awesome to really capitalize on that here today."
