The process to fill Caldwell's vacancy

I called local attorney Paul Pacior yesterday because he was the first one I thought of when wondering who might be considered for Noblesville City Court judge after the untimely passing of Judge Greg Caldwell. Paul said he is indeed interested. His interest has been obvious for years after running repeatedly for the position.

Judge Caldwell was a fixture in Noblesville public life. He was judge for 23 years and a city resident most of his life. The judge died last week while on a hunting trip in Colorado. He was 74 years old.

Pacior challenged Caldwell for the city court bench four times, but it seemed like friendly competition with no



obvious acrimony. As Paul says, Greg was "almost a native of Noblesville," always friendly and virtually unbeatable.

There is a process for filling a vacancy when it occurs in the courts. By law the governor makes the appointment. When not knowing the potential candidates, a governor will often welcome a recommendation from the chairman of his political party in the community where the vacancy exists. In this case that would Republican Chairwoman Laura Campbell.

Over the years, several judges in Hamilton County have gained their positions in this manner. So, what are Paul's chances? Might be pretty good. He is a resident of the city which is required and an attorney in good standing ever since beginning practice here in 1993, and so far as I know, the only one to express interest in the job.

There could be others come forward although they do not have to make their interest known publicly when they

notify the party chairman, the governor's office or anyone else.

In the meantime, the community will say its farewell to the late Judge Caldwell. He was another of Noblesville's most interesting and personable citizens, the kind of person who gives the community its character. A memorial service will be held next week at Fox Prairie Clubhouse.

Cut fiber optic line halts Carmel early voting

The first early voting satellite locations in Hamilton County opened Wednesday, although technology caused a glitch at one of them.

The location at the Carmel Library had problems after a fiber optic line was cut outside the library, which took down the internet and the early voting ability with it.

"What a day," said Kathy Richardson, the Hamilton County elections manager. Richardson said she knew it wasn't going to be easy to manage three early voting locations, "but even with all the planning a fiber optic line being cut outside the library wasn't one of them. I have to give a lot of credit to our staff at the Carmel Library who hung in there until the line was fixed and the internet was restored.

Given our ongoing investigation, Secretary Lawson believed this could be further evidence of voter fraud and immediately contacted Indiana State Police detectives

Noblesville begins alley-paving project

Will reconstruct, resurface 0.80 miles...

The City of Noblesville has roughly 13 miles of public alleys. A project that began Wednesday will reconstruct and resurface approximately 0.80 miles of Noblesville's worst rated alleys. Earlier this year Noblesville completed repairs of 60 alley approaches with an addition 18 concrete alley approaches to be constructed over the following 2 weeks. Each approach will need to remain closed for 5 days. Access will be maintained to homes via the opposite approach. The work is being coordinated around trash pick-up to limit disruptions.

who were working on the case. We are grateful to Secretary Lawson for her prompt attention to this matter.

“Let me be clear: Among the highest priorities of the Indiana State Police is ensuring the integrity of this election and that every Hoosier vote counts.

“Because of these new revelations, the magnitude of the possible fraud involved and with the election less than three weeks away, I have directed all available resources within the Indiana State Police to assist with this investigation. Given the fact that the Statewide Voter Registration System has not been compromised, we believe the reports Secretary Lawson turned over yesterday may serve as evidence of forgery by representatives associated with the Indiana Voter Registration Project, which is a subsidiary organization of a group that calls itself Patriot Majority USA.

“It is very important to recognize that instead of telling Hoosiers they would cooperate with our investigation and working with Indiana officials to get to the bottom of the fraud issue, Patriot Majority USA instead launched a partisan advertising campaign accusing Governor Pence of leading a ‘government attack against’ Hoosiers and the Indiana State Police of ‘police intimidation.’

“This is completely false and I condemn these attacks on the Governor and Indiana State Police in the strongest possible terms. Furthermore, Patriot Majority’s claim that our investigation began at the direction of

Governor Pence is false. Governor Pence has never asked me or anyone in the Indiana State Police to initiate any investigation. Any suggestion to the contrary is offensive to me personally and the more than 1,000 troopers who serve with integrity and distinction every single day. The leadership of Patriot Majority should be ashamed of itself for suggesting otherwise.

“This investigation began with a concerned citizen alerting county election officials to dozens of voter application forms with grave discrepancies that indicated the possibility of fraud and forgery. Election officials called the Indiana State Police and a detective responded and determined further investigation was warranted.

“Our investigation currently spans 56 of Indiana’s 92 counties and has more than two dozen state police detectives diligently reviewing thousands of suspect voter application forms.

“While I cannot speak to the specifics of this investigation I have the highest level of confidence there will be County Prosecutors in multiple Indiana counties who will hold a number of people criminally responsible for their actions.

“We at the Indiana State Police have one goal: To enforce the laws of Indiana, and in this case, the laws associated with voter registration to ensure every Hoosier who is eligible to vote can cast a vote with confidence that their vote will count and they will not be disenfranchised as a result of the criminal actions of others.”

"In the end nearly 152 voters cast their vote," said Richardson.

At the Fishers City Hall location, voters began to line up at 11 a.m., an hour before early voting opened.

"The nearly 500 voters casting their vote in Fishers appreciated the opportunity to cast their vote early in a location in their community," said Richardson.

"I'm so disappointed that the issues completely out of our control didn't give voters in Carmel the same opportunity as Fishers," said Richardson.

Early voting will be open tomorrow at all three locations. You can vote from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the Judicial Center in Noblesville and from 2 to 7 p.m. at the Fishers and Carmel locations.

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Gregory L. (Greg) Caldwell

March 11, 1942 - October 13, 2016



Gregory L. (Greg) Caldwell was born to O.W. and Betty (Hiatt) Caldwell on March 11, 1942 in Elwood, Indiana where he grew up and went to school. He is survived by son Trent Caldwell wife Theresa of Noblesville, daughter Taylor and Travis wife Rebecca and daughter Lucy and son Dane of Denver, Colorado; four siblings Kim (Vicki) of Kokomo, Monty (Madlyn) or Charlestown, Amy Hoffman (Jerry) of Richmond and Brian (Susan) of Kokomo and numerous nieces and nephews.

Greg graduated from Wendell L. Willkie High School in 1960, Indiana University with an AB in Political Science in 1964 and the Indiana University Law School in Indianapolis with a J.D. in 1968. He began practicing law in Tipton, Indiana in 1968 where he was deputy prosecutor for 3 years. In 1970 he was a unsuccessful candidate for Tipton Circuit Judge falling 123 votes short after only 2 years practice in Tipton. He moved his office to Noblesville in 1972 and in addition to that private practice worked as a part time deputy prosecutor until 1977. Upon leaving the prosecutor's office Greg maintained a private practice in Noblesville focusing on criminal defense, family law and other areas of general practice. In 1991 he was elected to the part time position of Noblesville City Judge and held that position until his untimely death. He served 6 terms on the City Court Bench.

During his 48 years of law practice Greg had professional memberships in the American Bar Association, Indiana State Bar Association, Tipton County Bar Association, Hamilton County Bar Association, Indiana Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, Indiana City and Town Court Judges Association.

Greg was also a charter member of the Noblesville Sunrises Kiwanis Club and had been a Kiwanian since 1968. He belonged to the Tipton Elks Lodge and the Noblesville Elks Lodge, Noblesville Eagles and the Fox Prairie Men's Golf Club as well as various Local Republican organizations. He was elected on multiple occasions to the position of Precinct Committeeman and Delegate to the Indiana State Republican Convention. Greg was an avid hunter, fisherman and golfer. He hunted bear in Maine, Elk and deer in Colorado, turkey, duck, geese in several states with hunting trips to Maine, Colorado, Wisconsin and Arkansas. His sons have shared his enthusiasm for these sports having gotten to hunt with him as teenagers and continue in their outdoor adventures. He was also a sport shooting enthusiast and focused on collecting and shooting old west (cowboy) types of fire arms especially in authentic Colt single action pistols. At one point he belonged to SASS (Single Action Shooting Society) where competitive shooters dressed in 1800's garb used "cowboy" weapons in shooting matches. In about 2000 he joined his best friend of over 40 years to fish in Crappie tournaments with two associations Crappiemasters and Crappie USA. They fished in tournaments in a dozen different states in both of those associations qualifying for over a dozen national championships during their exploits.

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January 22, 1954 - October 18, 2016

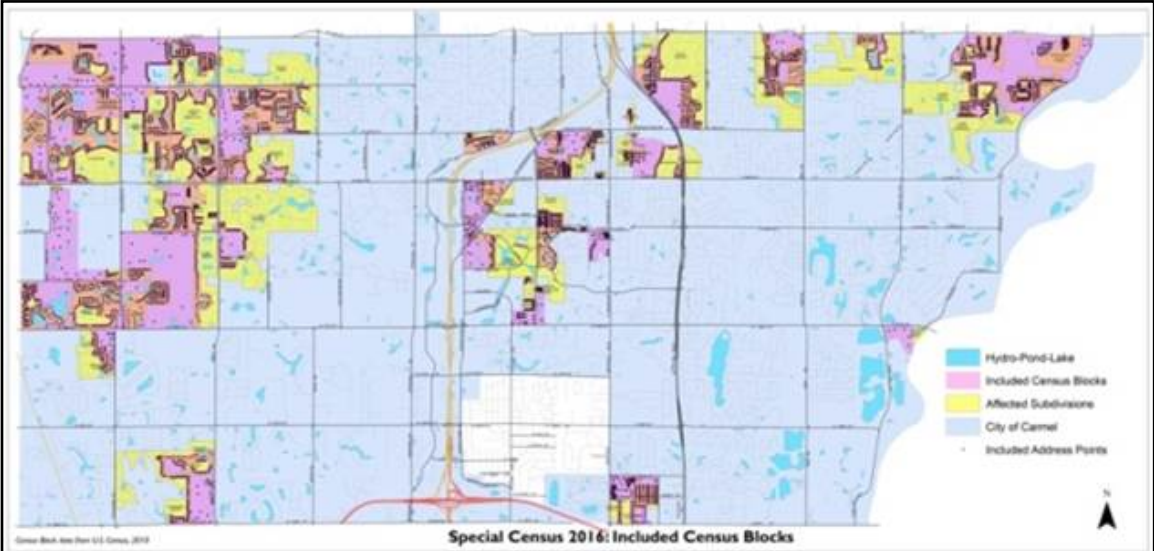

Big re-matches highlight action at Fishers

Volleyball sectionals begin tonight for Hamilton County's teams, and if the regular season is any indication, there should be some exciting matches this evening and on Saturday.

The big schools will be at Fishers for Class 4A Sectional 8. Tonight's match-ups will see Noblesville taking on the host Tigers, followed by a match between Westfield and Anderson. Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern are the only county teams not in action tonight: They both

received a bye and will play each other in the semi-finals at 12:30 p.m. Saturday.

When they played each other in the regular season, Fishers edged the Millers in five sets. The Tigers came back from a 2-1 set deficit to take the match 15-7 in the fifth.

Fishers is 24-8 for the season. Junior Mallory Hernandez has been leading the attack for the Tigers, with 456 season kills, a 4.6 per set average. Sophomore Rose Duffy has handed out 1006 assists over the 100 sets she has played this season.

On defense, senior Ellie Adams leads the digs category with 419, an average of 4.2 per set. Another senior, Maggie Markwood, is at 278 digs, averaging 3.1 per set. Junior Elizabeth Weeks has the most blocks with 56. Junior Julia Drozd leads the aces category, having served up 61.

"We're looking forward to the Sectional road ahead of us," said Tigers coach Steven Peek. "All season, this team has embraced challenges, and there's none bigger than winning Sectional 8. Noblesville will be a tough opponent because it's been seven weeks since we beat them, and they're making some lineup adjustments. They run combinations well and have some of the best defensive specialists in Indianapolis."

The Millers are 17-14 for the season, compiling a winning record with a rather young team. In fact, Noblesville's kill leader is a freshman, Lexie Almodovar, who has hit a total of 205. That gives her an average of 2.2 per set.

The Millers have two setters, and both have handled the ball well. Senior Allie Phillips has totaled 592 assists for the year, with junior Maddie Hine dishing out 371.

Both athletes are tied for the top in aces, having served 35 each.

On defense, junior Brenna Everingham has made 364 digs for the season, an average of 4.0 per set. Junior Lexie Bowler has the most blocks with 61.

Following that clash, Westfield will play Anderson. The two teams did not meet in the regular season. The Indians are 3-20 for the year.

The Shamrocks have a record of 18-12 for their 2016 campaign. Abigail Huser is Westfield's leader in kills with 360, an average of 3.8 per set, and has served a team-high 29 aces for Westfield. Junior Caroline Sinicki has a total of 872 assists, giving her an average of 9.1.

Huser has also been solid on defense, with 368 digs, or 3.8 per set. Senior Cassidy Ferrer has made 103 blocks for the season, giving her at least one per set - 1.1, to be exact.

The Thursday winners will advance to the Saturday morning semi-finals, and play each other at 11 a.m. for a spot in the championship match. Following that will be

the big clash between the Royals and the Greyhounds.

Carmel won that match in five sets, way back in the first week of the season, 15-13 in the fifth set.

"They are led by two of the best outside hitters in the state," HSE coach Jason Young said of the Greyhounds. "Mo Armstrong and Bonnie Bostic are just devastating hitters. We will have to try and keep them in check. Carmel is extremely well set by Senior Morgan Seaman."

Both teams are ranked in the top 10 of the 4A coaches poll: HSE is No. 3 and Carmel is No. 7. (Fishers and Westfield are receiving votes in the poll.) The Royals spent a significant amount of time at No. 1 during the year, however. Southeastern finished its season 27-4.

"We were ranked number 1 in 4A for the first time in program history for five weeks," said HSE coach Jason Young. "This team has been in the spotlight all year which I think will allow us to relax at sectional time as this is just business as usual."

Meredith Phillips leads a potent Royals offense, with 372 season kills, an average of

3.7 per set. Senior Kenzie Hinshaw has dished out 1038 assists for the year over 101 sets. Senior Caitlin Kane has a team-leading 40 aces.

On defense, senior Olivia Burgess has 452 digs for the season, an average of 4.5 per set. Junior Lark Jones is getting at least one block for set; she has 101 for the year.

"Meredith Phillips has been our go to all year on the outside," said Young. "Senior setter Makenzie Hinshaw has had a record breaking year for us breaking the career record of assists and single game mark. Senior Olivia Burgess will break the single season dig record this year. Our back court has been our strength all year and it will be tested this Saturday."

"Sectional 8 is one of the best sectionals in the state. Noblesville beat Carmel in three sets earlier, Westfield and Fishers both took us five sets this year. Fishers and Westfield and Fishers and Noblesville had five set wars. Westfield and Carmel had a four set battle this year. The sectional really is wide

open. Fishers playing at home will be a tough out for any of the five teams this year." As for the Greyhounds, they come into the match with a 23-9 record. Bostic, a sophomore, has the most kills with 240, with Mo Armstrong right behind her with 232. Both are averaging 2.4 kills per set. Seaman has handed out 872 assists for the year, putting her average at 8.7 per set. Sophomore Sophie Oliphant is first in digs for Carmel with 297, or 2.9 per set; and has a team-high 38 aces. Senior Alexandria Hicks leads in blocks with 74 total.

AT DELTA The county's two Class 3A volleyball teams, Guerin Catholic and Hamilton Heights, will both be in action tonight at Sectional 24, which takes place at Delta. This sectional could be one of the toughest in the state. Yorktown is ranked No. 2 with a 30-1 record, the host Eagles are No. 3, and Guerin's Golden Eagles are themselves receiving votes in the 3A poll. Guerin Catholic will be taking on Yorktown right out of the gate, at 6 p.m. tonight.

The Golden Eagles are 18-15, but they have played a very difficult schedule, taking on several 4A teams. Offensive leaders include sophomores Jenna Wolfgram and Kathryn Reifel, and junior Molly Witt. Senior Lauren Gandhi has played solid as Guerin's setter. Senior Jenn Cross and Reifel are among the defensive leaders. Following the Golden Eagles' match, Hamilton Heights will play Blackford. The Huskies are 17-13 for the regular season, Blackford is 0-27.

Junior Ana Collar leads a balanced Heights offense, with 200 kills for the season, an average of 2.1 per set. Collar trades setter duties with junior Emma Knowles, who has 363 assists (3.8 per set) for the year. Collar has dished out 349 assists, an average of 3.6 per set. 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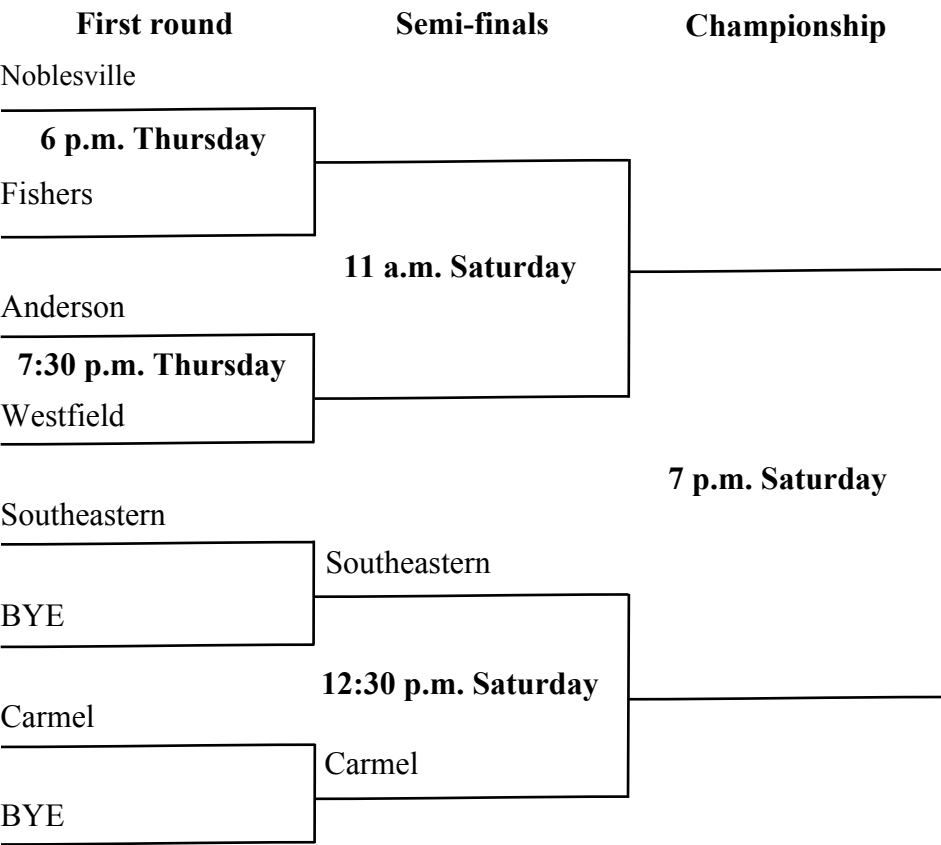

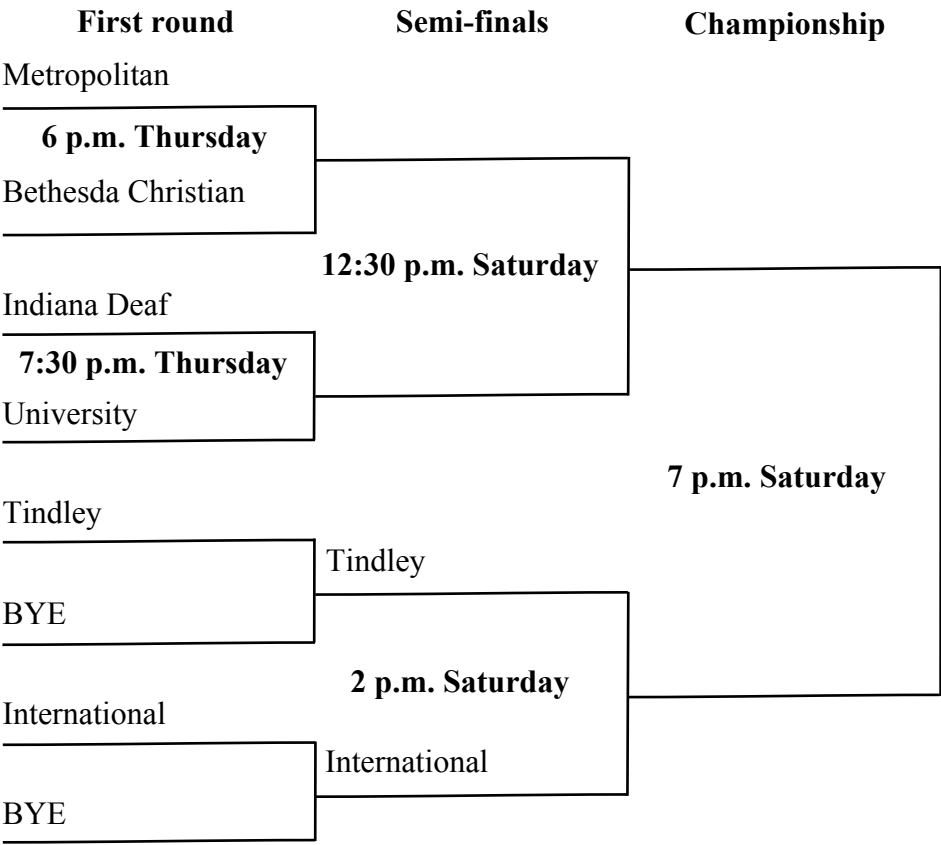

Huskies, GC going on the road



When Hamilton Heights played Twin Lakes earlier in the season, it was in the biggest football venue of all: Lucas Oil Stadium.

The Huskies got past the Indians 14-13 in that game back on Oct. 1. On Friday, Heights travels to Monticello to play Twin Lakes in an equally big occasion: The first round of Class 3A Sectional 28. Kickoff is 7 p.m.

The Indians are 2-7 for the season. Their only wins have been against Delphi, by the score of 57-14 and Benton Central, 54-27. Twin Lakes plays in the Western Division of the Hoosier Conference, while Heights plays in the East Division.

Last Friday, Guerin Catholic met up with football powerhouse Roncalli to play for the inaugural Circle City Conference championship.

This Friday, the Golden Eagles will meet up with another powerhouse to open Class 3A sectional play.

Guerin, ranked No. 5, will travel to No. 6 Tri-West for a big game in Sectional 29. The Bruins are 8-1 for the season, while the Golden Eagles are 7-2.

Junior quarterback Luke Keller is passing at a rate of 46-of-82, with 886 yards and 10 TDs to his credit. Senior Grant Fremion has the most receptions, totaling 11 for 227 yards.
