

Feeling the Heat at Fire Ops 101

Every year in October, Fire Prevention Week reminds Hoosiers to ensure their homes are prepared in the event of a fire. If you're like me, you check your smoke alarms and talk with your kids about an escape plan should a fire break out. But, this year I had a new perspective for fire safety.

Overnight I-69 lane closures for 106th Street bridge construction

Walsh Construction Company plans to temporarily close up to three lanes of northbound Interstate 69 for overnight work at the 106th Street interchange bridges being built in Fishers.

Starting Sunday, Oct. 23, up to three left lanes of northbound I-69 will be closed near mile 204 between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. each weeknight through Thursday night/Friday morning. Work is dependent on favorable weather, and construction schedules are subject to change.

Additional lane closures are scheduled in the following weeks, and specific closure schedules will be announced as work progresses.

Crews will be removing temporary overhang platforms used during the construction of the bridge decks, pouring concrete walls on the bridges, and painting bridge beams.

Motorists are reminded that the speed limit near the construction zone is reduced to 55 mph and may be reduced to 45 mph during overnight working hours. Motorists are advised to pay attention to work zone warning signs, follow posted speed limits, avoid distractions, and drive sensibly near construction zones. Professional Firefighters Association, on September 24 I was one of 17 public officials to participate in Fire Ops 101. I had the opportunity to learn what it would be like to run into a fire as well as to escape it. The program is designed to educate decision makers about the skills, equipment and emergency scenarios that are part of every firefighter's duty.

As Noblesville's Deputy Mayor, my "day in the life" experience was an informative reality check that will alter how I look at the next Fire Department budget. Equipment purchases are more than just line items on a spreadsheet. Squatting in a livefire exercise during a flashover with flames overhead heating the room to 500-600 degrees makes you very thankful for all that gear – and the guy next to you holding the fire hose.

Such decisions about equipment and personnel can be life-or-death matters for a firefighter – and perhaps someone they are trying to save.

In Noblesville, one-third of our city's proposed operational budget for 2017 is devoted to the Fire Department. And for good reason. Last year, it took 127 sworn firefighters working out of seven fire stations to cover 5,292 runs with an average response time of 5 minutes, 16 seconds to arrive on the scene. And they did so successfully due to the more than 20,000 annual training hours they accumulate.

You are never more thankful to have a highly trained fire department than when you are one of those 5,292 runs.

In addition to the flashover experience, I also participated in a simulated vehicle accident that called for extricating a crash victim. We learned how to use the necessary tools such as those generally known as "jaws of life," but also relied on a high level of coordination with multiple firefighters working around you.

About the project

INDOT awarded a \$21.7 million contract to Walsh Construction Company to build two separate two-lane bridges that will each carry one direction of traffic and form an oval-shaped roundabout on 106th Street over I-69. Ramps will provide new access at 106th Street to and from both directions of the interstate.

The project is intended to reduce congestion at existing I-69 interchanges at 96th and 116th streets, increase traffic safety in the area and provide direct interstate access at 106th Street. Direct access will serve existing residential and commercial destinations and accommodate development and population growth in the area Access on 106th Street over I-69 will remain closed through construction of the new interchange. 

Millers, 'Rocks win first-round matches

Noblesville volleyball coach Steve Hawthorne admitted Thursday night that his Millers have "struggled a little bit" with their confidence this season.

So, the team took the opportunity to Bowler also making two blocks. focus on itself over the past couple weeks. That approach worked, as Noblesville came out fired up for its first round Class 4A Sectional 8 match with host Fishers.

The Millers won over the Tigers in four sets, 25-17, 25-13, 23-25, 25-21, and thus moved on to Saturday morning's semifinal. Noblesville will take on Westfield, which cruised past Anderson 25-11, 25-8, 25-4 in the second match of the evening.

The Millers-Shamrocks match will be played at 11 a.m. Saturday, and be followed by a clash between No. 3 ranked Hamilton Southeastern and No. 7 Carmel. The championship match is scheduled for 7 p.m. Saturday.

The first between the Millers and Fishers was tight until midway through, when Noblesville ran off four straight points to jump ahead 18-13. Freshman Lexie Almodovar helped out with a kill.

Everything was going right for the Millers on offense. Senior Allie Phillips, the team's setter, scored a point on her own with a successful net tip late in the first set. Phillips and Lexie Bowler later teamed up for a block.

Noblesville ran through the second set, with Alexa Roberts making a big contribution. Roberts hit eight kills in the set alone, including three during a big run for the Millers: They scored the last five points of the set. Stephanie Meysembourg served a couple of aces in the set, and junior Emily Kiser helped out with a kill and a net tip.

Right off the bat, I want to say both of our left sides really contributed well tonight," said Hawthorne. "Both of them specifically have been working on some things to create a little bit more range in their offense, and I think Roberts absolutely did an outstanding job of that tonight. She managed the situation when she needed to. She took care of scoring when she needed to." Noblesville looked ready to sail through the third set when it jumped ahead 13-8, then led 17-13. But the Tigers pounced at that point, scoring six straight points to take a 19-17 lead. Mallory Hernandez hit two kills during the run, and another one of her kills put her team ahead 20-18. Fishers later led 21-19, but the teams would alternate points for the remainder of the set, and that allowed the Tigers to grab the third set 25-23. Fishers led 7-4 in the fourth set, aided by an ace from Julia Drozd. This time, the Millers went on a run, scoring seven consecutive points to lead 11-7. Kiser had two more winners - a tip and a kill - and Meysembourg served another ace. The Tigers cut Noblesville's lead to 11-10, and were still within 14-12 midway through the set. But the Millers made another run, this one of five straight points to jump ahead 19-12. Ashley Birkhimer and Almodovar each hit kills.

Everybody contributed something to the win. Roberts hit 15 kills, with Almodovar putting down 14. Birkhimer and Bowler each had eight kills, with

Phillips dished out 52 assists, and also made three blocks. Kiser had two blocks as well. Meysembourg wound up with five aces. Brenna Everingham led the digs with 22, and Maddie Hine had 13.

Fishers finished its season at 24-9. Hernandez smacked down 19 kills, with Audrey Haworth hitting eight and Elizabeth Weeks spiking six. Rose Duffy handed out 44 assists.

Ellie Adams made 23 digs, and Julia Drozd had 10 digs. Drozd and Maggie Markwood both hit one ace. Taylor Soper had 2.5 blocks, with Hernandez getting two blocks.

"It does hurt to kind of have everything come down to one game as far as how far you go when your season ends," said Tigers coach Steven Peek. "But as far as the progress of this program, we've made a lot of strides this year, for sure, finishing in the top half of conference for the first time in a long time and really not just doing it once, but kind of doing it over and over again against tough teams."

"That's all we had to do," said Mapes. "We talked about just coming out, serving tough and controlling the ball, the free balls and just working on different combinations."





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

Millers take on No. 1 Penn Saturday

The Noblesville girls soccer team will travel to Warsaw on Saturday to compete in the IHSAA north semi-state.

The No. 17 Millers will take on Penn, the No. 1-ranked team in Class 2A, in the first game at Warsaw. The action starts at 10 a.m. and will be followed by the second semi-final, which will be contested between No. 13 Fort Wayne Carroll and No. 10 Munster. The championship game is scheduled for 7 p.m.

Penn is 19-0-1 for the season, while Noblesville is 9-6-2. The Millers, of course, have played a difficult schedule, and in fact defeated Carmel on Sept. 13, when the Greyhounds were ranked No. 2 in the state.

Noblesville won its own sectional with upsets over No. 15 Fishers and No. 8 Hamilton Southeastern, then took care of McCutcheon and Marion to win the Logansport regional.

In the south semi-state at Evansville Central, No. 20 Columbus North will play Brebeuf Jesuit, the No. 4-ranked team and defending state champion, in the first semifinal. That game begins at 10 a.m. (9 a.m. Central Time), and will be followed by a game between Franklin Central and No. 12 Terre Haute North. The championship game will be played at 6 p.m.

Semi-state winners advance to the 2A state championship game, which will be played Oct. 29 at IUPUI's Carroll Stadium.
