Fire Department staff honored...

Kroger donates \$1,000 to Westfield Fire Department

The Westfield Fire Department received a \$1,000 donation this morning from Kroger as part of the company’s celebration of the remodel of its store on Carey Road.

“We are delighted that, once again, Kroger has made an investment in the safety of our community,” Westfield Fire Chief Marcus Reed said. “The company’s commitment to Westfield and the well-being of our residents is truly inspiring.”

Kroger made a similar donation in 2015 following the remodel of the company’s store on 161st Street in Westfield. Reed intends to use the donation to coordinate classes and purchase equipment that will reduce cardiac arrest deaths in the community.

"We are grateful for the daily dedication of our firefighters and police officers," Kroger officials said. "The Carey Road Kroger team presents this donation to the members of the Westfield Fire Department in recognition of their service, sacrifice and community spirit."

As part of this morning’s ribbon-cutting, Kroger also honored Joe Lyons, deputy chief of administration for the Westfield Fire Department. Lyons saved the life of a Kroger associate at this store by performing CPR on her after she collapsed while helping a customer.

Lyons was off duty and shopping at the time of the incident, and cared for the associate until first responders from Westfield Fire arrived on the scene.

Kroger invested \$6.1 million to expand and update the Carey Road location. New features include a bistro, sushi bar, expanded produce area and Starbucks.

Three bridges, two events, one day of celebration

Both Hamilton County and the State of Indiana came together to bridge the White River and connect the White River Campground and Strawtown Koteewi Park. The bridge comes from historic bridges

from Wayne County and Washington County with a third piece coming from here in Hamilton County. This multi-million-dollar project is one of immense dedication and preparation from multiple agencies in the state of Indiana and Hamilton County.

Al Patterson, “The building of this bridge has the ability to enhance both the campground and the park that it connects,

the people of our county and its visitors can enjoy what Strawtown Koteewi Park and the White River Campground have to offer, and at the same time we are preserving pieces of history.”

Hamilton Parks and Recreation will be putting on a two-part event to display and celebrate the restoration and re-creation of these historic bridges.

The duo said more than 5,000 shoppers attend each event and thousands more visit the website and Facebook page during the weeks leading up to the sale.

"We know the Grand Park Events Center will increase our event attendance with all of the traffic from the various sports leagues at Grand Park," Hare said.

The 370,000 square-foot Grand Park Events Center opened in July 2016 in Westfield, Indiana, and is ideal for trade shows, conventions and other live events.

"We're excited that Whale of a Sale has chosen the Grand Park Events Center as its new location," said Westfield Mayor Andy Cook. "Our community is composed primarily of families with young children so it will be a great addition to the calendar of events and will bring thousands of new visitors to Grand Park."

Grand opening of 106th Street path is Monday

A grand opening for the new 106th Street path project through Carmel and southwest Clay Township will take place at 12:30 p.m. Monday at the St. Vincent Heart Hospital, 10580 N. Meridian St., at the north end of the parking lot area near the 106th and Illinois Street roundabout.

The project provides a new unbroken connection from Zionsville to central Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard and other elected officials; alternative transportation and central Indiana bicycling enthusiasts will attend the ceremony.

During the past 20 years, Carmel has been adding to its local path and trail system with the goal of making connections from neighborhood to neighborhood across the city. With the completion of this project, coupled with the recently completed U.S. 31 upgrade, the last link of connectivity has been made along 106th Street from the city's western border with Zionsville, to its eastern border at White River. Carmel has more than 180 miles of multi-use paths and trails along streets, corridors and greenways and is recognized by the League of American Bicyclists as a Bronze Level Bicycle Friendly City.

Ivy Tech, Fisk University partner to offer seamless transfer option

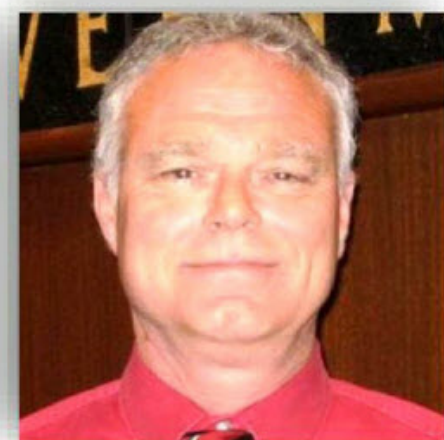

Scoring on their first four possessions...

Blackhawks handle Eagles in sectional opener

Sheridan got off to a perfect start in its first-round sectional game against South Putnam Friday at Bud Wright Stadium.

The Blackhawks scored touchdowns on their first four possessions, and the momentum carried them to a 49-12 victory over the Eagles. Sheridan will now play at Fountain Central next Friday in the semi-finals of Class 1A Sectional 45.

"I thought we played pretty good," said Blackhawks coach Bud Wright. "I think we started to make a few mistakes there in the second half, like we usually do. We didn't make near as many and we had a good enough lead that first half that we did okay."

Joe Callahan got Sheridan on the board three and a half minutes into the game with a seven-yard rushing touchdown. The 'Hawks defense then got a fumble out of South Putnam, and turned that into points: Drake Delph rushed in from three yards for another score.

Sheridan's defense wasn't done: The Blackhawks blocked an Eagles punt, which gave them the ball on the South Putnam 27. A few plays later, Delph threw to Rhett Williams, who caught it for a 22-yard touchdown.

Finally, Sheridan struck again early in the second period, with Delph finding Brody Perry for a 20-yard touchdown pass play. Gunnar Williams made all four extra-point kicks, and he wasn't done yet.

"I thought he played really good," Wright said of Gunnar Williams, who also had a 33-yard reception.

South Putnam got on the board with a pass play score with 3:19 left in the first half. The Blackhawks wound their way down into the red zone, and on the final play of the half, Delph threw to Cole Cummings for a 20-yard touchdown reception. Gunnar Williams' extra point kick made the halftime score 35-6.

Sheridan scored a touchdown in each of the next quarters. After absorbing a quick touchdown from the Eagles, the Blackhawks

responded in three plays: Two big Callahan runs got Sheridan to the South Putnam 1, and Delph punched it in from there.

The 'Hawks got their last touchdown of the game midway through the fourth, with Callahan running in from 13 yards. Williams made the extra point kicks on both of Sheridan's second-half scores, making him a perfect 7-of-7 on the night.

Callahan gained 267 yards in 40 carries, with Delph adding 80 yards in 17 trips.

"I thought the linebackers and the defensive line played a heck of a ball game,"

said Wright. "I think that getting Nick Burnell back in the middle really helped us on defense."

Burnell had missed the last two games, but was back on Friday.

"I think he made a big difference there for us," said Wright.

Sheridan is now 6-4 for the season.

Huskies fall to Twin Lakes, 28-14

Hamilton Heights' football season came to an end Friday, as the Huskies fell at Twin Lakes 28-14 in the first round of play in Class 3A Sectional 28.

Heights scored the first touchdown of the game, with Jesse Brown making a long run of 60 yards with 1:27 remaining in the first quarter. The Indians added two touchdowns in the second period to take a 14-7 halftime lead.

Twin Lakes scored again to extend its lead to 21-7 with nine minutes left in the fourth quarter. Caymn Lutz responded by taking a 95-yard kickoff return to the end zone, keeping the Huskies within 21-14. But the Indians scored again to clinch the game.

"Our kids did fight, they never did quit," said Heights coach Mitch Street.

The Huskies finished their season with a 5-4 record.

"I'm proud of the kids overall," said Street. "They want to perform for you." While it was disappointing to end the season with a loss, Street believes his kids played tough, "and our kids fought really hard this year."
