

Work could begin this year or in early 2017...

New section of Noblesville Riverwalk

Noblesville Riverwalk from Logan Street to Riverside Cemetery. A \$1.7 million contract has been awarded to Beaty Construction Company for the work. The Indiana Department of Transportation is paying for the project which is considered an alternative transportation route.

Whether work begins this year or early in 2017 will depend on the construction company schedule and weather conditions this fall. The riverwalk will eventually connect to the proposed east-west Midland Trail which is planned on the old Midland Railroad bed. To the north, the riverwalk will connect to the existing Potters Bridge trail along White from the Beck's company operation.

County Highway Director Brad Davis also announced Work could begin soon on a new section of the continued progress on the reconstruction of 276th requests from Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Street. Phase One of the project, anticipated next year, extends east from U.S. 31 to Gwinn Road in Jackson Township. In their meeting Monday, County Commissioners will accept right-of-way donations from Beck's Hybrids seed company for part of the improvements.

In a later Phase Two of the project, an entirely new section of roadway will curve north from 276th to meet 281st Street and continue east to State Road 19. The overall improvement will provide a better east-west route for trucks and farm equipment, especially those coming and going

In other business on Monday, commissioners will hear Development (HAND) for funding the proposed Home Place Gardens housing complex. The project for low to medium income residents is planned south of 106th Street and east of College Ave. Money being requested is from federal Community Development Block Grant funds which are administered locally.

Also on the agenda is consideration of plans for reoccupying the former juvenile detention center which is part of an overall plan to eliminate overcrowding at the jail complex, and a marketing (public relations) update on the multi-million dollar upgrade of State Road 37 for which planning is now underway.

Country Over Candidates

As leader of the nation's largest youth veterans organization, I am frequently asked who

Legion is supporting in this year's presidential election. My answer is "Veterans." And by that answer I am not referring to a military candidate's service (or lack

thereof) but to his or her proposals on issues such as VA health care, a strong national defense and border security.

Sometimes, if the questioner is unaware of our nonpartisanship, a follow-up is asked along the lines of "who does the Legion really support, Trump or Hillary?" My answer is the same, "The American Legion supports veterans.

While a lot of organizations claim nonpartisanship, it is a mandate that is enshrined in The American Legion's Constitution and is backed up by the examples set forth by our World War I veteran founders.

During one of the earliest meetings of The American Legion in 1919, a movement was afoot to nominate Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., as our first national commander. A World War I hero and the son of a former president, "T.R. Jr." was widely perceived to have political ambitions of his own and possibly follow in his father's footsteps to the White House. A term as national commander would be a nice steppingstone for the young Republican.

But Roosevelt would have none of it. Over shouts of "We Want Teddy," Roosevelt told the delegates, "I wish to withdraw my name for a number of reasons...We are gathered together for a very high purpose. I want every American through the length and breadth of this land to realize that there is not a man in this caucus who is seeking anything for himself, personally, but that he is simply working for the good of the entire situation.'

Roosevelt knew that the best way for The American Legion to advance its pillars of fighting for a strong national defense,

caring for veterans, establishing wholesome programs promoting and service Americanism was to avoid partisanship and political labels.

While many Democrats, Republicans, American and Independents have been active in The American Legion throughout our history, the organization is only beholden to "God and Country," the two entities that are emblazoned on the back of every membership card. We endorse no political office seeker nor any political party. We operate no political action committee and contribute to no campaign.

This does not mean that we are not engaged in the democratic process. Far from it. During election years, we routinely invite the Republican and Democratic nominees for president to address our national convention. Only time constraints prevent us from inviting the numerous independent and third party candidates as

The American Legion is concerned that the candidates have barely uttered a word about veterans' issues during any of the presidential or vice presidential debates. This comes at a time when an estimated 20 veterans a day commit suicide, more than 80,000 veterans have waited five years or longer to have their claims appeals decided and problems abound with the much ballyhooed Veterans Choice program.

Moreover, ISIS, North Korea, Iran, China and Russia dominate headlines, while lawmakers and the White House continue to fund our military at pre-World War II levels. Recent terrorist attacks by immigrants in Washington state, New York City and Minnesota demonstrate that the government still has some deadly holes in its vetting process.

Veterans care deeply about the security of this country. If they didn't, they wouldn't have served. In our all-volunteer force, the care and well-being of these veterans is the cost of war and fielding a strong defense.

The American Legion is not interested in which candidate "wins" on election day. We are instead encouraging candidates to follow Roosevelt's example and work for 'the good of the entire situation."

When that happens, America wins.

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

Carmel sweeps the Triple Crown

The Carmel boys tennis team played its way into the history books Saturday, as the Greyhounds won the individual state singles and doubles championships at Park Tudor.

The singles and doubles victories complement the team state championship that Carmel won last Saturday. This achievement, known as the Triple Crown, has been accomplished by only two other teams: New Albany in 1967 and North Central in 1995.

Junior Patrick Fletchall cruised his way to the singles championship with two overwhelming wins. Fletchall beat Franklin Community senior Noah Roberts 6-1, 6-0 in the morning semi-final, then defeated Evansville Memorial senior Brandon Wu in the afternoon championship, also by a 6-1, 6-0 score.

"It definitely feels really cool," said Fletchall. He joins his sister Molly Fletchall as an individual state champion for Carmel; Molly won the doubles title with Emma Love in 2014.

"I just tried to stay focused, high tempo, good attitude, lots of energy," said Patrick. "I think I played pretty solid today."

Fletchall finished his junior season undefeated at 24-0.

Carmel's doubles team of seniors Ethan McAndrews and Jay Natarajan also won both their matches in straight sets. The Greyhounds beat Penn seniors Mason Lee and Cole Pollyea 6-3, 6-0 in the semi-finals, then defeated the Park Tudor team of senior Jaren Katz and junior Will Emhardt 7-6 (3),

"We love to bring the intensity to every match we play, and I don't think this was an exception," said McAndrews. "We both kind of pump each other up on the court, and I think that shows through how we play."

"I think we played our greatest doubles that we have this whole season," said Natarajan. "And a lot of that goes down to just stressing the fundamentals, and I think each and every point, that's all we focused on doing, and I think we executed well.

McAndrews and Natarajan finished their season with a 13-6 record.

Hamilton County cross country teams dominated Saturday's Shelbyville semi-state.

The word "dominated," however, doesn't begin to do justice to what the Carmel girls team did.

The Greyhound girls scored a perfect 15 points to win the semi-state championship. That's right. Carmel swept the top five positions to earn the perfect score, which is a rarity in top-level competition, but almost unheard of at the semi-state level.

All of the Greyhound runners finished under 17:50, with defending individual state champion Sarah Leinheiser leading the way. seconds ahead of her teammate, second-17:44.0. Phoebe Bates was third, Rachel Anderson fourth, and Christina Geisler fifth.

Carmel will lead the county brigade to next Saturday's state meet, which takes place at the LaVern Gibson Cross Country Course in Terre Haute. The top six teams qualify for state, and Hamilton teams took five of those positions.

Fishers was second, edging Noblesville for runner-up honors by the score of 96-100. Zionsville broke up the county sweep by taking fourth, Westfield placed fifth, and Guerin Catholic finished sixth to earn its first-ever berth to the state meet.

The top finishers for each team were as follows: Abi Little placed eighth to lead the Millers, Megan Slamkowski was ninth for the Golden Eagles, Miya Wai took 10th for the Tigers, and Gabby Dilick finished 11th for the Shamrocks.
